Members of the McCamey Hospital Board met in regular session last Thursday (Aug. 5) and considered the possibility of asking Upton County Commissioners Court to call a bond election for the construction of a new hospital for McCamey.

At a recent meeting, Board members approved plans for a new twenty-nine bed hospital for McCamey. The proposed site of the new hospital is on Upton County land just north of the rodeo grounds. Board members propose to go before Upton County Commissioners Court sometime in the near future and ask the Court to call a special bond election. Just when the Board goes before the Court depends on the Rankin Hospital Board.

High School Registration Commences Next Monday

Registration for the coming school year for grades 9-12 will begin August 23 and continue through August 25, according to High School Principal A. C. Copeland. Students will register each day between the hours of 8:30 a. m. til 4:30 p.m. at the high school

FINANCIAL CONDITION

Disbursements for the McCamey Hospital during the month of July amounted to \$7,435.45, practically the same as the previous month. Occupancy load for July was 42 per cent, up six per cent over June, and the operating deficit for July was down some \$1300 over the previous month. Records show there were 22 admissions during July, accounting for 157 hospital days. Lab and x-ray charges for the month were almost double the previous month.

He stated that the boys were "rapping one another" and that if they would continue to hit, he felt that the rough edges could be shaped up pretty fast. He said that in the first few workouts the club was having trouble handling the ball and getting their assignments but that "holes were opening."

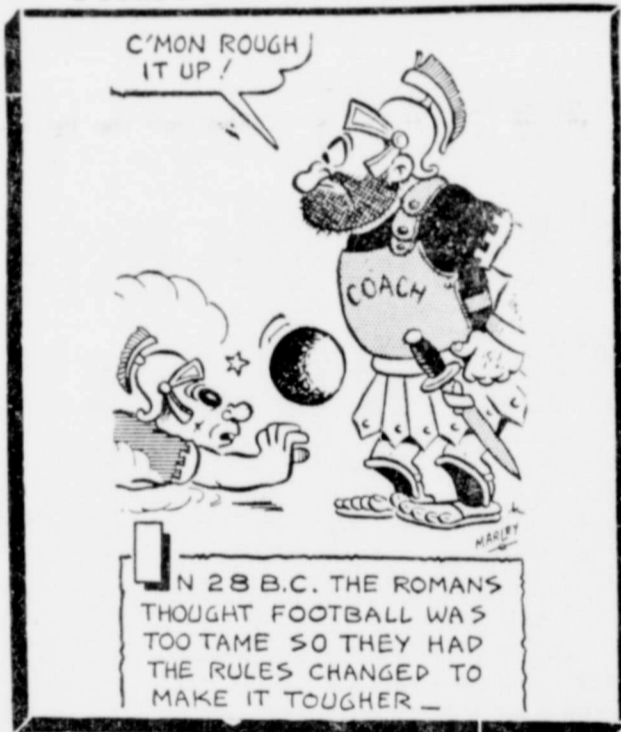
themselves in office and there's no telling what will develop. Some folks don't think of good neighbors, love and friendship when told that the best things in life are free.

The road of the Negro has been hard and it will be hard for many years . . . just how hard will depend entirely upon him. No one can pass a law that will give him something he doesn't earn. Sure, the politicians can pass a law and enforce it that makes sure the Negro gets to vote but neither the Negro nor anyone else can eat votes nor can he build a better

home or send a son or daughter to college. All he can do with them is re-elect the person who got him the vote or his duly appointed heir. The politician will and has promised the Negro better jobs but the Negro or the white or yellow man who knows nothing more than common labor cannot fulfill a job that requires him to operate a modern machine no more than I can fly an airplane just because I can run the linotype to set this copy. These are things you have to be trained to do and when the Negro trains himself he will get the jobs—as he already is getting

them. Sadly, there's never much demand for a first-class rioter. The pay is small, the hours long and the results sometimes killing.

And the old softsoaping by the politician won't get it either.

It is their theme that the situation in which the Negro finds himself is not his fault but is the result of his having been a slave. Nuts. Lots of Negroes were never slaves. Lots of other peoples have been.

