Public School Week To Be **Observed Locally March 2-6**

As has been the custom for the past several years, Rankin Schools will join in observance of Texas Public Schools Week March 2-6. Everyone residing within the district is invited to join in the observance.

On each of the first four days, beginning next Monday, visitation to the classrooms is being encouraged during the regular school day. On Thursday night a number of special events-listed below, are on tap.

On Friday there is no school as all teachers attend the district meeting of the Texas State Teachers' Association and the students enjoy themselves with a holiday from classwork.

School officials have announced the program for Public School Week entertainment on Thursday,

After eating pancakes with the Lions Club in the school cafeteria, the patrons are invited to visit with teachers in all three buildings during the Open House, scheduled from 5:30 until 7:15.

The program in the auditorium begins at 7:30 with folk dancing performed by some second and third grade children directed by Mrs. Ruth Love, public school music teacher.

PUBLIC SCHOOL WEEK-

When you really stop and consider the matter, Public Schools are a remarkable thing. Possibly of all the things that the American way of life has provided for the people of this country, none anywhere in this land or the entire world quite equal in accomplishment and scope the Public School System.

You will note that I did not call it the free public school system as some are prone to do. It is not free at al. In fact, it cost an average of \$432 per chila nationwide in 1962-63. Texas was out an average of \$379 per child during the same time-ranking 33rd of the fifty states. Rankin Schools spend an average of almost \$600 per child per year. So it can't be called free public edu-

But what I'd like to see would be the average cost to each person in the U.S. I suspicion that that figure would be a heck of a lot less than the average tobacco bill-more in line with what is spent on dog food-and that's no small figure. The truth of the matter is-public education is about as efficient a program as there is carried out under tax support. For the return we as individuals and a nation receive. it is the biggest bargain offered anywhere in the world today. We ought to be proud of our Public Schools. (Even if they can't tell a good egg from a bad one -Sorry, I just couldn't resist that.)

A considerable program will be earried out in Rankin Schools next week with the public invited to attend. If you have children in school, there is no need to invite you-they'll see that you are on hand-on time. But if you do not have children in school, you are still invited and it would be well for you to attend.

Homemaking Class Gets Early Start in Experience

The homemaking classes under the direction of their teacher, Mrs. Jean Shafer, rang the school bell for nine young children to attend their play school in the homemaking department last week.

Wayne, Sheliah, and Junior McKenzie, sons and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. "Mack" McKenzie; David Hart, son of Mrs. Marita Hart; Kim and Angel Chesser, son and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wilber Chesser; Kathy Shipp, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Shipp; Debbie Hance, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Hance, and Larii Fitzhugh, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Fitzhugh, were on the play school roll.

Play school observation and participation offers realistic ways of teaching child development. Reading and class discussion are more meaningful when students see and do things related to these methods of learning. Participation in a play school helps youth to learn more quickly about children, personality development, the child's behavior, and how to get along with others.

Getting ready for a play school is a good group project which develops keen interest in learning. Working together to develop a good program for the children results in enthusiastic learning on the part of those involved.

The homemaking girls constructed a two-room house of cardboard boxes complete with red brick and smoke-ringed chimney. Several girls brought books and toys from home. Everyone was happy when refreshment time came. The Reverend R. L. Shannon of the First Baptist Church provided the play school with small chairs and table suited to the children's size. The finger paint and play dough was made by the homemaking girls. Here's the recipe they used.



Facts About Rankin Schools

The Rankin Public Schools employ thirty-six professional personnel, all degree holders, with seventeen holding master's degrees and nineteen having bachelor's degrees.

There are ten teachers in the elementary school, grade 1-4; nine teachers in junior high, grades 5-8; and thirteen teachers for grades 9-12.

The Rankin Schools employ a total of fifty-nine persons. The total current enrollment in the Rankin Schools is 504. There are 200 pupils in the elementary school, 175 in junior high, and 129 in high school.

217 students are transported daily by regular bus routes in the Rankin School System. The average bus route length is 130.5 miles daily. The combined daily mileage for all busses on all routes is 750 miles.

Facts About Texas Public Schools

Texas public schools enrolled 1,309,415 students and employed 50,330 teachers in 1948-49.

Texas Public Schools enrolled 2,282,000 students and employed 99,500 teachers in 1962-63.

By 1967, Texas will need 112,000 teachers for an anticipated student enrollment of 2,554.000.

Over 90 percent of the increase in scholastic population during the past 10 years occurred in 36 of Texas' 254 counties; over half of the increase occurred in 4 counties.

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
