TO HELP IN CLEANUP --

Upton Work Crew to Sanderson This Friday

Sheriff H. E. "Gene" Eckols said this week that volunteers for clean-up work in Sanderson will be needed Friday. Anyone who is willing to make the trip and to donate a days work to the project is asked to be on hand at the Upton County Courthouse

in Rankin at 5:30 a.m. Friday. Transportation to and from the Sanderson area will be available for the workers. Each individual should bring a lunch and some or similar item. The crew of volunteers will return to Rankin at about 7:00-7:30 p.m. Friday.

In a meeting held last Monday, members of Rankin School Board voted to have the school supply a school bus to transport the clean-up crew from Upton County to Sanderson and back on Friday, June 25.

A large number of people in West Texas have offered assistance in cleaning up Sanderson following the June 11 flash flood that has taken 20 known dead. In an effort to have some sort of organization and coordination to the clean-up work, Sanderson officials have assigned various days of the week to some seven of their neighboring counties. The

one day, Friday, June 25, will be the only day Upton County residents will be asked to assist in the work.

There has been no limit set on the number of workers who can make the trip. Anyone having any further questions on the matter should contact Sheriff Eckols who will head the Upton County delegatom.

FUNNY MONEY—

Sometime soon, probably in 1966, we folk in the U. S. A. are going to start using money without any silver in it. The supply of silver is said to be running out and its use in coins is no longer practical. The new coins will have very little if any silver. Otherwise they will look much like the ones now in use and will carry the same design with—perhaps—one very small exception. They may not have a mint mark. This is a very small letter "D" on the coins manufactured at the Mint in Denver. The ones made in the Mint in Philadelphia have never been marked except a series of Jefferson Nickels minted during World War II.

And already there are those who have gone to the crying wall about the new coins. They did the same thing when gold coins were taken out of circulation.

It is their contention that the public will lose confidence in our money and that it will be of no value because it does not

contain a semi-precious metal. These folk are forecasting some sort of panic when the new money appears.

Nuts. We've been using money that was backed by neither gold nor silver for about a hundred years or so. The one cent penny and the present day nickel have never had any silver content except for the above mention war time 5-cent pieces which contained 35 percent silver. And if anyone ever lacked faith in these two coins, I never heard of it. You can buy a battle ship with either if you can get enough of them together.

To most of us it doesn't make much difference what it is in a coin or what backs a \$1 bill for that matter. What we're interested in mostly is how to get our hands on enough of them to enjoy what we consider a decent living.

About the only panic that will be seen will be that of folk trying.

Mrs. Moore left for Spur Mon-

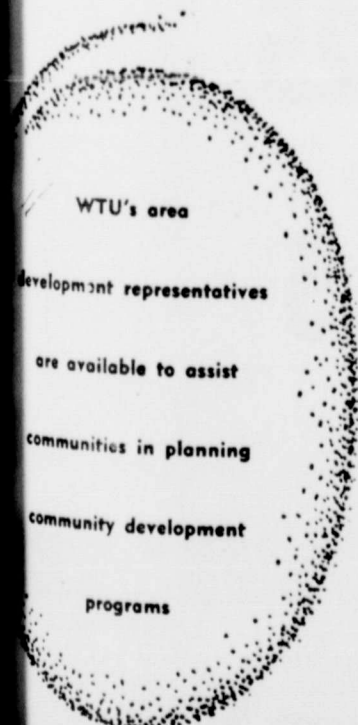
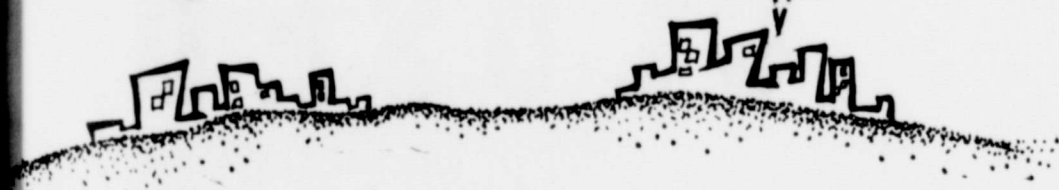
day morning at about 2:00 a.m. and was followed by her husband, Upton County Judge Allen Moore, later in the morning.