I, personally, always like to point to our Latins as the type of people who know what it takes to get ahead. A little over 100 years ago the word "Gringo" and

"Greezer" were terms used by two peoples who had or where in the process of fighting two wars. They were dirty little wars with no holds barred. They caused far more grief, suffering and hatred than their size would apparently justify. And yet, today the Latin people—not as a whole but as individuals just as the Negro or any one else will have to do—have worked their way up and into the American way of life to the point that many hold high office. Many are leaders and their counsel are sought after by people of all races. Give the Latin an opportunity and he, perhaps more than anyone else, will make the most of it. Some of his people are still far down the economic and social ladder and so are some of all of us but most of us—and this includes many fine Negro people—look up with a hope and an effort.

The ones who are deceived look to Washington.

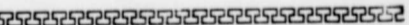
THE LIST SHORTENS—

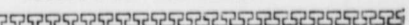
John Christy was my idea of a heck of a good man.

PUBLIC NOTICE

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT

USED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD NOVEMBER 2, 1965.

STATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 27 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, adding a new Section 48b, so as to create an agency of the State of Texas, vesting the administration and responsibility of the proper operation of said system in a board of trustees to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas, and authorizing said Board to invest the moneys, securities, and assets of said system in various obligations and subjects of investment, subject to certain restrictions stated therein and other restrictions as hereafter be provided by the Legislature, providing that such investment shall be self-enacting and shall not alter, amend, or repeal Section 48a of the Constitution of the State of Texas or any legislation passed pursuant thereto insofar as such legislation may limit or restrict the provisions of this Amendment, providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, and proclamation, and publication.

administration and responsibility for the proper operation of said system are hereby vested in a State Board of Trustees, to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas, which Board shall be constituted and shall serve as may now or hereafter be provided by the Legislature. Said Board shall exercise such powers as are herein provided together with such other powers and duties not inconsistent herewith as may be prescribed by the Legislature. All moneys from whatever source coming into the Fund to provide retirement, disability, and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges, and universities supported wholly or partly by the state and all other securities, moneys, and assets of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas shall be administered by said Board and said Board shall be the trustees thereof. The Treasurer of the State of Texas shall be custodian of said moneys and securities. Said Board is hereby authorized and empowered to acquire, hold, manage, purchase, sell, assign, trade, transfer, and dispose of any securities, evidences of debt, and other investments in which said securities, moneys, and assets have been or may hereafter be invested by said Board. Said Board is hereby authorized and empowered to invest and reinvest any of said moneys, securities, and assets, as well as the proceeds of any of such investments, in bonds, notes, or other evidences of indebtedness issued, or assumed or guaranteed in whole or in part, by the United States or any agency of the United States, or by the State of Texas, or by any county, city, school district, municipal corporation, or other political subdivision of the State of Texas, both general and special obligations; or in home office facilities to be used in administering the Teacher Retirement System including land,

equipment, and office building; or in such corporation bonds; notes, other evidences of indebtedness, and corporation stocks, including common and preferred stocks, of any corporation created or existing under the laws of the United States or of any of the states of the United States, as said Board may deem to be proper investments; provided that in making each and all of such investments said Board shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income therefrom as well as probable safety of their capital; and further provided, that a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as may now or hereafter be provided by law. Unless investments authorized herein are hereafter further restricted by an Act of the Legislature, no more than one per cent (1%) of the book value of the total assets of the Teacher Retirement System shall be invested in the stock of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; and provided further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid cash dividends for ten (10) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors; and provided further, that so long as less than \$500,000,000 of said Fund is invested in the government and municipal securities enumerated above, not more than thirty-three and one-third per cent (33 1/3%) of the Fund shall be invested at any given time in common stocks. This Amendment shall be self-enacting and shall become effective immediately upon its adoption without any

enabling legislation. This Section shall not alter, amend or repeal the first paragraph of Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of Texas as amended November 6, 1956, or any legislation passed pursuant thereto. This Section shall not alter, amend or repeal the second paragraph of Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of Texas as amended November 6, 1956, or any legislation passed pursuant thereto, except insofar as the provisions of the second paragraph of Section 48a and any legislation passed pursuant thereto, may limit or restrict the provisions hereof and only to the extent of such limitation or restriction."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 2, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment amending Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 48b relating to the Teacher Retirement Fund and the Teacher Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investment of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing other existing provisions and making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Teacher Retirement System."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment amending Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 48b relating to the Teacher Retirement Fund and the Teacher Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investment of moneys and other assets of the Fund and changing other existing provisions and making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Teacher Retirement System."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Fortunately, only eleven players can take the field at a time and with those odds, the Red Devils won't likely take the district crown but they may be a lot better ball club than some are expecting.

