Callahan County Judge Byron Richardson said Thursday night that the commissioners court had voted to discontinue its part in the tri-county Bookmobile.

The program has been financed through help from the Texas Wylle in June of 1959. State Library, which started it as a pliot project March 1, 1961.

Richardson said because of the county's financial situation. it was dropping its part in view of the fact that the state was expected to discontinue its aid beginning March 1.
