Ten years ago you could have gotten pretty good odds that a man would never walk on the moon but I expect those odds have dropped considerably about now. It may well be that there are no large water deposits in Upton County but I wonder if we have really taken a good look in that matter. And then, there's no actual law of nature that says the deposits must be large. One thing we do appear to have is a generally even spread of water beneath the county in some quan. tity.
A few months ago the Commissioners Court turned down a proposal to participate in a water survey of the county with State of Texas. At that time appeared to me that that was a
wise move-and maybe it wasbut the question of water keeps cropping up and there is no indication that it will go away.
A thorough county-wide look into the water situation with a definite plan of making use of the information learned holds a good promise at this time of being of much benefit in the immediate future to McCamey and Rankin and the county as a whole.

## Leaflet Available on UPTON COUNTY TREASURER'S REPORT

Proper Deer Care

## BY W. M. (DUB) DAY County Agent, Upton County

With deer hunting season upon us, hunters may be interested in a new leaflet, "Fiefd Dressing a Deer", now available at the county agent's office.
Since quality vension depends primarily on how the deer is handled from the time of the kill until it is placed in the reezer, field dressing is important.
Leaflet L-634 gives one method of field dressing and skinning of a deer. However, any method re sulting in a clean, well-bled carcass is satisfactory. Unpleasant experiences with venison usually result from lack of care before the meat reaches the kitchen.
Information in the leaflet has been provided by Wallace Klussmann, Extension wildlife conservation specialist, and by the Texas Game and Fish Commission.
Another publication that should be of interest to hunters and houswives during the hunting season is Extension Bulletin B987, "Wild Game Care and Cooking." It offers many surgestions for preparing delicious dishes of venison as well as other wild game meats.
This bulletin is also available at my office.
