

However, after reading them ,I, for one still don't know what's going on except that Rankin has been approved to receive a good bit of Federal aid including urban renewal. Just where that part came in is another of those things that seem to crop up in Federal dealings but as long as we are "approved", it might be worth looking into.

Another item for which Rankin got approval in the process is "certain types of FHA mortgage insurance programs." And, again, nobody seems for sure to know what is covered. Rankin has been getting FHA loans on

housing for a good while but apparently, we are now qualified for something more in addition to what we've had in the past. This is another item that might be worth expanding.

Being approved, I suppose, does not mean that we will automatically receive any money for the low rent project but it is a step that has to be taken and we have now taken it. What comes next may well depend on a visit expected shortly from a field representative from the Ft. Worth office of the FHA. He is expected any time now.

In a way, it sorta reminds you of the kids' game, "May I." If you do everything right, you may take the next step forward. Goof up and you may well have to start over.

As their first undertaking, the Housing Autority of Rankin has requested 40 low-rent housing units of its eventual goal of 75. request is justified.

Should this number be approved, one of the first areas to get attention will probably be the area south of the highway and certain other properties in other parts of Rankin. This part of the project will be determined at a later date by the Authority after approval of funds is received.

plus the use of systemics insectheides to keep away some of the more troublesome pests.

First things first, we will discuss some of the newer varieties. The "Mexicana", 1966 Rose of the Year, was tested by 15,000 home rose growers all over the country. It's dominant color is an intense red, with petal reverse a pure ivory white. Open flowers of perfect hybird tea, form a spread of 512 inches.

The "Indiana", a vivid red, is also an outstanding new variety.

The use of systemics will make rose growing vastly easier and more successful. The chemicals, applied either as granules to be watered into the soil, or as a spray on the foliage enter the sap steams of the rose for internal protection against aphids thrips, lacebugs, spider mites and other sucking insects. At least one product on sale this spring is a rose food and systemic pest control combined. All systemics are long-asting insecticides that move into new growth, can't wash or blow away, and if package directions are followed, they

Equally helpful are the preemergent weed killers that prevent seeds of weeds and grasses from sprouting. Here is the routine: prepare soil, plant roses, sprinkle granules out of shaker can, over soil. Two or three applications will do the trick for the season.



making your shoulders higher or lower than they should be.

3. SEAT. Notice the angle of the seat. The sitting position should be at least a ninety degree angle at the hips and at the knees. If the angle is less than that, your knees are placed higher than your hips. Such a position causes discomfort.

4. LEGS. Be sure that the chair or sofa legs are of the right height. The length of the legs should allow you to rest your feet on the floor as you sit.

5. SIZE. A perfectly designed chair or sofa can be the wrong size. Chairs can be misfits in width as well as depth. For instance, a chair with armrests should be the proper width for using both of them comfortably. And the depth of the seat should be slightly less than the length of your thigh.

For all people 65 years of age before January, 1966, March 31, 1966, is the deadline for signing up for Medicare which goes into effect July 1, 1966. Anyone who

has not filed should do so at once. People wishing to change their medical election from "NO" to "YES" may do so if their requests are received by March 31, 1966. Please ask them to write the Odessa office, and we will furnish the proper forms.

As you may know, Medicare enrollment is open to practically everyone 65 or over. No prior work is required, not even a social security number (one will be assigned). Thise still working need to enroll. Certain aliens are also included.




