School Tax Rate Lowered by 10-Cents

In its regular meeting on Thursday, September 9, the Board of Trustees of the Rankin Independent School District officially hired Mr. John A. Husbands as the high school Spanish teacher, Mrs. Margaret Webster as high school mathematics teacher, and Mrs. Martha Word as a second grade teacher.

Mrs. Marilee Robinson was also hired as the school nurse for the months of September, October and November during Mrs. Hughes' leave of absence.

The 1956-66 school budget was officially adopted in the amount of \$523,615.00 and the tax rate was set at \$1.40 per \$100 assessed value with the money to be divided 14.5 percent (\$.203) to the Interest and Sinking Fund and 85.5 percent (\$.197) to the Local Maintenance Fund.

The \$1.40 tax rate represents a 10-cent reduction from the \$1.50 rate of last year. This will result in a slight decrease in school taxes on property of the same value as last year.

Must be Done Step at a Time --

Groundwork on for Dam

With some thirty supporters on hand last Monday night at the Rankin Park Building, County Agent Dub Day outlined the steps to be taken in an effort to secure a dam on the Rankin Draw. The gathering was hosted by Rankin Lions Club.

Day explained that there was not any sure-fire way at this time to say whether or not a dam and or lake could be built on the draw. He explained that there was Federal money available for the project—upwards to \$300,000 under one plan—and that there were several angles that could be developed. He pointed out that there would be no re-payment attached to the funds and that no local tax would be levied as a result of any money spent on the program.

As it is being considered, the

project will be strictly a flood control measure and will not be designed to impound waters for a lake. However, Day said that this was one of the side benefits that might be considered at some later date in the work.

As stated, all those present were in agreement that the groundwork on the idea should be started and as a result, figures and material were already being compiled this week. When completed, they will

be put into a brochure and submitted to the Soil Conservation Service. This agency, after following certain procedures, will order a survey made of the area and the watershed—containing some 55,000 acres according to aerial photos shown to the group by Day. Within forty-five days after this survey is completed, the feasibility of the project will be announced. If it is favorable, still further action will be taken. If the report is not favorable, that will be the end.

As explained by the Agent, the work is carried out by steps and can change from one phase to the next. And, despite the usual red tape, it is said that these flood control projects are moving rather rapidly with at least two already having been completed in the West Texas area this year.

DAM—

"Don't go out and buy yourself a boat," so said Dub Day last Monday night at the Lions Club meeting at which the possibility of a dam building project on the Rankin draw was discussed. Day said that he didn't believe it could be done but then pointed out that he didn't believe that a man could get to the moon ten years ago but that now he was only questioning when he would get there.

And so it is with so many, many projects and ideas. There is and always will be those who say it can't be done. Too numerous to list are those very things that have already been done. And the main reason they were not done sooner was that nobody actually tried to do them.

Building a dam somewhere on this draw has been talked for years—very possibly since the first settlers came to this area. And in that first group was someone

who said "it can't be done or it won't work." And back in 1889, he very well could have been right. Now, there is no question but what it can be done. The only one is: will it work—catch and hold enough water to actually form a lake. Like Day, I don't believe it will. And also like Day, I didn't believe ten years ago that a man would walk across Texas in 1965 200 miles up in space.

The very least that can be done on the thing is to try. It's just possible that they may perfect a few of the schemes presently being undertaken such as doing a way with evaporation of water from lakes and regulating and increasing rainfall. As for making the area hold water, that can already be done.

the old times can recall seeing
the water reach a line from the
present post office to the Metho-
dist Church. One recalled seeing
a calf stranded on top of a wind-
mill tower in what we now con-
sider a "safe" part of town. Flood
control is something not to be
taken lightly in this country. If
you think so, ask the people of
Ozona and Sanderson. They, too,
never believed it would happen.

