## **Petitions in Circulation for**

\$594,000 Asked for McCamey-Rankin Work --

**Hospital Improvements** 

Petitions calling for a \$594-000 bond election in Upton County to finance hospital construction and improvements in McCamey and Rankin were in circulation this week in both towns. In order for the petitions to be presented to the Commissioner's Court, ten percent of the eligible voters who are property owners in the county must sign the petitions. In Rankin, it is said that signatures are being added at a good pace.

Signing of the petitions to call

the elections does not obligate one to vote for or against the bond issue once the election is held.

Following is a copy of the petitions:

PETITION
THE STATE OF TEXAS
COUNTY OF UPTON

TO THE HONORABLE COM-MISSIONERS' COURT OF UP-TON COUNTY, TEXAS:

We, the undersigned, being more than ten per cent of the resident, qualified, property tax.

paying voters of Upton County, Texas, hereby respectfully petition your Honorable Court to provide for the enlarging and equipping of the County Hospital and for all other necessary permanent improvements in connection therewith, and within thirty days from the date this petition is presented to your Honorable Court, to submit to the resident, qauified property taxpaying voters of Upton County, Texas, owning taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, at a special election the following proposition:

"Shall the Commissioners' Co.

urt of Upton County, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said County in the amount of \$594,000, to become due from their date, bearing interest at a rate not exceeding five (5%) per cent per annum, as may be determined and fixed by the Commissioners' Court, for the purpose of providing funds for the enlarging and equipping of the County Hospital and for all other necessary permanent improvements in connection therewith, as follows: \$350,000 for constructing and equipping a hospital building in McCamey and \$244,000 in Rankin; and shall the Commissioners' Court of Upton County, Texas, be authorized to levy, and c ollect annually while said bonds or any of them are outstanding a tax upon all taxable property in said County sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund for their redemption at maturity?

## RANKIN DROPS NURSES' QUARTER

In their last regular meeting held earlier this month, the Rankin Hospital Board instructed their architect to drop from the Rankin remodeling plans, blueprints and specifications for a four-bedroom nurses' quarters. In the first estimates of the hospital's needs, the construction of the quarters, at a cost of \$25,-000, was planned to be carried out just west of the hospital.

This portion of the Rankin remodeling was dropped after it more or less became a matter of controversy in Rankin and particularly in McCamey. Members of the McCamey Hospital board, in their recent joint meeting with the Rankin Board and the Commissioners' Court, were outspoken in their objections to this portion of Rankin's estimated needs.

Rankin plans must yet be approved by the state Health Department. This approval is necessary in order for a hospital to be accredited and thus be eligible to handle insurance claims.

No vote on the bond issue is expected before mid-February of next year.

## Utility Company to Enlarg Area Plant

McCamey—A major expansion at the Rio Pecos Electric Generating Plant was announced today by West Texas Utilities Co. The generating capacity of the plant will be increased to more than  $2\frac{1}{2}$  times its present size.

The \$8 million construction program was announced by Roff W. Hardy, WTU President, who cited this new construction as evidence of the company's continued planning and building to provide power for West Texas growth and development.

Hardy said, "While we are still working to complete the second unit of the new San Angelo power generating station, our Engineering Department has been busy on plans and designs for this new generating facility at the Rio Pecos Plant."



haps, ought to be cleared up a little and that's the cost. It now looks like the total sum has been trimmed a little from what was first thought needed. But, regardless of how much the final bond issue is for, it will have to be repaid with tax money. You can't have a tax bond without taxes. At the same time, in a county with the overall value such as that of Upton County,

the amount per tax payer is going to be mighty small considering what we will get for our money. Personally, I hope that me nor my people will ever have to use either of these hospitals or any other but the chances that we will someday need the services of a hospital are very great just as they are for any of you. And when that day arrives, I know I want to go into a first-rate hospital, not a rundown cow barn.

Some four years ago, we of the Rankin Independent School District approved a bond issue almost as large as will be this county-wide amount and to date I haven't heard of the added taxes being a burden to anyone. In fact, I don't think my share has amounted to as much in a year as I spent going to the football game in Midland last Saturday night.

In this day and time when we Americans spend more for dog food, smokes, hooch, sports, and assorted other pleasures than our grandparents did raising a family, it would be pretty hard for me to say no to a proposition that can mean as much as good hospitals for what will amount to a pittance.

But there again, I plan to live to be 110 and drop dead someday when a long putt finally falls so what I may be for is better golf greens and to heck with hospitals.

As most of you know by now, Doc Gossett is going to be out of circulation for a few weeks. He's going to have to take a little of his own medicine. But, being somewhat on the considerate side, he has gone to a great deal of trouble and expense and finally located a replacement to mind the store while he's out of circulation.



begins years before actual construction is started. The Company
is constantly planning five to
ten years in the future to provide for our customer's electrical needs.

The new unit, to be added at the Rio Pecos station which is located seven miles west of Mc-Camey, will be a conventional reheat steam turbine-generating unit. The unit will have a capacity of 95,000 Kilowatts and the steam turbine is being designed to operate at 1,450 pounds pressure per square inch and at 1000 degrees F. temperature and 100 degrees F. reheat temperature.

Construction of the new unit is scheduled to begin in June, 1967 with the target date for completion in May, 1969. The major items for the plant, the steam turbine-generator and the steam boiler, have just been purchased.

The Rio Plant was originally built in 1927, with new units being added in 1954 and 1959. Currently the plant has a generating capacity of 59,500 KW and is operated by a crew of 27 employees under the direction of J. C. Carroll, plant superintendent.

In addition to the Rio Pecos Plant, West Texas Utilities operates seven other modern generating stations. These stations, which are interconnected with 138,000 and 69,000 volt transmission lines, supply energy for 167 towns and communities in fifty West Texas Counties.






