There is an expense to everything that is productive and research will produce the means of putting cancer on the shelf as a has-

been killer — a shelf now occupier by such diseases as scarlet fever, typhoid, small pox, polio and many others.

There are many people alive today—and some of them here in Rankin—who would not have made it even ten years ago. The time is near.

Research is the answer.

Those who worked and most especially, those who gave, are litterally the troops in the front line of the battle.

Dr. John T.