Then there is the matter of re-

charging the water supply area
for Rankin. With the draw run-
ning a couple of times this year,
it has been estimated that the

water table has risen some 12
inches and that a 20 percent in-
crease in production has resulted.
Think what it would mean if the

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run-off could be held on top of
the land until it really had a
chance to soak in. It is very pos-
sible that Rankin's water prob-
lem—and we do have one—would
be ended.

So . . . there's a lot to be said
for the project and very little
against it. It is true that this will
be a Federal project with no local
money involved—a pure and sim-
ple hand-out. But, as someone at
the meeting said: "let's face the
facts . . . the present adminis-
tration is a bunch of spending
dudes and they're going to spend
the money either in Upton County
or some place else." And to this
might be pointed out that it's not
exactly stealing to take the mon-
ey. It's ours to begin with. We
in Upton County pay our share of
taxes—perhaps because of the
high standard of living—just a
bit more than most. So why not
take advantage of some of the
benefits?

In fact, I do not understand
why more effort is not made on
the part of the City of Rankin
to avail themselves to some of
the Federal help that is being of-
fered. For one thing, the sub-
standard living conditions below
the tracks could be eliminated.
Also, money is available for the
construction of good rental prop-
erty. True, it's Federal aid and
it has strings attached but if you
recall, in the last election a maj-
ority of the voters said that this
was the best way and consequen-
tly, the money is being spent. To
sit back and not take our share
of our own money is a little like
pouting while everybody else eats
up the cake and ice cream. You
hurt no one but yourself.

Ha! You say. "I knew all a-
long Scoop was a socialist." Not
so. If you recall, I was dead set
against electing the present ad-
ministration. I still do not believe
their way is best but it is the way
it's going to be for the immediate
future at least and we all may as
well face up to that fact of life.
It would take a special kind of
nut to stand in the middle of a
fire and say "I didn't light the
thing. Why should I move?" We
have the spenders. They have the
people on the payrolls. It's our
money. Let's not burn to death
while standing around saying that
we don't approve of the fire.

Who knows—some of the plans
just might work. To say that an
automobile is a bad thing be-
cause people have been killed
while riding in one doesn't make
much sense. Some Federal pro-
grams have been misused and there
has been some graft but that
doesn't in itself mean that the
project is bad nor that we have
to follow suit.

And for that matter, there's a
good many things that might
work here in Rankin if we would
try them. It's true that we have
steamed up at other times and
run a little ways only to "run
out of steam." But then, as some
bird said, a long trip is started
with only one step and it's very
possible that long-range improve-
ments are accomplished with little
spurts of effort. The results of
past efforts are evident. There is
no reason to believe that new
efforts would not produce some
beneficial showing. At least, we
would not be stranded on dead
center.

