They seldom seen able to get any pictures of mar of these same people standing in line to get relief checks or surp lus food. They can't seem to fin any well-to-do minority people the land. They can't find minority people who ho.d steady jobs and who are responsible citizens

They can't find the minority people who have worked their way out of the poor house.
In fact, there's dang few things that they can find that shows anything good being done for anybody.
I guess I'm way our of touch with the times, but I can't believe the American people are of a mind to quit in Viet Nam. I don't believe we are afraid of what the Chinese Communists plan to try to do to the world. And above all, I do not believe that the American people have given up on the idea that a person-any person-can go as high in this land as he is wiling to work his way.

I think the tv people are on a kick of trying to shape the thinking and sympity of the pubile in a way they are not going to follow.
