# Rankin's Water Supply Getting Thorough Test

As the Rankin area continued to enjoy the advantages of clear skies and warm sunshine-whatever advantages that would be to an area that has had less than 6 inches of mositure in the past 12 months—the water system supplying' the city was being taxed to its fullest capacity. It is estimated that Rankin proper is presently using water at the rate of about 2.5 million gallons per week. Due to the fact that two wells belonging to the city and

town are now in use 24-hours a day and have no metering systems, it is impossible to tell exactly how much they produce.

In addition to this water, the city purchases water from the county. The last quarter, this purchase amounted to 21 and a quarter million gallons, up about a million gallons. County water production, located on the Neal ranch about three miles east of Rankin, is also running at full capacity on a 24-hour basis and production is estimated at some 400,000 gallons of water daily.

High peak in usage comes in the week. Last Friday, all storage facilities had been drained and the entire system was operating from water in the mains and lines. On week-end, with a number of residents out of town, some businesses closed and school and county facilities shut down, the system will usually catch up and produce a surplus in the large storage tank near the Western Company. The water tower has not been used this summer since it is under repair. Another storage tank adjacent to the swimming pool park, is usually used for storage of water to be used in an emergency, such as a fire. However, since all the water that is being produced is used immediately, this "safety valve" has not been in reserve for the past several weeks.

Water production is said to be holding up reasonably well considering the hard pumping under which the wells are being operated. Some lessening of volume has been noted on all wells, however. In addition to having less water, the quality of that being produced has also fallen. Use of the old city wells, once taken out of production in favor of the better

quality water from the county area, add to the problem of keeping good water at all times.

Although the users of water in Rankin have experienced low pressure and water that sometimes looks a little like milk, they have never been completely without water. "But it's been a near thing," pointed out those responsible for production.

One solution—and one that has a fast reaction-would be for the area to receive a good general rain. Even a clowdy, cool day has been known to lessen the strain. However, this prospect, like most other solutions, looks rather dim. Most old timers will tell you not to expect rain in August-which no one really expected in Julyor June-or May.

Working on the asumption that Rankin will be able to get thru the summer, no plans have been considered here for rationing—as has been the case in many Texas communities this summer. Summer irrigation rates for water users in Rankin went into effect April 1 and will continue until October 1.

Let's all have another cool onewater, that is.




