## JUDGE'S FINANCIAL REPORT

Issue publication is a two-part Report Judge Allen Moore on the financial condition of the county. The budget for 1966 and expenditures for 1965 are completed and are in the office of the clerk. The valuation of all property in Upton County for 1966 is \$1,000,000. The total property taxes levied for 1966 on the above valuation and tax levy. Of this amount, it is estimated that 98.5 percent or \$985,000 will be collected during the 1966 tax year. From this amount, \$128,723.75 will be paid to the state and interest on the indebtedness of \$994,000. Receipts, such as licenses, fees, etc., are estimated to be \$280,401.54 to the operating funds. The operating indebtedness is estimated to be \$167,000 at the end of the year 1966. The operating income at the end of 1967 is estimated to be \$167,000. The Bridge Fund will be estimated to be \$167,000 and the General

Fund, \$206,703.53 at the end of the 1967 operating year. I might point out that the expenditures of the Officers Salary Fund, Park Maintenance and Operating Fund, Hospital Operating Fund and Law Library Fund are all dependent upon the General Fund for their operations.

Shown below are our actual expenditures for the years 1963, 1964 and 1965 and the estimated expenditures for 1966 and 1967. Under the Hospital Operating Fund, I have listed the receipts for those years and estimated receipts in order to show you the operating loss and expected loss for those years. Our loss for the hospitals the first six months of 1966 was \$43,755.68. The McCamey Hospital had receipts of \$21,758.61 and expenditures of \$46,668.93. The Rankin Hospital had receipts of \$29,758.61 and expenditures of \$48,190.67. However, due to a breakdown in the Rankin air conditioning system this past month causing major repairs, the expected loss of \$84,000.00 for the year 1966 will probably be greater than this amount. Total receipts and estimated receipts are listed under expenditures for those years.

# Limping Red Devils Test McCamey Badgers Friday

own. Since the current series was started back in '62, Rankin has yet to defeat a McCamey team. In the 1962 opener the Badgers won 28-12, shelled the Red Devils 42-20 in 1963, won 7-6 in '64—despite a clock that went hay-wire—and won last year by 14-6 when the Red Devils handed them the ball via fumbles on a regular basis.

Most fans have been saying that if Rankin is to get on the winning side of the ledger with the Badgers, they must start this year. What effect the banged-up ankles will have won't be determined until Friday night.

## Commissioners Hire Two, Appoint One

Among actions taken by the Upton County Commissioners in their meeting last Monday was the employment of E. M. Sullivan of Rankin as county maintenance man. Salary was set at \$400 per month and \$100 per month expenses, effective Sept. 1.

Clarence Weddle was employed as caretaker of the McCamey Park and Pool at a salary of \$125 per month and pickup expense of \$50 per month, effective September 1.

Mrs. Lawrence English was appointed to the McCamey Hospital Board to fill the unexpired term of Orville Jones who resigned.

Coach Wayne Mitchell said he expected the Badgers to come up with a number of changes from their last week's arrangement in which they lost their opener to a surprising Ozona squad by a 20-0. At the same time out in Marfa, the Red Devils—despite about 150 yards in penalties—dropped the Shorthorns by a 30-8 mark.

McCamey, apparently a bit on the surprised side in their encounter with Ozona, has been well regarded by poll pacers and is expected to be quite a bit tougher for the Red Devils. Most will rate the game a toss up with the homefield advantage going to Rankin.

At its last meeting Thursday, Sept. 8, the Board of Trustees of the Rankin Indep. School District accepted the resignation of Board Secretary Grady Holder, who has moved to Oklahoma City. The Board accepted his resignation with regret and commended Mr. Holder for his helpful and cooperative attitude in dealing with school affairs.

To fill the un-expired term of Holder, the Board appointed Mr. Floyd Turner. Turner, an employee of El Paso Natural Gas at the Pembroke Plant, was a candidate for the school board last April. He has been a resident of the Rankin School District for thirteen years. The Turners have two sons, Mike, a high school junior; and David, who is in the 3rd grade.

Billie S. Brown, the assistant secretary of the board, was elected to serve as secretary and Leslie McFadden was elected as the board's assistant secretary.

The 1966-67 school tax rate was officially set at \$1.50 per \$100 assessment value with such rate to be divided 13.7 percent to the Interest and Sinking Fund, 86.3 percent to the Local Maintenance Fund.

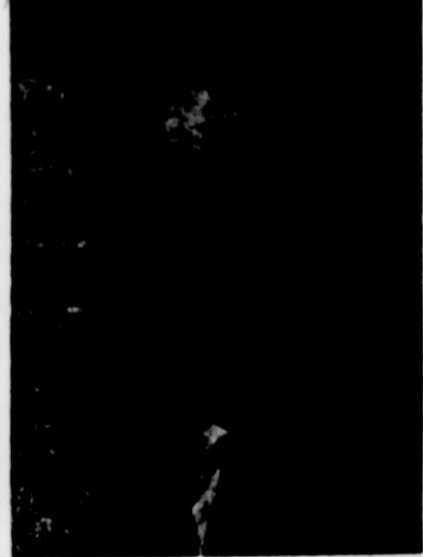
Bell has urged that all persons interested in a Boy Scouting program for Rankin get in touch with him. Particularly needed are men leaders and committeemen.

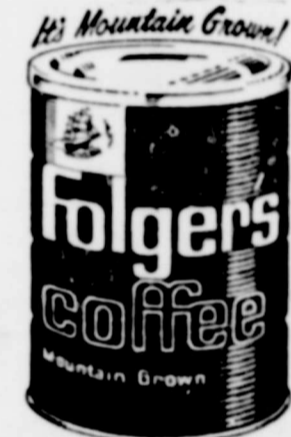

**THE FEDS—**

Along last December, Rankin was led to believe that there was

ample chance for some low rent housing here. All indications available at that time pointed to this end and gave the impression that all that was necessary was for Rankin to act.

