Graduation Exercises Commence Sunday

With the end of another school term at hand, graduation exercises at Rankin High School will commence Sunday night with the Baccalaureate Service. Time will be at 8:00 p.m. in the high school auditorium. Bringing the sermon will be Rev. R. L. Shannon, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Rankin. Other ministers on the program will be Jim Hance of the Northside Church of Christ who will give the Invocation, and Rev. Billy J. White of Rankin Methodist Church who will render the Benediction. Mrs. D. E. Bennett will be at the piano for the professional and recessional.

The big night, for the seniors, will come Wednesday, May 19. Commencement will be at 8:00 p.m. in the high school auditorium.

Among those who will have a part on the program are the salutatorian, Sandra Maxwell, and the valedictorian, Wendyl Wallace. Mrs. A. C. Copeland will award honors and Superintendent B. J. Hood will present diplomas.

Following the ceremonies, there will be a reception in the home-making department for the seniors, their parents and friends.

The class of '65 will be among one of the largest to graduate in recent years from Rankin High, listing twenty-eight members. It is interesting to note that this class, beginning school in 1963 in

the first grade in Rankin, numbered 81 students. Through drop-outs, moves, etc., it's ranks have been thinned to the present group and only about half of these were in the original first grade.

School Board Votes Change In Graduatoin Requirements

At its reguar meeting on Thursday, May 6, the board of trustees of the Rankin Independent School District, with Billie S. Brown serving as acting president in the absence of the president and the vice-president, set the first meeting of the board of equalization for May 12, 1965, at 7:00 p.m. in the school administration building. This sessiop is not a public hearing but it to be a preliminary e-

qualizing of values.

The First State Bank of Rankin, Texas, was selected as the school district's depository bank for the fiscal years of 1965-1966 and 1966-1967. The board also authorized the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas and the Texas Bank and Trust Company of Dallas to release \$125,000 of securities to the First State Bank of Rankin.

In further business the resignation of Mrs. Zollie M. (Rawlins) Childers was accepted, effective May 3, 1965.

A 1 percent discount on school taxes for the 1965 fiscal year was voted if such taxes were paid during the month of September.

A. C. Copeland, Rankin High School principal, appeared before the group to discuss a proposal developed by the high school faculty and the administration to change the high school schedule from a seven period day to six periods. The present seven period schedule has been in effect for three years and the faculty felt that during this time students had perhaps been exposed to a broadened curriculum but that depth in the subject matter had been slighted.

In another change of procedure in high school scheduling, P. E. requirements would be reduced from the present four credits required in P. E. to two credits required and the other two credits being electives if a student so desires.