Along about October 1 will be a good time to tell.

Services Held Friday For John Christy

Rev. R. L. Shannon officiated at the funeral services of long-time West Texan John Christy last Friday at the First Baptist Church in Rankin. Christy passed away in the Ruidosa, New Mexico Hospital on Wednesday, August 11. He was 84 years old and had been seriously ill for the past several months.

Christy was born February 16, 1881 at San Saba. He came to West Texas in 1901 and began work on the Soper Ranch near Big Lake. He helped organize Reagan County and served as the first sheriff when the county seat was moved from Styles to Big Lake in 1925.

He was an outstanding cowboy and worked on a number of ranches in West Texas before buying his own. He was once of-

fered a position with the late Will Rogers' "Wild West Show" but declined the offer. His reputation was such that it was said the was "better on a bronch than most cowboys on a trained horse." After ranching for a number of years, Mr. Christy moved into Rankin. On June 11, 1953, he married Miss Leila King. She was his constant companion until his passing. They both enjoyed horses and maintained a summer home at the New Mexico resort.

Four brothers, Jack, Sam, Dave and Dan Christy all preceded him in death. Survivors include his wife who will continue to reside in Rankin, and three sisters: Mrs. T. R. Wood of San Saba, Mrs. Nannie Parrish of San Angelo, and Mrs. W. M. Hill of Rankin. Also, a number of nieces and nephews.

Mr. Christy was a member of the Odd Fellow Lodge which he joined many years ago in Styles. He was also a member of the Rankin Baptist Church and contributed regularly to its program as well as to practically all worthwhile local projects.

ful to God for throughout the life."

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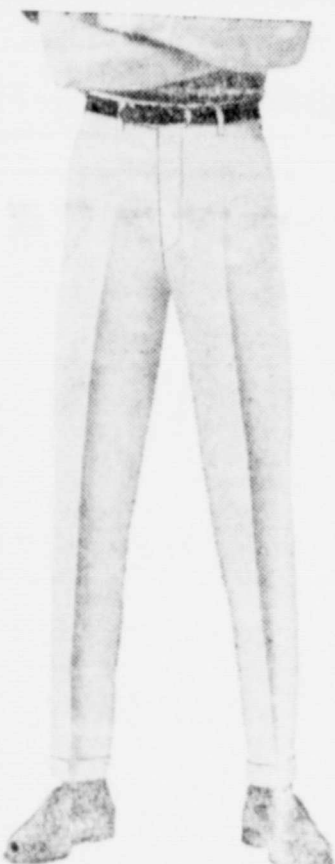

HINTS for the HOMEMAKER

FREEZE NOW— PRESERVE LATER

Many homemakers are so busy during the summer months — with special trips, vacations, and activities for family members — that it's difficult to find enough time to make preserves, relishes, and marmalade in huge lots.

Try freezing the ingredients now, and spread out the work of preserving the food later.

There's a U. S. Department of Agriculture publication called "Home Freezing of Fruits and Vegetables" to help you get off to a good start. Included are ideas on how to prepare and pack fruits and vegetables for freezing, the approximate amount of frozen fruits and vegetables you can expect from specific amounts of fresh produce, and other information designed to help you turn out a good frozen product.

If you plan to make preserves later on from frozen fruit, here's a tip for you. Food specialists say the fruit either should be frozen unsweetened or the exact amount of sugar used should be noted and subtracted from that called for in the recipe when you make preserves.

You may receive a free copy of the bulletin by asking for HG-10, "Home Freezing of Fruits and Vegetables," from my office.

Grass is Business for the Ranch Man

Ranchers are actually in the "grass business," and livestock are the saleable byproducts.

With this in mind, ranchers should develop a grazing program that efficiently utilizes native grasses and produces the most pounds of beef, lamb, wool and mohair per acre — with less emphasis on number of head grazed.

