

time, that doesn't keep some from trying that route as almost every chart in the report shows a continual and steady increase over the past few years. As has been pointed out, this increase might be contributed-in part- to the fact that a lot more small police forces report crimes now than they did say ten years ago.

Be that as it may, the business of crime is big time nowon both sides-the crooks and the enforcers.

One sad little incident, however, can be noted in Hoover's report. In the classification of types of crimes handled last year by the FBI, there are some 67 listings. They begin with Admiralty Matters and run through White Slave Traffic of which the FBI obtained 96 convictions from their investigations.

In the "Fugatives Located" column, 4,479 were located-by far the highest of any category for Desertion, Harboring Deserters, Enticing to Desert. In the Civil Rights field, only six fugitives were located by the FBI.

In another section, the various categories of crimes are described and discussed. Civil Rights is given three pages-with pictures and charts. Desertions, Harboring Deserters, etc. is not even mentioned.

It's a crying shame when an agency such as the FBI gets into the field of playing political football-even in their reportsand is a way below the standing of a man such as J. Edgar Hoover. One wonders how many arms

were twisted in this little instance of petty political pussyfooting?

If desertions mean what I think they mean, there's no need to g.oss over the fact by trying to point out the wonders of Civil Rights And certainly Civil Rights should not be given undue attention by the FBI simply because it's a political gimmick that can