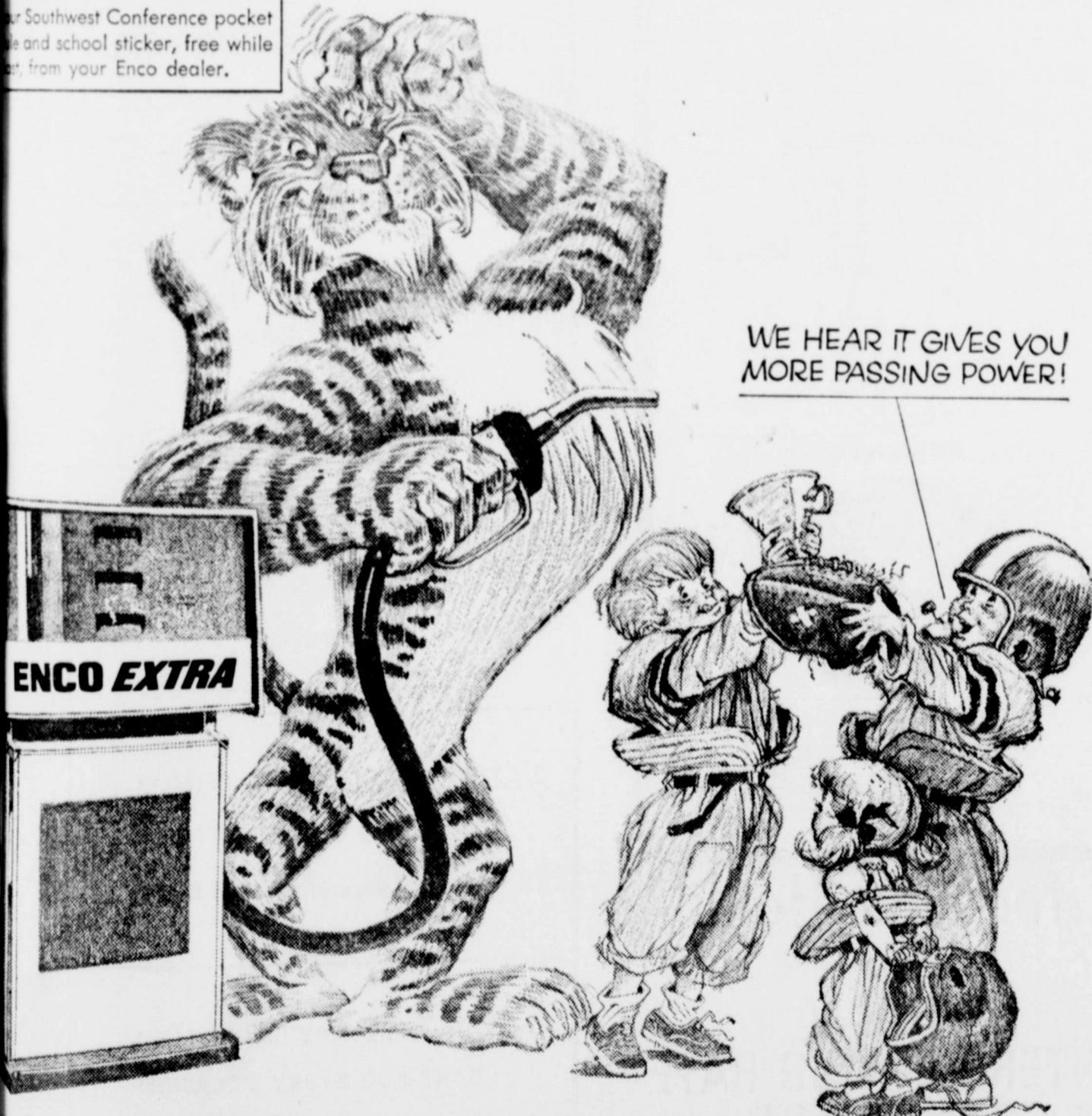

Hospital Plans Studied by Board

Members of the Rankin Hospital Board and administrator Leon Feuge met last Thursday night with their architect who submitted plans and estimates for the proposed alteration of the present hospital. A total outlay of some \$229,866 is proposed for the actual work to be performed. In addition, it is estimated that another \$40,000 will be needed for equipment, bringing to overall money need to some \$270,000,000.

Major cost in the figure would be \$173,400 for a new addition to the present structure. Some five major remodeling and alteration projects are slated for existing facilities and \$25,000 is proposed for nurses' quarters. Also in the cost is a contingencies figure of \$10,000.

Of the \$40,000 in new equipment, a major part would go for x-ray and operating room needs.

Plans call for all additions including the nurses quarters to be carried out with the present brick and steel materials.

In discussing the possibility of a bond election to finance these expenditures and a complete new hospital in McCamey, it appears to be the feeling of most

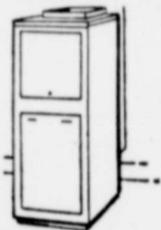

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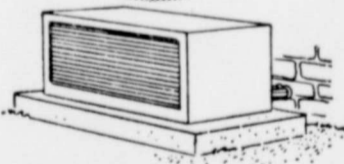
