## Bank Business Still on Upward Trend

Banking operations at First State Bank in Rankin continued their upward trend in a report filed as of June 30 by the local financial institution with the Federal Reserve Bank. Total deposits stood at \$4,066,922.14 as of June 30, compared with \$4,016,160.60 for about a \$50,000 gain over a year ago. Total assets at the current time amount to \$4,647,000.00 as compared with \$4,546,818.42 at this time last year for about a \$100,000 increase.

Another item that has gained has been loans. In the current statement \$2,039,182.53 was out in the form of loans as compared with \$1,916,750.83 last June.

Undivided profits this year were at \$185,763.72, down from last year's figure of \$197,218.47. Surplus at the bank has been increased by \$25,000 to a total of \$175,000.00. Total capital accounts were up from \$488,316.42 to \$510,763.72.

# BIDS ON RANKIN HOSPITAL JOB RUN OVER AVAILABLE FUNDS

To build or not to build wasn't so much the question facing the Rankin Hospital Board and Upton County as was the matter of where to get the money.

At the opening of bids last Tuesday for remodeling and adding on to the Rankin Hospital, it was found that the cost of plans under consideration by the board would run several thousands of dollars above the approximately \$131,000 in the bond issue for this portion of the work.

With this development, it became necessary for the board and their architect to get their heads

together and start trimming down on their plans. Already sidetracked has been the proposed chapel. Even with this omission—and others, there was still about a \$12,000 gap between the total of the three lowest bids and the amount of money available in their categories for the work. All three low bid firms were out-of-county concerns.

One portion of the bidding, on the proposed air conditioning system, was drawn in such a manner that no local firm was able to submit a bid—including West Texas Utility Company, specialists in air conditioning and electrical installations.

As of Wednesday, the Rankin Hospital Board had instructed their architect to get together with the low bidders and see if substitutions in materials and alterations in the plans could not be made to the extent of getting the cost down to the money available. Once this is worked out, the group will return to the Commissioners Court with their proposals and, if approved by the court, the contracts will be awarded.

Just when this can be accomplished has not been established but may well come next week.

## Water Situation not as Favorable as was Reported Last Week

Following a rather glowing report on Rankin's water situation only last week, it would appear that some miscalculations had been made as the water levels in the storage tanks dropped at the rate of about two feet per day this week. As of Wednesday, there was no water in the large tank near the Western Company and only about five feet in the water tower on the Midland Highway. All wells, including the old City wells in Rankin Draw were in use and the production was still dropping behind the demand.

School and county users had been requested to shut off their irrigation water Wednesday in an effort to gain a surplus. No formal action toward water rationing in residential areas had been taken but as one party put it: "If we run out, we won't have to ask them to shut off yard watering."

Such situations have been faced before in Rankin during the summer months. July and August are usually the hardest on the supply. A rain—or even cooler weather—could ease the situation. Continued hot and dry may bring some new measures.

**Adopting Fawn Deer Is Bad Practice for All Concerned**

We are trying to make a successful soft sell right now in discouraging human interference with the Animal Kingdoms perennial efforts to reproduce. This crises becomes more chronic as civilization relentlessly shrinks the natural habitat.

The most poignant problem at this point involves people's insistence on "adopting" wild fawn deer.

School's out and people are everywhere. They're in the woods and fields with their dogs. The pets sniff a scent and soon they have located a pretty, spotted fawn deer. And the inevitable cry: "Oh, the poor, pretty lost thing. It's deserted by its mother."

If reason doesn't prevail right here, a great tragedy follows:

The doe deer, if the fawn is not taken, soon will return and reclaim it. She had left earlier, after securing the fawn in some weeds or brush. Even if the fawn is handled, the human scent will not deter the doe. She will re-

claim it. Besides, there is no way to legalize the adoption of a fawn. There is no such thing as a permit for keeping fawn deer. That

is the one stern rule the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has had to enforce to try to deter human interference with the Animal Kingdom.

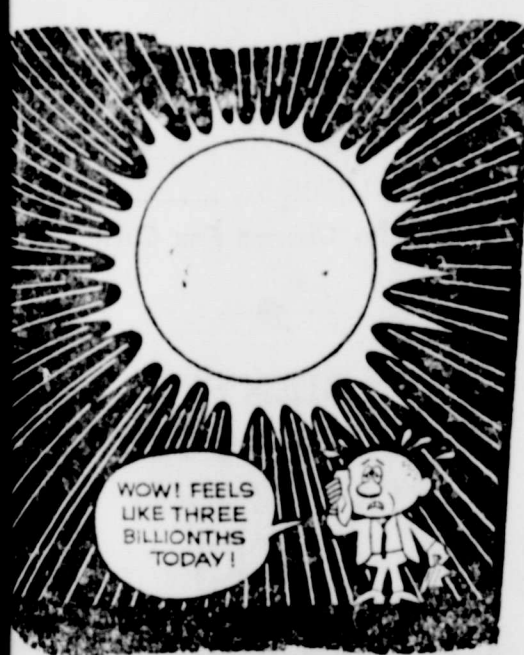

# HINTS for the HOMEMAKER

## HERE'S INFORMATION ON KITCHEN COUNTERS—

Is your family planning to build an eating counter in your kitchen for casual meals and snacks?

Before you add the counter, look at both your family and your kitchen.

Can your family easily use such a facility? Eating counters at stool height are uncomfortable for preschoolers and senior citizens. If your family has either age group, consider a chair height

counter which is more comfortable for all ages.

Next, how much space is required? You should allow a minimum of 21 inches in width for each person. To determine the length of a straight counter, simply multiply the number of family members by 21 inches. Remember that L-shaped counters require additional space at the turn. And allow space for people to sit at the counter with an adequate amount of room for passage behind each seated person.

Research studies indicate that a minimum of 44 inches is needed between the front edge of the counter and the nearest wall or solid object.

Are there other places for your family to dine? The number of dining areas needed depends on your family's pattern of serving family and guest meals. Most families want at least one meal each day to be a time for relaxation and conversation. Counters should be arranged so that it is not difficult to converse with everyone present.

A 30-inch high counter generally is comfortable for a person seated in a chair of average height. Allow a depth of 20 inches for leg room. A stool height counter should be 36 inches high. And allow at least 14 inches of knee space for a stool height counter.

## KOUNTY AGENT'S KORNER

Fading out of St. Augustine or carpet grass is prevalent in many areas of the state beginning with the hot season.

Some growers incorrectly refer to it as brown patch but this occurs in the cooler weather of spring and fall. Brown patch can be identified by the fact that leaves are easily pulled from the stolons, appear in a circular pattern and the stolons are not killed. The opposite of these is true with fading out.

Certain insects such as chinch bugs may cause symptoms that can be confused with fading out. Presence or absence of insects can be used as a deciding factor here, however.

Fading out is most difficult to control. Fungicide applications are not usually sufficient for satisfactory control and an attempt must be made to eliminate factors which are reducing the vigor of the grass and thereby lending to the problem of fading out.

The following steps are suggested for most effective control of fading out:

1. Prevent the development of a thatch by catching grass clippings at the time of mowing. Organisms that attack living grass stolons build up to high levels in thatch and make normal de-