We acted. In fact, if you recall, an election was held on Christmas eve since the word was that the sooner we moved, the sooner we would get results.

Things don't seem that way anymore. In fact, it seems now that Rankin is going to have to wait and see what Big Lake decides in an election about low rent housing. And this election, incidentally, came at exactly the opposite end of the procedure from the one in Rankin. We held ours and then went ahead. Big Lake has done all their paper work, been approved for 20 units or twice as many as Rankin, and is now going to have their election to see whether or not they want low rent. And since they apparently are getting better results than did we, it may well be that in matters dealing with the government, you come out better when you start at the end

and work up to the beginning. And if that sounds a little cockeyed to you it will indicate that you have never had any close dealings with the Federal government.

Last week it rained. It was about the best rain seen in these parts in ten or fifteen years.

And it proves that Lyndon isn't mad at us as some had feared.

# HINTS for the HOMEMAKER

By Mrs. Louie S. Jeffers, County Home Demo. Agent

Would you be interested in saving one-half your milk bill and still have your child well fed?

One quart of milk each day for your child need not be all whole milk. Non-fat dry milk has all the nourishment in the milk—protein, carbohydrates, minerals and vitamins. Only the water and fat are taken out.

To save half or more of the milk cost, mix one quart of non-fat dry milk with one quart of whole milk. This makes one-half gallon that costs only 40c instead of 57c. When the mixture is thoroughly chilled, it will be as delicious to drink as the whole milk.

For 49c you may have as much as 2¼ gallons for the price of one gallon of whole milk.

Non-fat dry milk may be used in baking by adding the amount of dry milk needed to the dry ingredients and water or liquid as the recipe plans.

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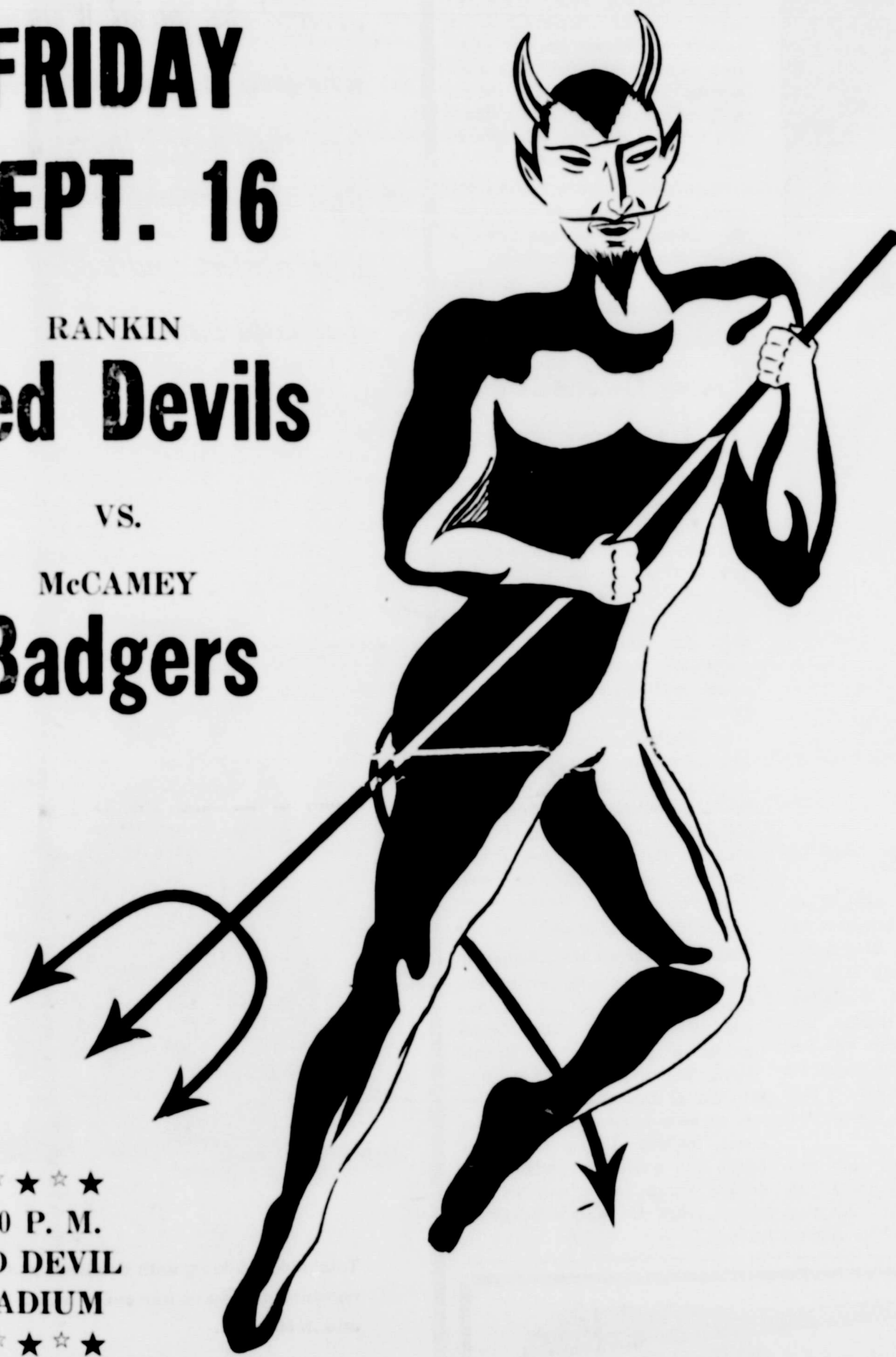
