School Board Votes Change In Graduatoin Requirements

At its reguar meeting on Thurs. day, May 6, the board of trustees of the Rankin Independent School District, with Billie S. Brown serving as acting president in the absence of the president and the in-president, set the first meetof the board of equalization for May 12, 1965, at 7:00 p.m. in the school administration building. This session is not a public hearing but it to be a preliminary e-

The First State Bank of Rankin, Texas, was selected as the school district's depository bank for the fiscal years of 1965.1966 and 1966-1967. The board also authorized the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas and the Texas Bank and Trust Company of Dallas to release \$125,000 of securities to the First State Bank of Rankin.

In further business the resignation of Mrs. Zollie M. (Rawlins) Childers was accepted, effective May 3, 1965.

A 1 percent discount on school taxes for the 1965 fiscal year was voted if such taxes were paid during the month of September.

A. C. Copeland, Rankin High School principal, appeared before the group to discuss a proposal developed by the high school faculty and the administration to change the high school schedule from a seven period day to six periods. The present seven period schedule has been in effect for three years and the faculty felt that during this time students had perhaps been exposed to a broadened curriculum but that depth in the subject matter had been slighted.

In another change of procedure in high school scheduling, P. E. requirements would be reduced from the present four credits required in P. E. to two credits required and the other two credits being electives if a student so

On any day out on the highway we see the patrolmen. In town, we see still more officers. Up. ton County has about twelve officers. On any given crime, any number of police can be summonsed in a very few minutes.

The law officer is no longer a loaner. He has comrads-in-arms. Lots of them. And the average American never stops to think that his help and support might be needed.

I don't know any answers for Mr. Hoover's plea for support other than to say that the law officer needs the public support as much as he ever did and perhaps more. It is not his fault that increased population necesitates more and more officers until-on appearance-it looks like there is a "cop" on every corner. Actually, I suspect that there i fewer policemen per 1,000 people than there used to be.

On the highways there is the slogan: "Drive carefully. The life roler, we feel a tightening sensation behind the belt buckle and want to yell to everyone that the ball took a bad hop. When the bold hope in the form of our beloved offspring looks like he's trying to catch a butterfly as he reaches for one five feet outside and high, we always feel like turning to someone and saying, "Well, at least he went down swinging."

We're all human. The kids, the managers, we parents. If we do not forget that Little League is a game of fun for the kids, we should all have an enjoyable sea-

And above all else, let's not be at war with one another. Kids have a hard time understanding such actions when all they want to do is play baseball-win, lose or draw.

THE OFFICER-

About once a month all the newspapers get a letter from the Nation's head policeman, J. Edgar Hoover of the FBI. In almost all of them he asks for support of law and order and particularly of the men who are charged with its enforcement—the law officer. It is said that a police officer is killed in action in American on an average of one each four days and that there are 16,793 casual. ties in the U.S. each year in the ranks of enforcement officers.


I know of no one-not even the crooks-who does not respect Mr. Hoover and his judgment and when he says that there is a trend in the U.S. of the citizens turning their backs on crime and support for the law officer, I for one, believe he is right. I believe people have changed their outlook toward officers of the law. I do not believe that-if such is true - it is the fault of anyone. It's simply the situation as it exists.

Back a good many years ago they only sent out one Texas Ranger for each riot. One man against all the rest. You had to admire a man like that. Not so long ago, about the only law officer most of us ever came in contact with was the sheriff and that was usually in the form of

a visit. In the big towns, a policeman walked his beat and carried

In those days-not so long agothe law enforcer was more or less you save may be your own." In a very similar vein, the same might be true in lending your support to the law officer and to better respect of law enforcement.
