

Although most fans will admit that the Red Devils will have to turn on the steam to defeat the visitors, all agree that Friday night, should be a whale of a ball game.



a few words about Friday night's football game with Big Lake. It may or not be necessary to remind ourselves of a few little items-but on the other hand, it won't do any harm.





# A BLOOD RELIGION?

It will do no good for the Church to preach a diluted Gospel of morality and goodness; the Gospel which Christ preached was one of personal salvation through faith in His redeeming blood.
