Red Devils End Successful Season

With a lopsided 67-8 score, the 1966 Rankin Red Devils closed out their season in Menard last Friday night in a game which saw just about everyone scoring except the coach and which was quite reminiscent of the Sanderson win earlier in the season.

With this tally, the Rankin team brought their point production total to 279 as compared to 77 for their opponents. Their win-loss record closed at 8-2 with both losses coming in district play and giving them sole possession of the 3rd place slot in the eight-team district.

The 1966 squad not only showed a strong offensive thrust — scoring more points in this one season than the combined efforts of the past two—but they also had the horses to win over two teams never before defeated by the current crop of Red Devil teams. These were Big Lake and McCamey. Although the club fell to Ozona for their only shut-out of the year, they hold previous victories over the Lions. This leaves only Sonora as the lone team currently on the Rankin schedule that has never tasted defeat at the hands of a Red Devil football team.

And as the curtain falls on the 1966 season, one can faintly hear that old sports lament: "Wait 'till next year!"

Coach Eyes Freshman Schedule --

Basketball Court Swamped with Overflow of Hopeful Prospects

Head basketball coach Bill Anderson was scratching his head and trying to figure out how to find room for upwards to fifty basketball players in the Rankin High School gym. With one of the biggest turn-outs ever for the hardwood sport in Rankin High history, Anderson said that he was trying to arrange a Freshman schedule in addition to the regular A and B team slate. Sixteen freshmen were on hand for the first day's workouts and a few others were expected.

With his roster still incomplete, Anderson had, in addition to the sixteen Freshmen, thirteen Sophomores, three Juniors and nine

Seniors. And within that group of figures may well be found the key to the prospective fortunes for this year's Red Devil basketball squads. They will have plenty of depth but very little experience.

Only three regulars were back from last year's squad—along with four more from the traveling squad. Earlex Williams, Ricky Barnes and Mike Wheeler were starters last year while Jim Pettit, Joe Clark and Ronald and Donald Ivey were back-up men. All are seniors.

Anderson said that only one from last year's B team might be a prospect for the A squad. He is Sophomore Randy Edgar. Another prospect who will be eligible in time for district play will be David Pina, transfer senior from McCamey.

Again, as in the past, District 8-A is divided into an East and West Zone for basketball play. In the East Zone will be Sonora, Eldorado, Junction and Menard. Comprising the West Zone will be Rankin, Iraan, Sanderson, Ozona, Big Lake, a former member and long-time contender in the district, was moved to Class AA.

First action for the Rankin High squads will come Friday when the A and B team travels to McCamey for a pair of games. Time will be at 6:30 p.m.

In all, the Red Devils have some

nine non-conference games scheduled in addition to three or four tournaments including their own on December 2-3.

OTHER BASKETBALL—

Elsewhere in school basketball, the Rankin Junior High Girls are to play the first game of the season when they journey to Grandfalls on Thursday, Nov 17.

On November 22, the A and B Girls of RHS will host Mertzon in their first action. The girls' team may have the best prospects for a winning season of any of the school squads as they return all their starters except one from last year's team. The girls will play nine non-conference games and participate in three tournaments before entering district competition.

Prices Hiked on Basketball Games

At their last meeting, Rankin School Board, among other actions taken, voted to raise the admission prices at home basketball games to 50-cents for adults. Previously, the adult price had been 35-cents.

Student admissions will remain the same as in the past at 25-cents.

This is the first change in admission prices to basketball games in the last fifteen years or more.

MORE PAY—

The following report comes to hand from the Texas Press Association in Austin. It sez:

"School teachers are moving boldly forward with their drive for an \$85,000,000 a year pay raise. This, despite the fact that they don't have the support of the governor's committee on education needs.

"Texas State Teachers Association seeks salary increases that range from \$61 to \$100 a month. This would cost the state \$68,000,000 and local school districts \$17,000,000 annually.

"TSTA says it has rounded up considerable support in the Legislature and among education-support groups.

