A. B. McGill Retites from School Board



A. B. McGILL retiring from board

When the new school board is made up in April, following the elections Saturday, the name of A. B. McGill will not appear on the letterhead-something that has not been the case for some 21 years now.

McGill was elected to the board in April, 1945. He has stood for re-election each three years since that time and has never been defeated. This year, he did not seek re-election.

During that time, he has served with seven superintendents beginning with John Prude and including Earl Rogers, Hamliton Still, J. L. Alderdice, Joe Scrivner, Kenneth C. Welch and the present superintendent, Bill J. Hood. During that time he attended some 341 board meetings.

In 1945, the Rankin system employed 8 teachers. Today, there are thirty-three. In 1945-46, the

school budget was \$43,162,30. In 1965-66, the budget was \$523.615.

At the time Mr. McGill went on the board, Rankin had one school building and it was constructed in 1928 at a cost of \$83-500. In 1964, the Rankin Schools physical plant had a value of \$1,614.648.00.

At its regular March meeting. the Board of Trustees of the Rankin Independent School District entered a resolution commending Mr. McGill for "faithful and diligent efforts while serving on the Rankin School Board."

Upon his retirement, the News asked for comments from the last three superintendents to work with McGill. Their comments follow:

Supt. Bill J. Hood: "Certainly I would concur in this resolution (by the board) and add that it has been a pleasure to have worked with Mr. McGill for the past thirteen years. Throughout this period of time, the question always asked of school matters by Mr. McGil was 'Is this best for Rankin Schools?' His actions were taken according to his thinking in terms of the answer to that question.



customers coming from Crane, McCamey, Iraan and Midland as well as locally. Many salesmen and travelers always made it a point to arrive in Rankin at meal time for a serving of barbecue.

Around the first of this year, Hurst began negotations for the former Warren Grocery and Ice property, owned by Mr. C. C. Luther of San Ange.o. Agreements were reached and a trade was made whereby Hurst acquired all the property—several lots, a residence and the old ice house. Remodeling was started and the first phase is now complete with the exception of some new equipment that will be installed when it arrives. The \$500

has now grown into an investment worth over \$18,000 in equipment and fixtures—plus the property itself.

And the menu has been expanded. Still specializing in barbecue. Hurst's also offers steaks, sea foods, breakfast meals, a hot lunch, barbecue to go, and does a good catering business in serving special dinners.




