

still be more businesslike in this instance.

Amendment No. 2 on the ballot has to do more or less with procedures and it is one dear to my heart. Among other things, it would force the publication in a newspaper of any intention to get a law passed setting up a conservation or reclamation district in an area. Little districts, such as water districts, conservation districts, etc., have a way of going about their business and not keeping the public too well informed. They take in new land, add a few tax dollars, all cut and dried without any notice to the public A vote "For" this amendment would be a bit of protection to everyone and strange as it may seem, we need all the protection we can get from those

who have power to regulate our lives.

Amendment No. 3 is a medical care for the aged-complete with Federal aid. As I read it, this care would go to strictly needy individuals and for that reason it would undoubtedly be of benefit. Any such bill means more money and more money means you know what-taxes. Then, too is the question of whether you go for Federal aid. Personally, I do not understand why Texas can't foot the bill without Federal aid. It's all tax money but when you have to ship a dollar to Washington for distribution, it seems to have a way of only about 10c of it ever getting back. Why not let us pay it all right here in Texas?