To be effective with this program producers must have the same familiarity with ranges and grasses that they have with type and quality of livestock. They should know the plants growing on their pastureland, forage value of each, the quantity required to maintain one head of livestock and amount of plant cover to leave after grazing to keep the range in good state of production.

Research reveals that 1500 to 2000 pounds of forage per month is needed to maintain an animal unit. This equals to 5 grown sheep. The average 1000 pound cow requires two and one-half to three percent of her body weight of dry plant material per day for maintenance.

This means she consumes about 750 to 900 pounds of forage per month with the remainder used in trampling, deterioration, maintenance of grass plants and influencing deeper moisture penetration.

If a producer has to buy sup-

plemental feed to maintain his livestock during growing seasons with normal rainfall, there is either an excess of unpalatable and unproductive plants or too many animals grazing the area.

Grass on a moderately used

range should appear patchy and uneven at the end of the grazing season. Stubble height should range from four to seven inches for bunchgrasses to one to two inches for sod grass.

Even with a good pasture program, ranchers need to supply protein supplement during winter months. Grasses have highest crude protein content during the early growth stages and decrease in nutritive value as they reach maturity. Dry winter grass should be used for hay with a protein supplement to produce a balanced

diet.

Producers should consult their local county agents for additional information. Ask for free copies of B.864 and MP-259 concerning range management and grazing practices.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 57 proposing an Amendment to Section 1-a of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding to said Section as presently written, the following provisions: requiring automatic retirement of certain District and Appellate Judges at age seventy-five (75) or such earlier age, not under seventy (70), as may be provided by law; creating a State Judicial Qualifications Commission and providing for its composition and the qualifications, methods of selection and terms of office of its members; defining the functions and procedures of said Commission, including the duty to investigate, and hold hearings in respect of, disability and misconduct of District and Appellate Judges and to make recommendations to the Supreme Court of Texas for involuntary retirement or removal of such Judges; empowering the Supreme Court of Texas, in its discretion, to retire such Judges for disability and to remove them for misconduct, upon recommendation of the aforesaid Commission and consideration of the record made before it; defining misconduct for which said Judges may be so removed; providing that the proceedings of said Commission shall be confidential until filed in the Supreme Court with recommendation for retirement or removal; and providing that the removal provisions hereby established shall be alternative to and cumulative of those provided elsewhere in the Constitution.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 1-a of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so that said Section shall hereafter read as follows:

"Section 1-a. (1) Subject to the further provisions of this Section, the Legislature shall provide for the retirement and compensation of Justices and Judges of the Appellate Courts and District and Criminal District Courts on account of length of service, age and disability, and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed. The office of every such Justice and Judge shall become vacant when the incumbent reaches the age of seventy-five (75) years or such earlier age, not less than seventy (70) years, as the Legislature may prescribe; but, in the case of an incumbent whose term of office includes the effective date of this Amendment, this provision shall not prevent

him from serving the remainder of said term nor be applicable to him before his period or periods of judicial service shall have reached a total of ten (10) years.

"(2) There is hereby created the State Judicial Qualifications Commission, to consist of nine (9) members, to wit: (i) two (2) Justices of Courts of Civil Appeals; (ii) two (2) District Judges; (iii) two (2) members of the State Bar, who have respectively practiced as such for over ten (10) consecutive years next preceding their selection; (iii) three (3) citizens, at least thirty (30) years of age, not licensed to practice law nor holding any salaried public office or employment; provided that no person shall be or remain a member of the Commission, who does not maintain physical residence within this State, or who resides in, or holds a judgeship within or for, the same Supreme Judicial District as another member of the Commission, or who shall have ceased to retain the qualifications above specified for his respective class of membership. Commissioners of classes (i) and (ii) above shall be chosen by the Supreme Court with advice and consent of the Senate, those of class (iii) by the Board of Directors of the State Bar under regulations to be prescribed by the Supreme Court with advice and consent of the Senate.

"(3) The regular term of office of Commissioners shall be six (6) years; but the initial members of each of classes (i), (ii) and (iii) shall respectively be chosen for terms of four (4) and six (6) years, and the initial members of class (iii) for respective terms of two (2), four (4) and six (6) years. Interim vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as vacancies due to expiration of a full term, but only for the unexpired portion of the term in question. Commissioners may succeed themselves in office only if having served less than three (3) consecutive years.

