

The stock sales for the financing of a recreation center for Friona reached \$13,000 on Monday of this week. Officials are shooting for a \$40,000 goal. It appears that the group will be able to use the old Friona Lanes location, it has been disclosed.

. . . . Betty Louise Rector, secretary-treasurer of the fund raising drive, said this week she wished to point out a few things which people have mistaken ideas about concerning the drive.

"We're not asking for donations," Mrs. Rector pointed "We're selling stock, out. Everyone who takes part will be a stockholder according to the amount he wants to buy. We'll have a corporation, run by a board of directors," she points out.

"While it's stock, we're not brash enough to intimate it will pay dividends right away. It might be some time," Mrs. Rector continued.

The fund drive represented continued by pointing out that some people were hesitant to buy stock, having had a recent bad experience along this line. "I would point out that this


project is organized by Friona people, as a means of helping the community of Friona. It is not by outsiders who you don't know," she said.

"To my knowledge, this is the first time that an organized drive has been carried out to help bring recreation to Friona. A lot of talk has been heard about the subject, but this is the first time an actual drive has been held."

Mrs. Rector pointed out that accurate records of stock purchases are being kept, and in the event that the drive fails to reach its required total, all money will be refunded, "However, we don't plan on failing," she quickly adds.

Unlike the teen center which operated last year, the proposed recreation facility will have adult directors. There will be no annual dues.

A contest is being conducted among the teams selling stock in the new venture. The winning team will get to participate in the facilities for one week



BAGWORM CONTROL

One of the most economical and efficient means of controlling bagworms is by removing the bags from the trees during the winter months and destroying them. Hand pick and burn the bags.

Bagworms belong to the order Lepidoptera -- moths and butterflies. The male larvae pupate and emerge from their tapered brown bags usually during late August. The female also undergoes pupation, but being legless and wingless, she remains inside her skin. After mating, the females then fall to the ground and die. The bag containing the eggs remain on the tree until the following spring.

If the bags are destroyed, the life cycle is broken. If not, the eggs hatch into tiny worms which begin feeding greedily on the surrounding foilate.
