## FBC Vacation Bible School Slated in Rankin June 14-18

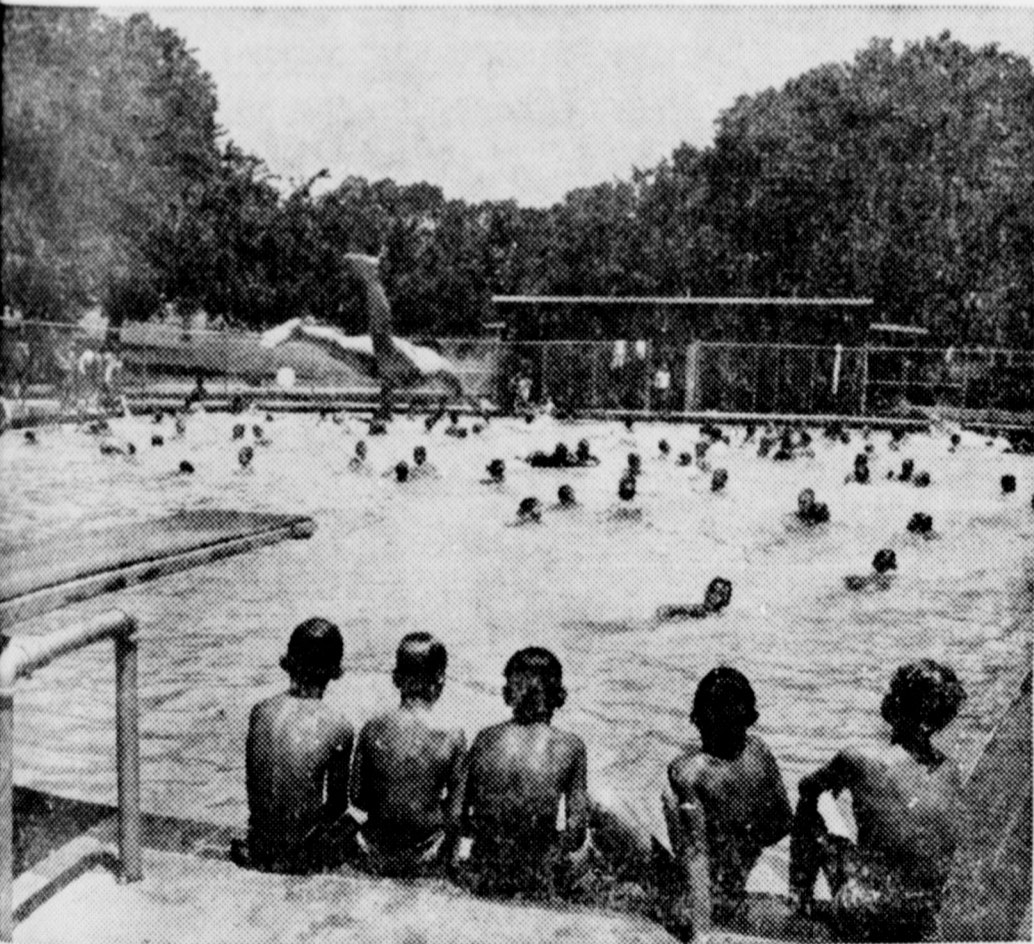

# School Budget Hearing Will Be Held June 1

Next Tuesday, June 1, a budget hearing will be held at the High School Auditorium to take a look at the proposed 1965-1966 budget for Rankin Independent School District. The public is invited to attend and to ask any questions they might have concerning the expenditures that will be proposed. Time will be at 8:00 p.m.

This meeting is usually well attended by the oil company tax representatives and never by more than a half dozen local taxpayers. Last year, there was only one local taxpayer, aside from the school board members themselves and school personnel, on hand to hear the financial plans of the school explained.

Included in this budget will be the school plans for paying their share of the increased teacher-pay raise recently enacted by the state legislature. Despite this increase, school authorities say they

are confident that a tax rate cut will be made this next year in the school taxes. The exact amount of this cut cannot be determined until all tax matters are worked out in the budget hearings and equalization meetings.

