Both Democrats and Republicans to Vote--

It's Election Day Saturday; And Most of the Night

Saturday is the big day.

Polls will open at 8:00 a.m. in Upton County and voting will continue until 7:00 p.m. Both the Democrats and Republicans will have balloting places in this, the first primary.

Rankin Demos will vote at the Courthouse for Box 1, Rankin Park Building for Box 2, and the Phillips Plant Recreation Building for Box 3 in Midkiff.

All Republican votes for the Rankin-Midkiff area will be cast at the high school lobby in Rankin.

Judge at Box 1 will be E. C.

Higday with Mrs. Sam Holmes as assistant. Box 2 will have Norman Elrod as Judge and Mrs. C. E. Merritt as assistant. For Box 3, Mrs. R. R. Calcote will be the Judge and Mrs. Carl Miller, the assistant.

At the Republican box, Mrs. Sam Bean will be judge with Mrs. J. D. Gossett, assistant.

A Republican voting box and three Democrat boxes will be in operation in McCamey.

On the Absentee Canvassing Board for the Democrats will be C. G. Taylor, Floyd Fields, Royce Burnett and Kenneth Baacock.

Seventy-six absentee votes, all on Democratic ballots, had been cast as of Wednesday morning at the Clerk's Office. Tuesday, May 23 was the last day for this phase of the voting. Late mailings could change this figure slightly.

In addition to voting for several state races and the 16th Congressional race, Republicans will cast a preference vote for the 1964 Republican nominee for President. Listed will be Barry M. Goldwater of Arizona, Nelson Rockefeller of New York, Margaret Chase Smith of Maine and Harold Stassen of Pennsylvania.

All the excitement of the day will not, however, be confined to getting to the polls and voting. Beginning at 7:30 at the lot across from the First State Bank, the Rankin Lions Club will start posting election returns from the county. Despite the tv coverage of elections, which is primarily concerned with state-wide races, the local board has always been a popular after-election pastime since up-to-the-minute local results are shown.

In addition to the "horse race" results that may develop, the Lions will hold a cake walk on 8th Street. Here one may pass the time while waiting for more returns, win a cake, and help out the Lions financially, all at the same time.

If it's not raining too hard, Saturday promises to be an exciting day.

THE SCOOP by Scoop

IT'S HERE—

This is the election issue.

As has been my custom over the years, I will set out a few of my observations about some of the candidates. This is not to be construed as an effort by me on trying to tell you how to vote. You should vote as you doggone well please without any individual, group or party taking you by the nose and telling you to mark your ballot thus and so.

These are my observations. If they are of any benefit to you fine—if not, that's all right too.

It has been one of the less colorful political races in recent years. Of the liberal candidates, it has mostly been a contest to see who can promise the most Federal aid and who has been the longer supporter of LBJ. The conservatives have said little or nothing—apparently not sure to what extent LBJ's being president will sway the voters in the state. When all is said and done, you can't help getting the feeling that—regardless of who gets elected—it will still be Papa who pays.

You will note that I do not make any comment on local races. There are several reasons for this policy. First, I have no comments to make. If I did, I'd make them. Second, I believe that the voter has his mind made up in

local elections and; Third, making such comments is a mighty good way to get a pump knot on the ole noggin.

In the race for Governor, there are four running—two seriously. Don Yarborough is a much big liberal who has promised something for everybody, played up to first one group then another and would likely get no cooperation whatsoever out of the Texas Legislature—therefore, could not produce on any of his promises. John Connally has done a reasonably good job and does manage to get a few of his programs through the Legislature. If you only choice is Jack Crichton,

want to vote Republican, your For Lieutenant Governor, it is again my pleasure to recommend Preston Smith. I have known of him and voter for him ever since I cast my first ballot in 1946. His Democratic opponent is Albert Fuentes, a labor liberal of the far left. For the Republican side it will be Horace Houston. Whoever holds the Lieutenant Governor's seat is—in many instances—more powerful in actual political workings than any other man in Texas.

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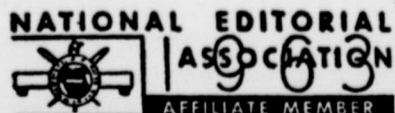

zero—as has ever set foot in Texas. Even the late John Kennedy apparently had little respect for the man. And yet, at one time, I believe he was an earnest, hard-working man who wanted to serve his state. Since that day, however, he has played footsie with any and all who could help him get and hold office. Having him for Texas Senator is about like having a man from Houston on the Upton County Commissioners' Court. McLendon has said little except that he wants to beat Yarborough. I don't trust radio men very far and this fellow has a whole string of stations—or has had.