"But the governor's committee voted not to make any reports on any phase of its far-reaching study until it has completed its research into all areas of public schools.

"A committee resolution recognized that salaries are important to staffing schools but ad-

ded that other factors are just as vital in determining the effectiveness of teachers and administrators.

"Without a committee recommendation, there will be sentiment among lawmakers to tell teachers they will have to wait another year for pay adjustment. Teachers will bring pressure on legislators to act immediately. This will be one of the toughest problems legislators will face during the 1967 session."

So says the Austin report. And to which most folk will say: "Gee whiz. Teachers are getting to the point that they want more money every time your turn around."

And the truth of the matter may well be that they can get it. According to a report by the TSTA, Texas is faced with the worst teacher shortage in 25 years and the situation may get worse before it gets better. The TSTA spokesman says that there

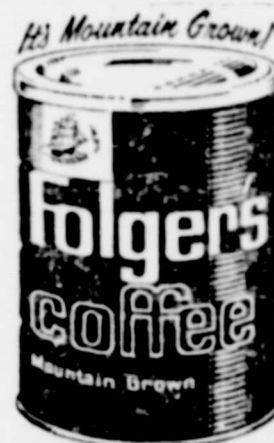

Rankin Marine Ends Combat Training



Camp Pendleton, Calif., Oct. 27. Marine Private Lasaro C. Abalos, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Lasaro Abalos of Rankin has completed four weeks of individual combat training here.

During the training period, he received more than 200 hours of instruction in guerrilla warfare, the use of infantry weapons, combat patrols and squad tactics.

His next assignment is four weeks of basic specialist training to prepare him for a specific job in the Marine Corps. Marines to be assigned to infantry units will be taught sub-specialties such as the technical operation of the machine gun, grenade launcher, or mortar. Those entering high skilled occupational fields will receive advanced training at resident technical schools.

Annual Hunt Season Opens; Deer Supply Almost Unlimited

A massive man vs. beast conflict that could pit half a million hunters against Texas' estimated 2,500,000 deer heard was initiated Saturday, November 12.

That was the opening date for the annual big game season in most Texas counties under direct harvest supervision of the Texas Park and Wildlife Department.

The kickoff for most counties where wildlife resources are managed by the Texas Legislature was Tuesday, November 15, the traditional opener.

There are many deviations from these dates according to the Department, including the popular Trans-Pecos 16-day season beginning Saturday, November 26.

Every indication points to a tremendous harvest of deer. And that is the fervent wish of game management authorities. Their successful efforts over the years have raised the once sparse whitetailed deer herds to such enormous proportions that only a record harvest will avert a possible over-population crisis.

Likewise, the wild turkey prospects were reported substantial.

The response by sportsmen seems adequate. Department headquarters personnel report unpre-

cedented requests for hunting licenses that apparently will far exceed last year's 745,000 overall total.

Ammunition dealers report sales so brisk that their supplies of certain kinds of rifle bullets have become limited.

From the ranges comes word of the Department that deer have never been so numerous and generally are in good condition, all because of the food supplies. The surplus is so great in many counties that a third, or bonus, antlerless deer is authorized under the permit system.

And the weather provided a pre-season bonus in some places with rain to moisten the tinder-dry range, lush with heavy vegetation, plus cool temperatures to hasten defoliation of brush areas to improve hunter's visibility.

The setting is so ideal that the Department could add only the suggestion that sportsmen inform themselves on various regulations involving bag limits and dates in different areas. A specially prepared Hunting Guide long ago was sent to license agents and field forces to be distributed on request.