On June 2, the Board of Equalization will meet. At this meeting primary concern will be the reaching of an agreement with the oil and gas, utilities and industrial tax payers. A later meeting will be held for local taxpayers at which time those who have rendered their property and who have had changes made in this rendition by the Board of Equalization, will be so notified in writing.

If a tax payer has rendered his property for taxation and is not notified by the Board of Equalization of any change in his rendition, he can assume that it has been accepted by the board at the rendition figure.

On the same nights, the Cardinals boosted their stock in the standings at the expense of the Giants, winning both the Friday and Saturday night games. This leaves the Dodgers at 5½-won and ½-loss; the Yankees 2½-won and 3½-lost and the Cardinals and the Giants at 2-4 records.

Back in 1860.61, the Pony Express, extending from St. Joseph, Mo., to Sacramento, Calif., set a record for mail delivery by covering the 1960 miles in 10 days. That record stood for a good many years but today the some trip can be made in about three hours and they tell us that in the future, mail rockets will shoot from coast to coast in less than an hour.

All of which proves that the post office department can set a few records of their own.

One such record must undoubtedly be that of taking from Wednesday until Saturday to get a newspaper from Rankin to subscribers living near Midkiff, a distance of 35-40 miles. Now there's a record I'd like to see somebody top—even that turtle that won the rabbit handicap back in the fairy tale days.

The Pony Express would have hung its head in shame had a situation such as this existed in 1860. But I guess that's about par for the course. The Postal Department hasn't had but 105 years to come up with anything in the way of improvements for mail delivery out here in the sticks.

Winners from 30 judging and team demonstration contests will be named Wednesday, June 2, and honored at the final banquet that evening. A new division, Quarter Horse Judging, has been added this year. Those participating in the contests have already won county and district honors and have been training for many weeks.

To be eligible to participate in the state finals, the team or individual must have ranked first or second in the district eliminations. Competition will be stiff, since more than 1,300 individual 4-H Club members will participate. Many will be trying for a chance to represent Texas in the national finals later in the year.

The second annual 4-H Career Opportunity Fair will open Wednesday at 1:30 P.M. It will include exhibits of career choices offered through Texas A&M.

4-H Club work is conducted in the counties under the supervision of the county Extension agents with assistance from local voluntary leaders and friends of 4-H. 4-H'ers have been visiting the A&M campus annually for more than half a century.

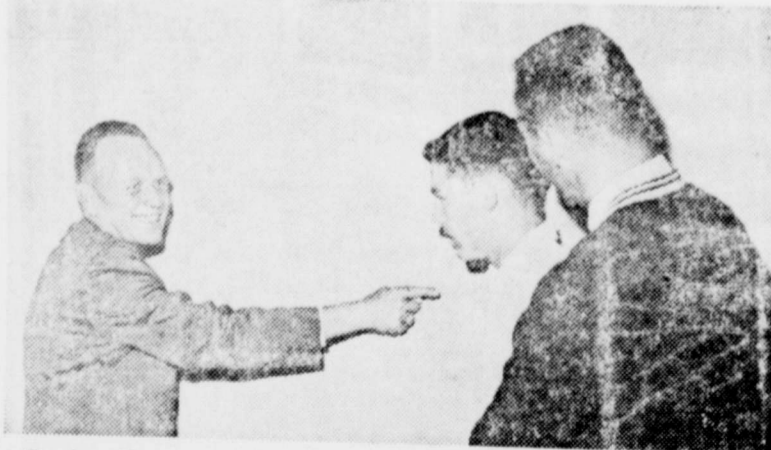

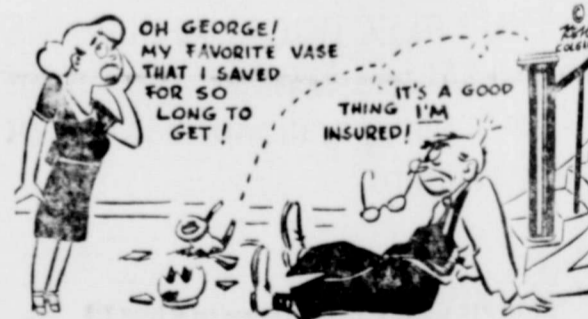