For the Republicans, there are Jack Cox, George Bush, Milton V. Davis and Robert Morris. Cox has run himself out in Texas. Bush

might make a fair race.

For US Representative-at-Large the Demos offer four. Bob Looney and Dan Sullivan are on the liberal side, Bill Elkins I know nothing about and Joe Pool, the incumbent, has done a fair to poor job. Bill Hayes is the only one for the Republicans.

Then comes all the justices and associates of the various courts of which I, like most voters, never hear anything about the office seekers until election time. Only one candidate, Jack Pope of Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, Place No. 1, has had any recommendation. A fellow I consider to be pretty level-headed said he was all right and on the strength of this, he will get my nod.

For the Unexpired Term of Railroad Commissioner, it is Jim Langdon against Jesse Owens. A lot of us remember Jim when he lived in McCamey. I'm told by those who have reason to know that he is making a good commissioner. Owens is from the hot-bed of liberalism in Houston and would not give two hoots and a hollar about West Texas.

In most of these races, only one Republican is running.

In the 16th Congressional District, three are in the race with Malcolm McGregor having the

party nod despite being in about the same class as Ralph Yarborough on promising more for all of everything—free from the U. S. government. Dick White would most likely represent the majority of West Texans if elected. However, with the redistricting cause facing Texas, El Paso will get their own U. S. Representative after this two-year term and if either of the two men get this office, they will pull hard for re-election by favoring El Paso at every turn. The Democratic winner faces Ed Foreman in November.

My last comment will be on the race for State Senator from this district where Dorsey Hardeman is opposed by a woman. I have never been a big supporter of Hardeman but he did go to bat

for a bill that was of much benefit to Rankin Schools and for that reason, I believe we owe him consideration.

Now there they are. You will note that I have more or less stuck to the conservative candidates since that is my political leanings. If you want to go with the liberals, that's your business and all you have to do is vote for the ones I have rapped.

And, if it's any consolation to the liberals, I usually support the man who gets beat.

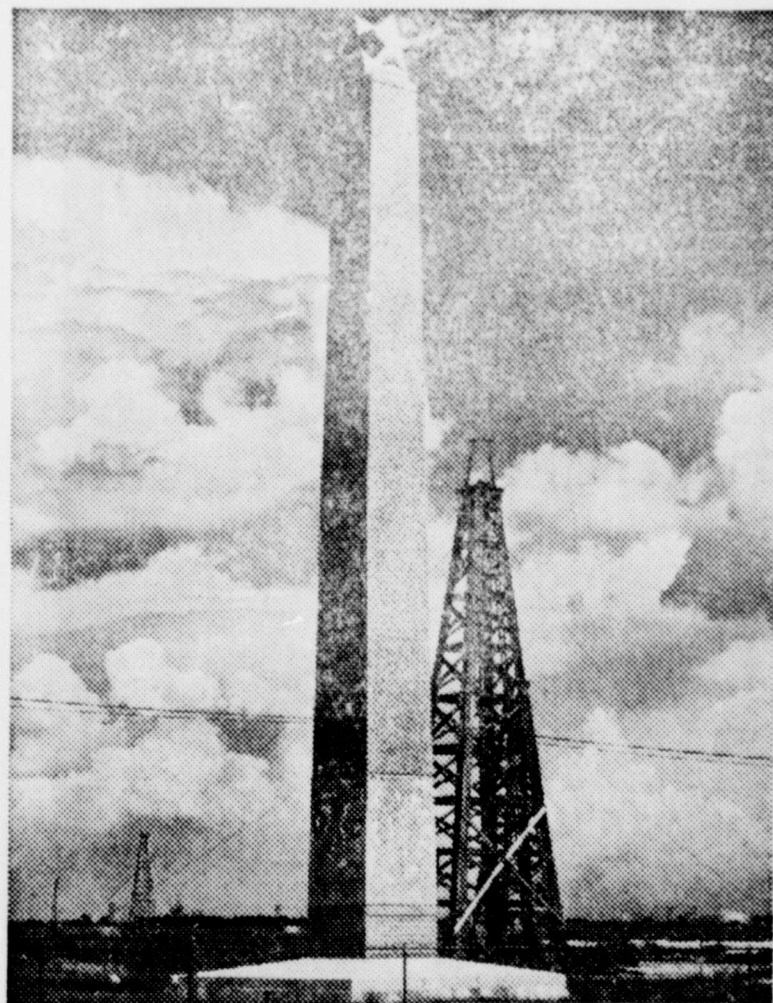