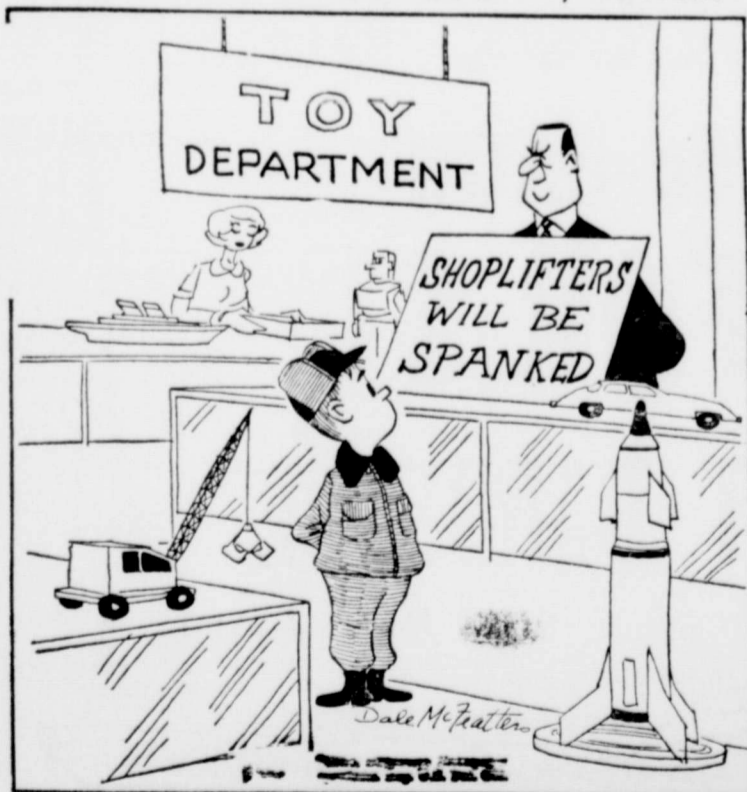

Planning for Diamond Jubilee

of Sonora and Sutton County will turn the calendar years August 15-21 to observe the Diamond

Anniversary of this West Texas community whose history of outlawry is as colorful as any in the West.

Old-fashioned fun and general hulla-balloo will be the theme of the six-day celebration which will feature town-wide decoration, costume and beard contests, shoot-outs and other activities during the week.

The Diamond Jubilee celebration will begin Sunday afternoon, August 15, with an old-time bask-

et dinner, preaching and hymn-singing on the lawn of the Sutton County courthouse. Dr. Andrew Edington, president of Schreiner Institute, Kerrville, will preach the sermon.

The Jubilee Parade, with bands, wagons, antique cars and other entries, will be held on Saturday morning and is to be followed by a barbecue. A pageant depicting the history of the town and the county will be presented Friday and Saturday nights at the Son-

ora Park. Street dancing is set for Saturday night with floor shows at intermissions.

Sonora, once the hang-out of such Western badmen as Will Carver, Black Jack Ketcham, Sam Ketcham, Kid Curry, King Fisher and John Wesley Hardin, was founded in 1890 by the late Charles F. Adams shortly after the creation of Sutton County from a portion of Crockett County. The area was settled by sheepmen and is now one of the

largest wool and mohair producing counties in Texas.

Sonora is the burial place of Will Carver, member of the notorious Hole-in-the-Wall Gang also known as the Wild Bunch from Robbers' Roost. Carver was killed in downtown Sonora April 2, 1901 in a gun battle with then Sutton County Sheriff E. S. (Lije) Briant, one of West Texas, most famed law enforcement officials. The stone on Carver's grave in Sonora Cemetery bears only the date of his death.

Among celebrities receiving invitations to be present during the Jubilee are President Lyndon B. Johnson, Governor John Connally, Congressman O. C. Fisher, State Senator Dorsey B. Hardeman and former resident Dan Blocker.

Rankin Teachers at UT Workshop
