Hospital Board Ponders Calling For Bond Election

ED.: The following report was published last week in the McCamey News,

Members of the McCamey Hospital Board met in regular session last Thursday (Aug. 5) and considered the possibility of asking Upton County Commissioners Court to call a bond election for the construction of a new hospital for McCamey.

At a recent meeting, Board members approved plans for a new twenty nine bed hospital for McCamey. The proposed site of the new hospital is on Upton County land just north of the rodeo grounds. Board members propose to go before Upton County Commissioners Court sometime in the near future and ask the Court to call a special bond election. Just when the Board goes before the Court depends on the Rankin Hospita, Board.

High School Registration Commences Next Monday

Registration for the coming school year for grades 9-12 will begin August 23 and continue through August 25, according to High School Principal A. C. Copeland. Students will register each day between the hours of 8:30 a.m. til 4:30 p.m. at the high school

At Thursday night's meeting of the McCamey Hospital Board, a wait and see policy was adopted for the present time. The Board members indicated they would make a decision not later than next month.

FINANCIAL CONDITION

Disbursements for the McCamey Hospital during the month of July amounted to \$7,435.45, practically the same as the previous month. Occupancy load for July was 42 per cent, up six per cent over June, and the operating deficit for July was down some \$1300 over the previous month. Records show there were 22 admissions during July, accounting for 157 hospital days. Lab and x-ray charges for the month were almost double the previous month.



These are things you have to be trained to do and when the Nes trains himself he will get the jobs-as he already is getting

them. Sadly, there's never much demand for a first-class rioter. The pay is small, the hours long and the results sometimes killing

It is their theme that the situation in which the Negro finds himself is not his fault but is the result of his having been a slave. Nuts. Lots of Negros were never slaves. Lots of other peoples have

I, personally, always like to point to our Latins as the type of people who know what it takes to get ahead. A little over 100 years ago the word "Gringo" and

"Greezer" were terms used by two peoples who had or where in the process of fighting two wars. They were dirty little wars with no holds barred They caused far more grief, suffering and hantred than their size would apparently justify. And yet, today the Latin people-not as a whole but as individuals just as the Negro or any one else will have to dohave worked their way up and into the American way of life to the point that many hold high office. Many are leaders and their counsel are sought after by people of all races. Give the Latin an opoprtunity and he, perhaps more than anyone else, will make the most of it. Some of his people are still far down the economic and social ladder and so are some of all of us but most of us-and this includes many fine Negro people-look up with a hope and an effort.

Services rieid Friday For John Christy

Rev. R. L. Shannon officiated at the funeral services of longtime West Texan John Christy last Friday at the First Baptist Church in Rankin. Christy pass. ed away in the Ruidosa, New Mexico Hospital on Wednesday, August 11. He was 84 years old and had been seriously ill for the past several months.

Christy was born February 16, 1881 at San Saba. He came to West Texas in 1901 and began work on the Soper Ranch near Big Lake. He helped organize Reagan County and served as the first sheriff when the county seat was moved from Styles to Big Lake in 1925.

He was an outstanding cowboy and worked on a number of Ranches in West Texas before buying his own. He was once of-

Mr. Christy was a member of the Odd Fellow Lodge which he joined many years ago in Styles. He was also a member of the Rankin Baptist Church and contributed regularly to its program as well as to practically all worthwhile local projects.



HINTS for the HOMEMAKER

FREEZE NOW-PRESERVE LATER

Many homemakers are so busy during the summer months with special trips, vacations, and activities for family members that it's difficult to find enough time to make preserves, relishes, and marmalade in huge lots.

Try freezing the ingredients now, and spread out the work of preserving the food later.

There's a U. S. Department of Agriculture publication called "Home Freezing of Fruits and Vegetables" to help you get off to a good start. Included are ideas on how to prepare and pack fruits and vegetables for freezing, the approximate amount of frozen fruits and vegetables you can ex. pect from specific amounts of fresh produce, and other information designed to help you turn out a good frozen product.

If you plan to make preserves rater on from frozen fruit, here a tip for you. Food specialist say the fruit either should be frozen unsweetened or the exact amount of sugar used should be noted and subtracted from that called for in the recipe when you make preserves.

You may receive a free copy of the bulletin by asking for HG.10, "Home Freezing of Fruits and Vegetables," from my office.

Grass is Business for the Ranch Man

BY W. M. (DUB) DAY County Agent, Upton County

Ranchers are actually in the "grass business," and livestock are the saleable byproducts.

With this in mind, ranchers should develop a grazing program that efficiently utilizes native grasses and produces the most pounds of beef, lamb, wool and mohair per acre -- with less emphasis on number of head grazed.

To be effective with this program producers must have the same familiarity with ranges and grasses that they have with type and quality of livestock. They should know the plants growing on their pastureland, forage value of each, the quantity required to maintain one head of livestock and amount of plant cover to leave after grazing to keep the range in good state of produc. tion.

Research reveals that 1500 to 2000 pounds of forage per month is needed to maintain ane animal unit. This equals to 5 grown sheep. The average 1000 pound cow requires two and one-half to three percent of her body weight of dry plant material per day for maintenance.

