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

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

dollars for this or that little item at school. Rankin Schools are likely no better and certainly not as bad as most other schools, in this respect.

Now comes State Education Commissioner Dr. J. W. 

Edgar said was that plate the constitutionnt for free public school systems and that schools ought to be just that-free. They are to be supported by tax money and not by special assessments.

He did say that some charges. such as those for lockers, could be made but that children who could not afford the fees did not have to pay them. However, for

those who could not pay, there was to be no embarrassment or humiliation such as having their names called out in class.

He said that the school district (Rio Hondo) should be restrained, and that the constitution and law do restrain it, from assessing unauthorized fees and following it with humiliation for faffure to

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be upheld-and follow the rules of the game.

If we are to have free public education, then let's do just that and cut out the penny pinching. If we can't afford it in the regular school budget, then let's do without it. And above all, in an institution dedicated to the teaching of the principles of fair play, integrity and constitutional government, let us do away with all forms of petty blackmail in all our operations.

RIGHT? RIGHT-

Recently the supreme court has outlawed the poll tax law saying that it violates one's constitutional rights to put a fee on the privilege to vote. Personally, I never minded the poll tax too much for it seemed like a pittance for such an important opportunity. However, I can see the logic in the court's decision and it's very probable that such charges as poll tax fees are in violation of the constitution.

Of course, using that same reasoning, it might well be that the auto license, the marriage license, the fishing license, etc. are also unconstitutional on the ground that they violate my right to the pursuit of happiness. In the case of an automobile, it is well within reason to say driving is a pleasure. In the case of the marriage license, I suppose there are cases where the pursuit backfires but generally, the parties involved start out with good intent. And by the same token, most of us have lost part or all our vote choices from time to time so to be a constitutional right, the benefit doesn't neces-

Ballots Ready for Demo Primary Vote

Recent action by the Upton County Democratic Committee included the drawing of names for places on the ballot and the ordering of the printing of callots.

This major survey would also e termine the exact location of such dam or dams.

Aside from the actual controll ing of flood waters, the price will also be considered in th light of any side benefits that might result. Among these might be the empounding of water to recharge municipal water wells located in the draw. It might also, at least for a time, form a lake suitable for recreational purposes.

At any rate, Rankin has taken another step on a series of undertakings underway which upon final completion-could resuit in a good many changes for the better.

These ballots, for the first primary election on May 7, are now in the hands of the county clerk where absentee voting will open on April 17. This portion of the balloting will run until May 3.



UPHOLSTERED FURNITURE

When buying upholstered furniture, learn to judge quality in fabrics.

The flat-surface fabrics like damask, brocade, and satin show the effects of abrasion since the long threads are on the surface and are subject to wear.

Pile fabrics, like frieze, plush and velvet when made of firm yarns with deep and close pile and firmly held to the ground cloth, withstand abrasion quite well. A pile fabric with uncut toops mats less easily than one in which the loops are cut.

weaves, nylon velvets, patterned cottons, rough textured homespuns, linens with a homespun air, stripes in flat weaves of cotton and rayon trapunto and quilting, sailcloth, acrilan, saran and vinyl plastics.

Most upholstery has a backing finish which is rubber, or a synthetic rubber or one of the newer foam products. This helps make the upholstery remain smooth and firm over the padding through repeated use. It also makes it easier for the upholsterer to handle.

Besides the natural fibers, cotton, wool, silk and linen, there are 16 other families of manmade fiber classifications. These include vinyon, nylon, vinal, modacry.ic metallics, rubber, azlon, acetate ofefin, polyesters, acrylics, glass, saran, nytril, rayon and spandex.

Try to learn the general characteristics of the fibers in a given family and the basic requirements for its care.

Regardless of the fiber content, an upholstery fabric should be strong and closely woven. It should also be comfortable to the touch. A rough fabric will prove uncomfortable. Remember, too, that texture has much to do with the warmth or coolness of the furniture.


