Check for \$3,121.92

Court Pays Back Salary To McCamey J. P.


A question that has been before the Commissioners' Court of Upton County for a number of years was resolved this week with the issuing of a check to Mr. Joe Hendrickson. McCamey Justice of the Peace, for \$3,121.92 in payment of back salary. Total due Hendrickson was \$4.000 but salary already paid plus withholding

by the J. P. to the above figure. On September 1, 1961, the Commissioners Court voted to reduce Hendrickson salary from \$250 per month to \$1.00 per month. This arrangement was followed through December 31, 1962 or for sixteen months. It was for this period of time that the payment covered

 The decision to pay up the back salary due Hendrickson was made Monday by the court following re-



ceipt of on opinion from Paul Mc-Collum of the law firm of Shafer, Gilliland, Davis, Burton and McCollum of Odessa. The opinion said in part:

"I would respectfully invite yous attention to Article 3912e, Section 15, V.A.S.S., the language of this Section being as follows:

... in the event such Court passes such order they shall pay to each of said District and County officers ... not less than the total sum earned as compensation by said officer in his said official capacity ...

Thus the action of the Honorable Commissioners Court reducing the salary to \$1.00 per month exceeded the scope of the authority of the Commissioners Court and was according to the statute above quoted contrary to the law and thus an illegal act.


The jurisdiction of the Commissioners Court over the County business is not general and all inclusive, but is limited to matters and powers specifically governed by the Constitution and by Statute . . . and when an order of a Commissioners Court conflicts with a legislative act the order must give way and is thus void . . .

The act of the Honorable Commissioners Court in the instant case being void was of no force and effect and Justice Hendrickson is entitled to receive his salary as set by the Commissioners Court initially for each of those ensuing months that he did not draw a regular salary.

Upton County pays its officers on a salary as opposed to a fee system and Justice Hendrickson should have been on a salary for the years ensuing the date of the order reducing his salary Such salary should have been identical to that that he had been drawing prior to the date of the void order....."

The opinion was rendered to the court by the Odessa law firm at the request of Hendrickson and was submitted to County Attorney John A. Menefee. The County Attorney agreed with the findings as set forth in the opinion. Hendrickson had long maintained that he was due the regular salary and had employed the assistance of the legal firm to verify his contentions to the Commissioners Court.

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Adios to the Screw-Worm Fly; He Goes South of the Border

None of the states in the fivestate eradication area reported screwworm infestations last week, chalking up the first "zero" week since September 13-19. Stockmen and eradication authorities hope this signals the end of screwworm fly activity for 1964.

In fact, if eradicators have their way, the last screwworm case for the year has alredy been recorded (November 28, Refugio County) and safeguards currently being injected will protect the Southwest from becoming reinfested next spring.

As all outbreaks in Texas received final spray and sterile f.y. treatment and no additional i. festations are located, sterile f will be withdrawn and dispersed along the eastern and western coasts of Mexico where native flies can survive the year-round. Officials anticipate that within a month or so, practically all the sterile flies being produced at the Mission plant will be dropped to

the south of the international border. At the present time, only South Texas and Hidalgo County, New Mexico, and Cochise County, Arizona, are being routinely airdropped. These grid releases will be suspended at the earliest possible date. Adjustments will also be made to the fly drop in northern Mexico to insure that sterile flies are dispersed only where native populations can live during the winter and serve as a threat to the United States.

Authorities hope to be able to order a cutback in production soon to conserve funds that will be needed more desperately next spring and to eliminate production and release of flies that are not absolutely necessary at this time.

The elusive screwworm fly could have some plans of its own, however, that would throw a "monkey-wrench" into the eradication plans and hopes. If isolated outbreaks continue to pop up in Texas, indicating either that the flies are able to withstand winter

temperatures or that there is a leak in the barrier zone, campaign workers may not be able to withdraw their forces from the U.S. side and consequently could not go as deep into Mexico as the had planned. The result of th' would be that native flies would be permitted to remain unmolested in closer proximity to the United States and the chances of the Southwest experienceing a screwworm infestation in 1965 would be increased.

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