"(4) Commissioners shall receive no compensation for their services as such. The Legislature shall provide for the payment of the necessary expense for the operation of the Commission.

"(5) The Commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet at Austin at least once each year. It shall annually select one of its members as Chairman. A quorum shall consist of five (5) members. Proceed-

ings shall be by majority vote of those present, except that recommendations for retirement or removal of Justices or Judges shall be by affirmative vote of at least five (5) members.

"(6) Any Justice or Judge within the scope of this Section 1-a may, subject to the other provisions hereof, be removed from office for willful or persistent conduct, which is clearly inconsistent with the proper performance of his said duties or casts public discredit upon the judiciary or administration of justice; or any such Justice or Judge may be involuntarily retired for disability seriously interfering with the performance of his duties, which is, or is likely to become, permanent in nature.

"(7) The Commission shall keep itself informed as fully as may be of circumstances relating to misconduct or disability of particular Justices or Judges, receive complaints or reports, formal or informal, from any source in this behalf and make such preliminary investigations as it may determine. Its orders for the attendance or testimony of witnesses or for the production of documents at any hearing or investigation shall be enforceable by contempt proceedings in the District Court.

"(8) The Commission may, after such investigation as it deems necessary, order a hearing to be held before it concerning the removal or retirement of a Justice or Judge, or it may in its discretion request the Supreme Court to appoint an active or retired District Judge or Justice of a Court of Civil Appeals as a Master to hear and take evidence in any such matter, and to report thereon to the Commission. If, after hearing, or after considering the record and report of a Master, the Commission finds good cause therefore, it shall recommend to the Supreme Court the removal or retirement, as the case may be, of the Justice or Judge in question and shall thereupon file with the Clerk of the Supreme Court the entire record before the Commission.

"(9) The Supreme Court shall review the record of the proceedings on the law and facts and in its discretion may, for good cause shown, permit the introduction of additional evidence and shall order removal or retirement, as it finds just and proper, or wholly reject the recommendation. Upon an order for involuntary retirement for disability or an order for removal, the office in question shall become vacant. The rights of an incumbent so retired to retirement benefits shall be the same as if his retirement had been voluntary.

"(10) All papers filed with and proceedings before the Commission or a Master shall be confidential, and the filing of papers with, and the giv-

ing of testimony before, the Commission, Master or the Supreme Court shall be privileged; provided that upon filing in the Supreme Court the record loses its confidential character.

"(11) The Supreme Court shall by rule provide for a procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court. Such rule shall apply to any judge against whom proceeding is instituted, cause his retirement due to process of law for the proceeding before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court in the same manner that a person whose property is in jeopardy in an adversary proceeding is entitled to due process of law, regardless of whether or not the name of the judge in remaining active status is considered to be a right or a privilege. The process shall include the right to notice, counsel, hearing, confrontation of his accusers and all such other incidents of due process as are ordinarily available in proceedings whether or not misfeasance charged, upon proof of which a penalty may be imposed.

"(12) No Justice or Judge shall sit as a member of the Commission or Supreme Court in any proceeding involving his own retirement or removal.

"(13) This Section 1-a is alternative to, and cumulative of, the methods of removal of Justices and Judges provided elsewhere in this Constitution."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of qualified electors of the State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballot lots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the automatic retirement of District and Appellate Judges for old age, creating the State Judicial Qualifications Commission, defining its functions; and empowering the Supreme Court, upon recommendation of said Commission, to remove District and Appellate Judges for misconduct and to retire such judges in cases of disability."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the automatic retirement of District and Appellate Judges for old age, creating the State Judicial Qualifications Commission, defining its functions; and empowering the Supreme Court, upon recommendation of said Commission, to remove District and Appellate Judges for misconduct and to retire such judges in cases of disability."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and the Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

