Political activity stirred slightiy this week in Rankin as the balloting dates for three elections draw near. Several candidates got their local drives underway with some card-handing-out, two major candidates announced plans to politic in Rankin, a third made a call recently and a few posters began appearing on telephone poles and e.sewhere about town. Members of the Upton County Democratic Executive Committee met Monday at the courthouse and made arrangements for the printing of the First Primary Ballot. Samples of this ballot will be avalable at ahe News office next week and will be free for those who will call and p.ak them up.
But, despite the late date, little interest seems apparcant in the political scene thus far in Rankin.
abSEntee voting slow in school board race

Absentee voters were not ex actly standing in line at the Ran kin School Administration Build-

Ing this week to cast baLots As of Wednesday morning, the office reported that only two absentee votes had been cast. Deadline for absentee voting in the school election is Tuesday, March 31. Four candidates, Dr. J. D Gossett, Carl Shaffer Leslie McFadden and Billie Brown are contesting for the two seats up for balloting. Gossett and Shaffer are the encumbents.

This time of the year usually
brings the hose and rakes out brings the hose and rakes out
of the storage along with the pressure sprayer and rarden spray-
Because of the insect damage to the ornamental plants as weli as to the garden plants, most o kill these pests.
Following are some suggestions For use and storage of Agriculural chemica:s

## 1. ALWAYS

ore using sprays or durts. Note before opening the container
a Keep sprays and dusts
of the reach of children, pets and irresponsible people. They should be stored outside of the home, away from food and feed. and under lock an key.
3. ALWAYS store sprays and dusts in original containers and keep them tightly closed.
4. NEVER smoke while spraying or dusting.
5. Avoid inhaling sprays or dusts. When directed on the iabel, wear protective elothing and masks.
6. Do not spill sprays or dusts on skin or clothing. If they are silled. remove contammated
thoroughly
7. Wash hands and face and change clothing after spraying or dusting.
8. Cover food and water containers when treating around live taminate fish ponds.
