These may be called guide lines, policies, ruies and regulations or any number of names but they all come out the same and the body doing the passing in turn acts as prosecutor, judge and jury in seeing that these laws are carried out. The fact that it is not their place to make new laws does not necessarily deter them whenever they feel-and often in good faith-lhat such laws or regulations will be of benefit to their particu'ar agency. One point in mind as the policy set up by Rankin Sch.is. Boardagain, I say, in goos faith- to the effect that the schools will do no business with any firm that is delinquent in theif :axes with the school. Now this ce-tainly seems like a reasonable thing except for the fact that that's a lot like cutting off your nose to spite
your face. You can't help a friend out of a ditch by putting your foot on his head and shoving him down whie he tries to get up. It may be the thinking of such agencies that with their great powers to tax and to legislate that they do not need friends.
I think they do.
A strong tax collection effort s much to be desired but at the same time it should be carried out with the thought in mind that we're not dealing wit; a set of figures alone but with individual people and as such there is bound to be mitigating circumstances in individual cases. For one thing, people like to be treated with respect. They do not take kindly to threats, short answers and bianket rules. Again. it's a little like kicking your dog and telling him to lick your hand all at the same time
There has to be a common ground-and there is-when men of good faith seek it with understanding and not with power just because they have that power.
I have much faith in Rankin School Board. They try very hard to be fair and honest and havein my personal case-been the strongest of friends but I think they're dead wrong in trying to force tax collections. If a person can't pay, there ought to be

stated that Upton County's pro rato cost would be approximately nine thousand dollars ( $\$ 9,000-$ 00 ); however, he would send the Commissioner's Court a cost estimate at my request. He gave me a copy of their reports on Reeves, Winkler, Smith, Pecos and Refugio Counties on my departure. I have these copies if anyone wishes to study them.
The eities of McCamey and Rankin do not have a secondary plan for supply of water. We need a secondary plan to stabilize the investments we have in our communities. If we needed more water tomorrow, we need to know where we could go to get it and how good the water would be. It is altogether possible that we cou'd find from the survey that we might need a small reservoir to catch our run-off water so that it could be recharged to our under ground supply. If it is, we need to know.
I think this survey is important to Upton County, and should be made at the earliest possible time that we can secure the services of the Texas Water Com mission. I believe this money spent on the future will bring results in the future