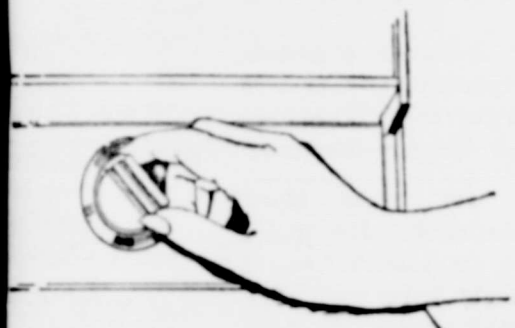

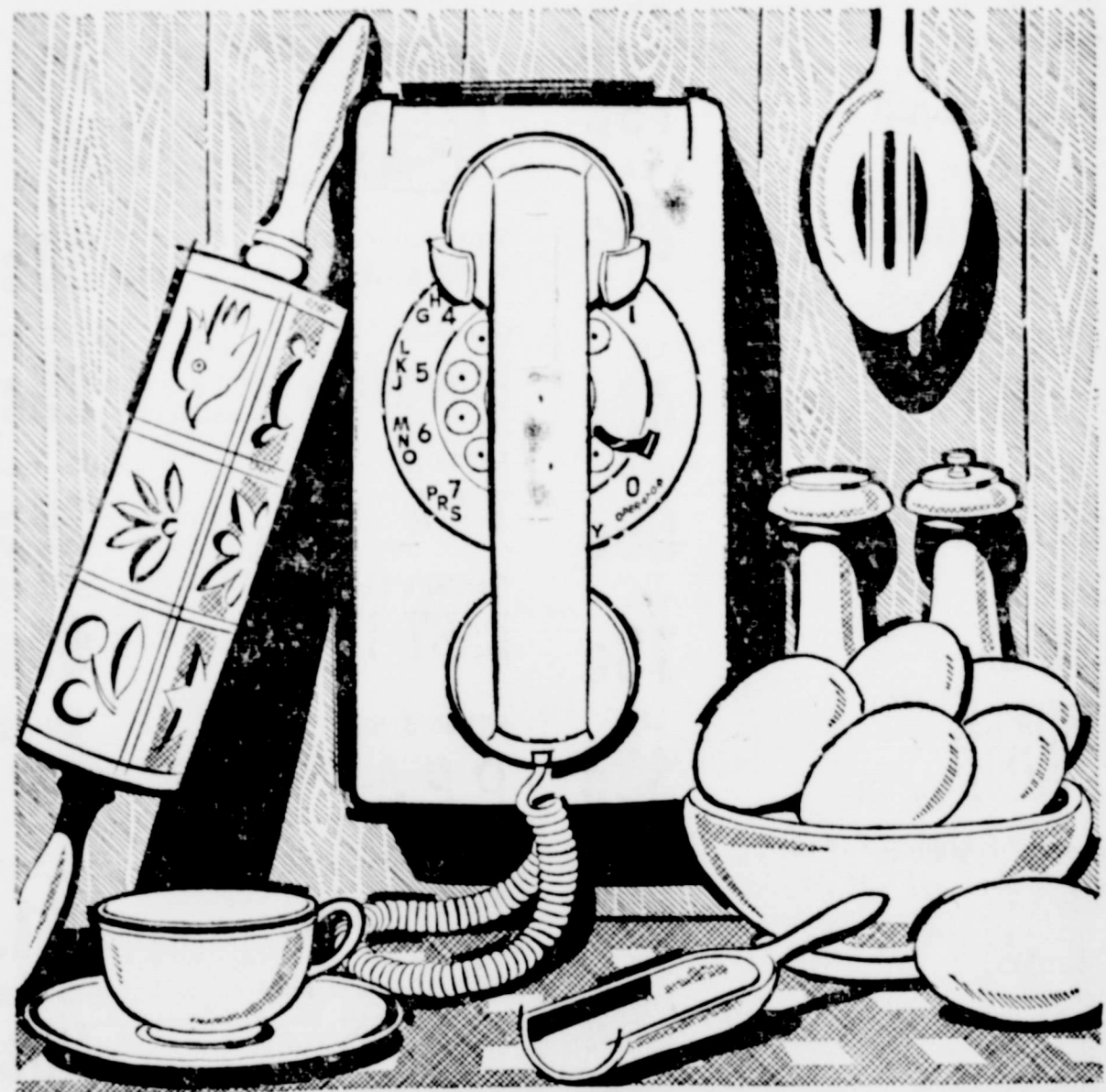
