With Ozona Lions as Opponents --

Final Game of Season On Tap for Friday Night

Friday night will mark the
close of the 1964 football season
for the Rankin Red Devils. Op-
ponent for the night will be an
old and respected foe, the Ozona
Lions.
The Red Devils and the Lions
have met many times on the foot-
ball field in some thrilling games
with the Lions having a consid-
erable edge in the series, having
won over Rankin every time ex-
cept two. From 1953 until 1961,
Rankin was never able to crack

the Lions for a win. In one game,
the 1954 encounter won by Ozona
26-0, quarterback for the Lions
was Charles Hale, brother of the
Red Devil freshman halfback
Billy Wayne Hale. In the 1958
game, won 20-14 by Ozona, the
Red Devils walked all over the
Lions but still could not break
their jinx to win. In 1961, with
the help of a player many con-
sider the best in years for Rankin,
Jimmy Harris, the Red Devils did
down the Ozona squad. That de-
feat rather riled the Crocket
County lads for they came back
in 1962 to hand the Red Devils
one of their soundest trouncings
ever as they went down 51-14.
Last year, it was again Rankin
by a 27-12 mark.

And that brings up the question
at hand: can Rankin win over
Ozona two years in a row? Friday
night will provide the answer.

School Lets Contract To Local Firm For Track Curb, Surface

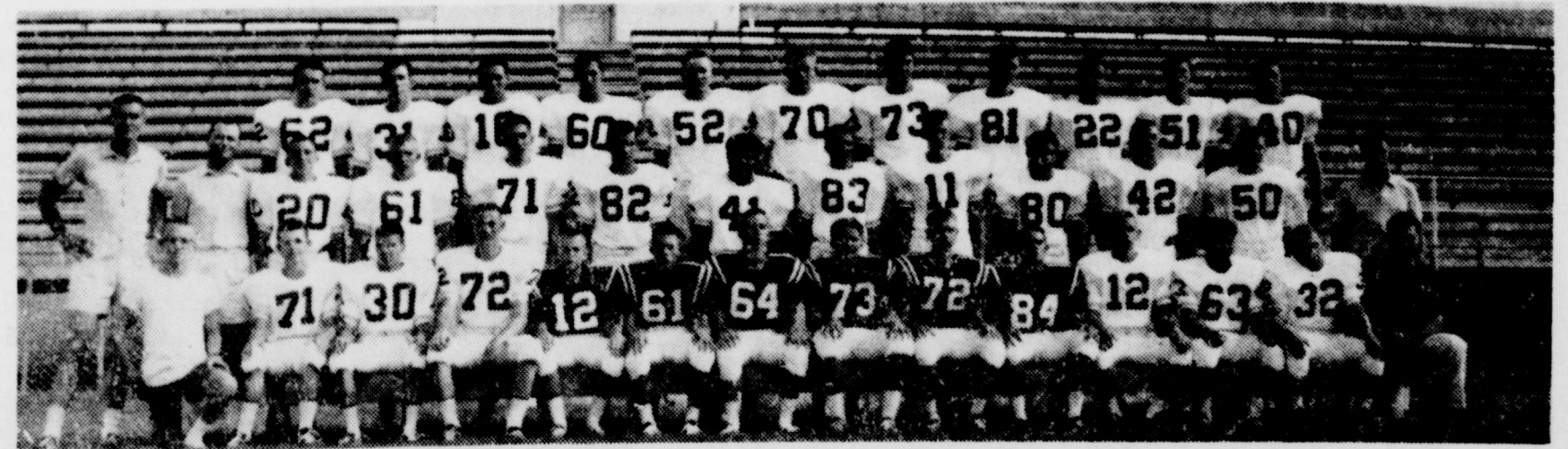
In its regular meeting last

the Board of Trustees of the
Rankin Independent School Dis-
trict accepted a bid for curbing
and surfacing the track facility.
The bid in the amount of \$13-
629.70 was submitted by Wheeler
and Workman Construction Co.
of Rankin.

Contractors plan to start work
on the track by November 23 and
60 working days was estimated
for completion of the job. The
Board also accepted with regrets
the resignation of Mrs. Clifford
Wilson, effective at the end of
this school semester, January 15,
1965. Mrs. Wilson is teaching a
third grade section this year.

MORE GAME POOP—

Although the strategy of the two clubs is still a highly guarded secret—with plays probably kept under lock and key down at the bank—a little additional information has leaked out concerning the Booster Club football game that will be played here Thursday night—if they can wind it up in one night.

From the information available, it looks like the Pink Panthers, coached by Box McDonald and "Brush Head" Copeand, have an inside track. In conversation with coach McDonald, it was learned that he and his assistant are putting considerable moral emphasis on the selection of their players. The Pink Panthers are also enforcing some rather stringent training rules. No time limit was placed on this fete of physical fitness, however.

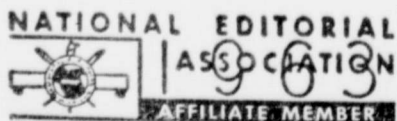

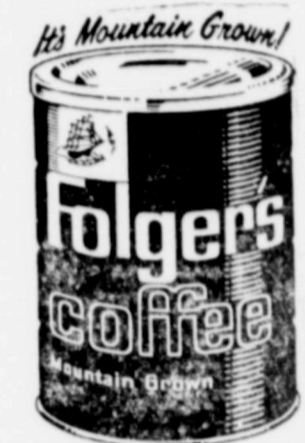

This is going to be a big year for apples and a big year for apple products. With an anticipated increase of many millions of bushels more than last year, there will be a good supply of canned apple sauce, apple slices and apple juice, lasting throughout the seasons.

Once you form the habit of always keeping a bottle of apple juice chilled in the refrigerator, you will consider at as much a staple as milk and other foods. The pure pasteurized juice of apples is the healthy refresher for the children and a not-too-sweet drink for grown-ups.

A little lemon or a combination of apple juice and canned grapefruit is a nice variation.

Shortcake out of season is short cake in season when it's an Apple Shortcake. Canned apple slices, sprinkled with brown sugar, cinnamon, a few drops of lemon juice makes a delicious filling. Lay apple slices on top the top layer, and if you wish, cover with whipped cream—or serve, as old fashioned shortcake is served, in a bowl with a pour of thick

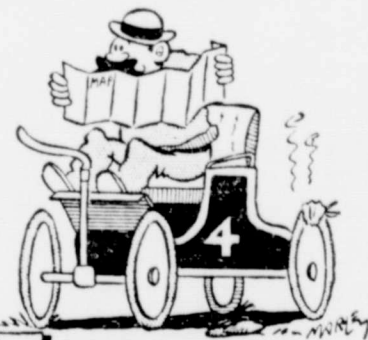