...D CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 47 proposing an amendment to Section 4, Article V, Constitution of the State of Texas, to provide for the election of members of the House of Representatives. RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 1. That Section 4, Article V, Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: 4. The members of the House of Representatives shall be chosen by the qualified voters of the State of Texas, but a new House of Representatives shall be chosen at every apportionment of the members of the House of Representatives. The seats of the members of the House of Representatives shall be divided by lot into two classes. The seats of Class A shall expire at the expiration of the first two years, and the seats of Class B at the expiration of the next four years, so that the members of the House of Representatives shall be chosen biennially. Representatives shall take office following the adjournment of the Legislature, on the day set for the convening of the next Session of the Legislature, and shall serve for the full term of two years, which elected and their successors shall be elected and qualified in case of an vacancy, and the first election of each re-apportionment shall be held on the day set for the election of the House of Representatives. A candidate again elected to the Legislature shall not be eligible for the term for which he was elected has less than one year remaining." Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of the state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment to provide for a four-year term of office for State Representatives." "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to provide for a four-year term of office for State Representatives." Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the constitution and laws of this state. Sec. 4. In the event the Constitutional Amendment proposed in this Resolution is adopted by the people of Texas in the election in November, 1965, the Governor of Texas is directed not to issue a proclamation for the election and not to publish notice thereof for the Constitutional Amendment proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 1 of the 59th Texas Legislature, since the provisions of said House Joint Resolution No. 1 are included in this Resolution. But, should this proposed Amendment be rejected by the people of Texas in the election in November, 1965, then the terms and provisions of House Joint Resolution No. 1 shall be and remain in full force and effect and shall be proclaimed published and submitted to the electorate in November, 1966, as provided in said House Joint Resolution No. 1.

Policy Arrangement Made by RISD Board

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for the exemption from local ad valorem taxes of the property of certain charitable organizations, provided such organizations meet certain conditions and requirements and expend at least One and One-half Million Dollars (\$1,500,000.00) annually on free medical and hospital care for the indigent within the State of Texas; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation and publications.

PREAMBLE

WHEREAS, The Legislature finds and declares that there is a need for the operation of hospitals by private charitable enterprises which will furnish free medical and/or hospital care for the indigent in Texas; and

WHEREAS, The operation of such hospitals and the furnishing of such free medical care and hospitalization for the indigent in Texas will add to the welfare and well-being of the State of Texas and its residents and citizens; and

WHEREAS, The need for the operation of such hospitals and the furnishing of such free medical care and hospitalization for the indigent is especially great in counties having a population in excess of one million two hundred forty thousand (1,240,000); and

WHEREAS, It is found and declared to be the Public Policy of the State to foster and encourage such operation of hospitals as aforesaid; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. The Constitution of the State of Texas is amended hereby, by the addition of a new Section to Article VIII thereof, to be numbered Section 2-A, and reading as follows:

"2-A. The properties of any charitable trust or organization, if such trust or organization is dedicated to, and operates a hospital furnishing free hospital and/or medical care for the indigent within the State of Texas, shall be exempt from all ad valorem taxes levied by any taxing entity, except by the State of Texas itself, provided:

"(1) such trust or organization has expended for free hospital and/or medical care within the State of Texas, during the calendar year next preceding, a sum of not less than

One and One-half Million Dollars (\$1,500,000.00); and, further provided,

"(2) after such exemption has been in force and effect for one full calendar year, the amount expended for free hospital and/or medical care, within the State of Texas, amounts to not less than One Million Eight Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,800,000.00) for the calendar year next preceding; and, further provided,

(3) such trust or organization is exempt from United States income taxes;

"(4) such charitable trust or organization maintains its domicile and operates a hospital or hospitals in a county having a population of more than one million two hundred forty thousand (1,240,000) according to the last preceding Federal Census, and such exemption shall apply only to the properties of such charitable trust or organization located within the county of its domicile.

"Proof of compliance with all applicable conditions stated above, shall constitute a complete defense to any suit for ad valorem taxes levied or attempted to be levied by any taxing entity other than the State of Texas itself.

"This Amendment shall be self-enacting."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

FOR the Amendment exempting the property of certain charitable organizations from local ad valorem taxes provided any such organization meets certain conditions, and expends at least One and One-half Million Dollars (\$1,500,000.00) annually for free hospital and medical care for the indigent within the State of Texas. **AGAINST** the Amendment exempting the property of certain charitable organizations from local ad valorem taxes provided any such organization meets certain conditions, and expends at least One and One-half Million Dollars (\$1,500,000.00) annually for free hospital and medical care for the indigent within the State of Texas.