This means she consumes about 750 to 900 pounds of forage per month wit hthe remainder used in trampling, deterioration, maintenance of grass plants and inf.uencing deeper moisture pene-

If a producer has to buy sup-

plemental feed to maintain his livestock during growing seasons with normal rainfall, there is either an excess of unpalatable and unproductive plants or too many animals grazing the area.

Grass on a moderately used

range should appear patchy and uneven at the end of the grazing season. Stubble height should range from four to seven inches for bunchgrasses to one to two inches for sod grass.

Even with a good pasture prog. ram, ranchers need to supply protein supplement during winter months. Grasses have highest crude protein content during the early growth stages and decrease in nutritive value as they reach maturity. Dry winter grass should be used for hay with a protein suppliment to produce a balanced

TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLU-TION NO. 57 proposing an Amendment to Section 1-a of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding to said Section as pres-ently written, the following provisions: requiring automatic retirement of certain District and Appellate Judges at age seventy-five (75) or such ier age, not under seventy (70), as may be provided by creating a State Judicial Qualifications Commission and roviding for its composition and the qualifications, methods of selection and terms of office of its members; defining the functions and procedures of said Commission, including the duty to investigate, and hold hearings in respect of, disability and misconduct of District and Appellate Judges and to make recommendations to the Supreme Court of Texas for involuntary retirement removal of such Judges; empowering the Supreme Court of Texas, in its discretion, to retire such Judges for disability and to remove them for misconduct, upon recom-mendation of the aforesaid Commission and consideration of the record made before it; defining misconduct for which said Judges may be so removed; providing that the proceedings of said Commision shall be confidential until filed in the Supreme Court with recommendation for retirement or removal; and providing that the removal provisions hereby established shall be alternative to and cumulative of those provided elsewhere in the Constitution. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE

STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 1-a of Article V of the Constitu-tion of the State of Texas be amended so that said Section shall hereafter read as fol-

lows: "Section 1-a. (1) Subject to the further provisions of this Section, the Legislature shall provide for the retirement and compensation of Justices and Judges of the Appellate Courts and District and Criminal District Courts on account of length of service, age and disability, and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed. The office of every such Justice and Judge shall become vacant when the incumbent reaches the age of seventyfive (75) years or such earlier age, not less than seventy (70) years, as the Legislature may prescribe; but, in the case

PROPOSED CONSTITU- him from serving the remainplicable to him before his period or periods of judicial service shall have reached a total of ten (10) years.

"(2) There is hereby created the State Judicial Qualifications Commission, to consist of nine (9) members, to wit: (i) two (2) Justices of Courts of Civil Appeals; (ii) two (2) District Judges; (iii) two (2) members of the State Bar, who have respectively practiced as such for over ten (10) consecutive years next preceding their selection; (iiii) three citizens, at least thirty (30) years of age, not licensed to practice law nor holding any salaried public office or employment; provided that no person shall be or remain a member of the Commission, who does not maintain physical residence within this State, or who resides in, or holds a judgeship within or for, same Supreme Judicial District as another member of the Commission, or who shall have ceased to retain the qualifications above specified for his respective class of membership. Commissioners of classes (i) and (ii) above shall be chosen by the Supreme Court with advice and consent of the Senate, those of class (iii) by the Board of Direc-tors of the State Bar under regulations to be prescribed the Supreme Court with advice and consent of the Senate, and those of class (iiii) by appointment of the Governor with advice and consent of the Senate.

"(3) The regular term of office of Commissioners shall be six (6) years; but the initial members of each of classes (i), (ii) and (iii) shall respectively be chosen for terms of four (4) and six (6) years, and the initial members of class (iiii) for respective terms of two (2), four (4) and six (6) years. Interim vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as vacancies due to expira-tion of a full term, but only for the unexpired portion of the term in question. Com-missioners may succeed them-selves in office only if having served less than three (3) consecutive years.

"(4) Commissioners shall receive no compensation for their services as such. The Legislature shall provide for the payment of the necessary expense for the operation of the Commission.

Its orders for the attendance or testimony of witses or for the production of documents at any hearing or investigation shall be enforceable by contempt proceedings in the District Court.

"(8) The Commission may,

after such investigation as it deems necessary, order a hearing to be held before it concerning the removal or retirement of a Justice or Judge, or it may in its discretion request the Supreme Court to appoint an active or retired District Judge or Justice of a Court of Civil Appeals as a Master to hear and take evidence in any such matter, and to report thereon to the Commission. If, after hearing, or after considering the record and report of a Master, the Commission finds good cause therefore, it shall recommend to the Supreme Court the removal or retirement, as the case may be, of the Justice or Judge in question and shall thereupon file with the Clerk of the Supreme Court the entire record before the Commission.

"(9) The Supreme Court shall review the record of the proceedings on the law and facts and in its discretion may, for good cause shown, permit the introduction of additional evidence and shall order removal or retirement, as it finds just and proper, or wholly reject the recom-mendation. Upon an order for involuntary retirement for disability or an order for removal, the office in question shall become vacant. The rights of an incumbent so retired to retirement benefits shall be the same as if his retirement had been volun-