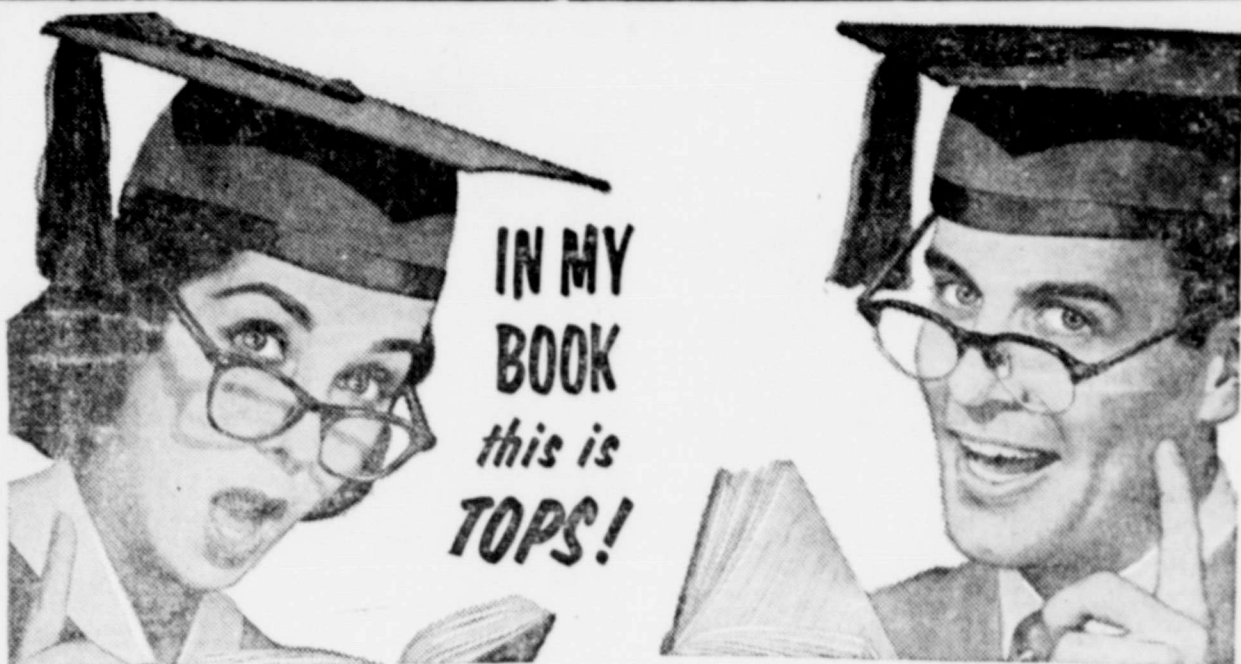

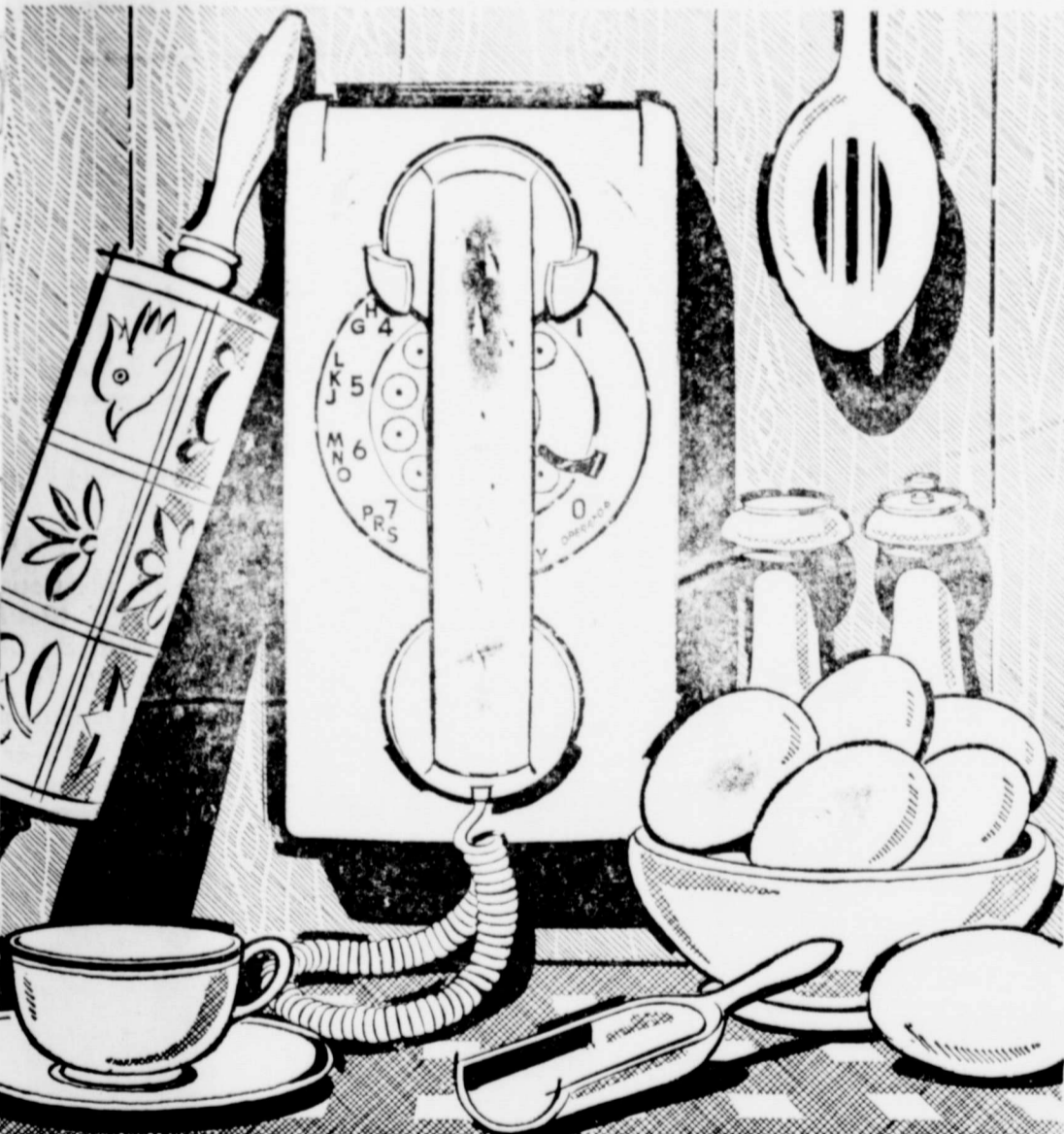
