



A new baby doesn't necessarily require all new equipment, but everything he uses must be as clean as new. And with a little time and handiwork, it can also look as nice as new. Well-made baby furniture usually outlasts its original owner, so many mothers borrow a crib, carriage, playpen, and highchair-or buy these at the second-hand store. Often a inch of the frame and springs good scrubbing, a coat of nontoxic paint, and perhaps a yard or two of new fabric can give hand-me-downs a new lease on

with hot soap or detergent suds. Rinse-wipe with a clean, damp sponge, then allow the crib to dry thoroughly before any decorating. Whether it is to be painted or ornamented with decals, the wood or metal must be clean to give the finished job a professional look. While it is generally agreed that a baby should have a new mattress, a borrowed mattress may be in good enough condition and firm enough to be acceptable-if it has a plastic cover which can be sanitized. For this, scrub the top and edges with a brush dipped into hot suds, rinse off with hot water, and wipe dry. Then turn the mattress over and wash the other side the same way. If possible, put it outdoors to dry in the sun and fresh air.

A bassinette or car bed should also be scrubbed with hot suds. inside and out-using a sponge on smooth plastic and a brush on canvas or wicker. Then add a new ruffle or skirt made of a washable plastic or a no-iron fabric-because it will need frequent sudsing to keep it dust-free and sanitary enough to protect the new baby.
