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

# **Court Inspects Plans for Expanding Upton Hospitals**



Each hospital had on hand their plans which they went over with the Court. McCamey has their plans completed and approved by the Texas State Hospital Board while the Rankin plans are still in the tentative stage, a fact that would not have any direct bearing upon a bond election trying to raise the neces-

As presented to the Court, the McCamey outlay would come to 365,000 while the figure for the Rankin alterations reaches approximately \$250,000. Included in the Rankin proposal is a nurses' quarters which, as explained by Rankin administrator, Mr. Leon Feuge, is an optional matter at the present time and may be cut out entirely before the actual vote is taken on the bonds.

Claude Brown, president of the McCamey Chamber of Commerce spoke out in favor of calling the election and expressed the opinion that improvements were needed by both hospitals.

Others present pointed out that it was the thinking of the Mc-Camey board that a new hospital would enable them to secure the services of more doctors and that the hospital would, consequently, make more money and thus would cost less for the county to operate. Currently, operation of the two county hospitals runs about \$70,000 a year in the

### Voters to Ballot on State Amendments

Voters in Upton County will go to the polls next Tuesday and help decide the fate of ten proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution. Only the ten amendments will be on the ballot.

All voting boxes in the county will be in operation and the polls will be open from 8:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. A current Texas Poll Tax or exemption will be required for one to be eligible to cast a ballot.

Minutes of the Upton County Commissioners' Court, dated 25 October, 1965, reveal that the Court informed both Hospital Boards that Jack Brown of the Dunbar Investment Company would be notified to meet with the boards concerning the drawing up of a Petition to be presented to Upton County Tax Payers, relative to calling an election.

# THE SCOOP by Scoop

ON AGAIN-

The proposed expansion of the two Upton County Hospitals-an affair that has been off and on for almost a year now-is on again and it looks like this time there will be some definite action.

Claude Brown, president of the McCamey Chamber of Commer. ce, put it this way: "Let's get this thing off the ground ... get it before the poeple and decide one way or another."

Backing him up in an appearance before the Commissioners' Court last Monday were members of both the McCamey and the Rankin Hospital Boards plus the two hospital administrators.

So it's very possible that within a short while, you may te ask. ed to put your signature on a petition to be presented to the Commissioners' Court asking them to call a bond election for some \$650,000 to enlarge the Rankin Hospital and build a new one in McCamey. Hear the man out who asks you to sign before you say no. There's a good bit of merit in the proposal and even if you don't personally approve of it, signing the petition does not bind you to vote either for or against the measure. It will be more or less a formality and you won't be springing anything drastle on

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the Commissioners' Court with its presentation. They are the ones who will have ordered it made up in the first place.

As stated above, don't start out on a crusade to defeat the issue until you have heard all the facts. In the first place it's not as drastic as it sound and in the second place, it may well be that there is a need for something of this kind. Both Hospital Boards and the Commissioners' Court expressed a desire to fully inform the public on the matter before it is voted upon. For the present, an open mind would help one to get a better understanding of what is proposed and decide for himself whether or not there is a need for spending the money.

Incidentally, Brown also urged the Court to get going on the proposed Castle Gap park. He said that he had committments from two State agencies to put in the road and develop the park if the county would secure the right-of.way and necessary land



issue before election, summarization of the issues will have to be brief.

Two of the proposals definitely ought to be defeated. These are Nos. 4 and 10 on the ballot and they would extend the terms of office for the Governor (No. 2) and the Representatives (No. 10) from 2 to 4 years. This is particularly bad in the case of the Governor who appoints so many office holders in Texas. Given 8 years in office-most are reelected for a second term-one man could almost control such things as education in Texas by appointing "his men" to the various boards. The same would be true of every appointment made. This would not be desirable no matter who the governor happened to be. For Representatives, we need all the control over our government—not less—that we can get. Four year terms would give us less.

Four of the proposals merit passage. They are No. 2, Veteran's Land Fund, a program that has been of much benefit and very little cost in Texas; No. 5, Teacher Retirement System that would enable teachers' retirement funds to be better invested and thus worth more money; No. 6, Student Loan Fund a program much in need for students who cannot get adequate financial help to attend college; and No. 8, Judges' Retirement and Removal, giving authority to turn judges out to pasture who do not perform properly.

The other four proposals are somewhat questionable in that a.l are costly. No. 1, the College Building · Program would exactly double ad valorem taxes in Tex. as. This wouldn't be much of a tax but anytime we approve the doubling of a tax, we're taking a big step out into the woods. The colleges, however, do need the added building funds.

No. 3, State-Federal Welfare Programs. It seems that everytime we turn around, there's a new request for welfare money. This amendment would merely authorize Texas to take part in Federal Welfare programs and in that respect, might be called a formality. I only wish they could come up with some new word other than "Welfare".

No. 7. Tax Exemption for Charitable Trusts. The charitable trust is sometimes a dodge used by certain groups to gain tax advantages. Every time some group is exempt from paying their fair share of the tax load, the rest

of us have to split up the tab. Yet, if it's truly a charitable trust, it ought not be taxed.

And No. 9, Salary for Lt. Gov. ernor and Speaker-Per Diem Increase for Legislature. Almost as regular as Welfare, we are asked to raise salaries for members of the Legislature. It used to be said that this would attract better men but the same ones are still in office in many cases. But I guess it takes a good bit of jack for a Legislator to live like a Legislator should these days-however that is.

In any case, take fifteen minutes Tuesday and GO VOTE!


Sgt Cockerham is undergoing extensive training in all types of tactical range firing during the day and night exercises.






