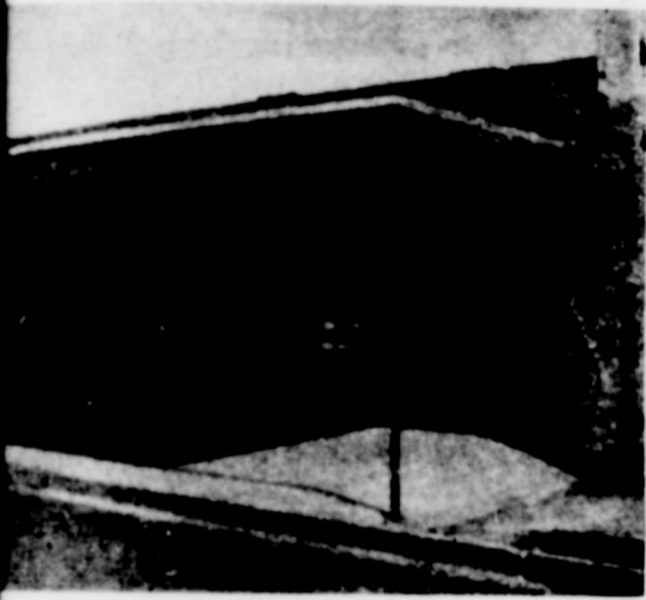

# Rankin School Board Race Draws Numerous Entries

After getting off to a slow start action in the upcoming Rankin School Board race took a new turn this week as five candidates announced for the two seats that will be up for voting in the April 1 election. Both incumbents, Billie S. Brown and C. J. Shaffer have announced for reelection.

Others in addition to Brown and Shaffer who have already filed for a place on the ballot include Johnny Rankin, E. M. Sullivan and Larry Phillips. With the deadline to have been March 1, still more entries were possible before the closing of the ballot list.

Shaffer, serving on the Board since 1958, is the oldest member in terms of service and is seeking his fourth term. Billy Brown is making his second quest for a seat on the board having been elected in 1964.

Rankin, who has lived in Rankin for a number of years with the exception of off-and-on periods when he resided elsewhere, is making his first run for a place on the Board. He is an in-

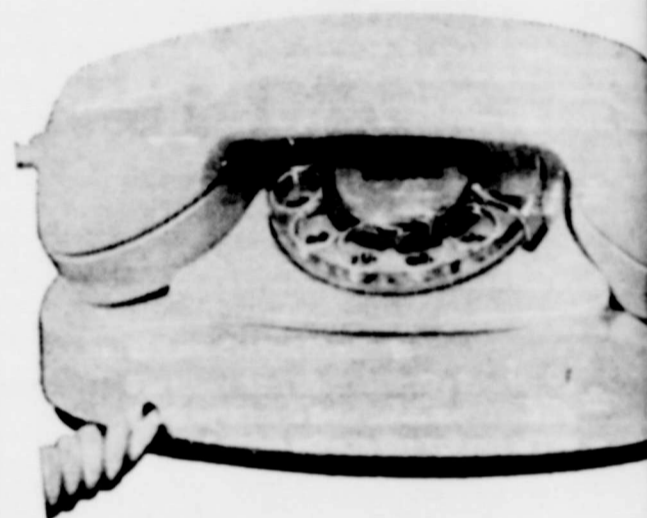

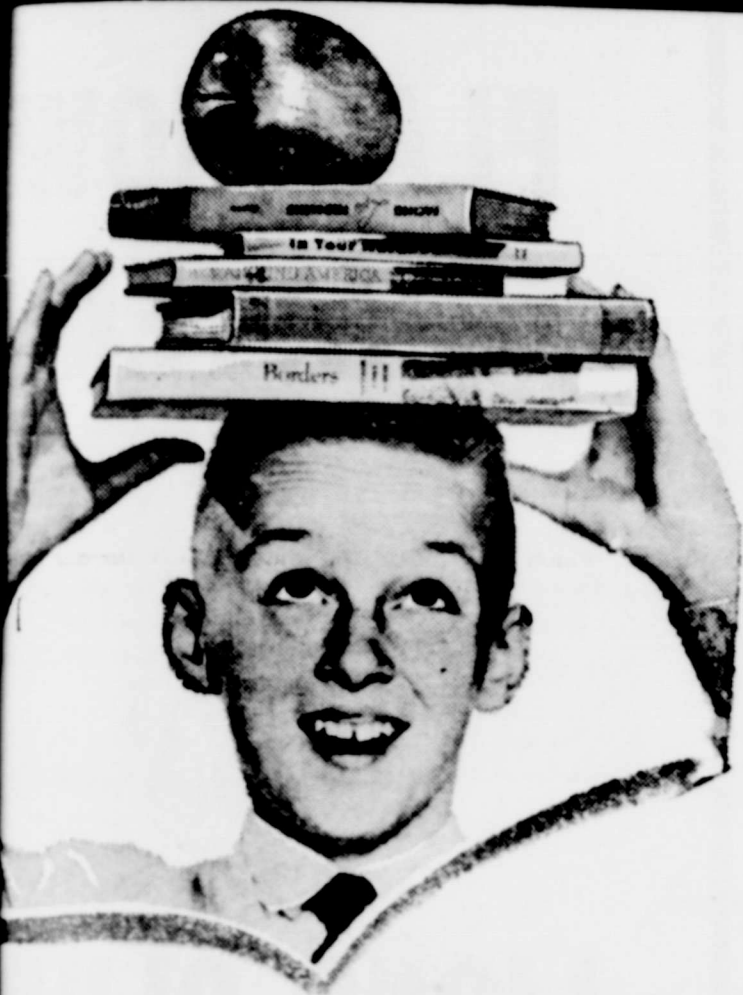

#### ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

Rankin Elementary School contains grades 1-4 with each grade divided into 3 sections. As of March 1, there were 240 elementary

pupils being taught my 12 classroom teachers and one public school music teacher. A part-time librarian also serves the elementary school

#### JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL

Rankin Junior High contains grades 5-8. Eight full-time classroom teachers, a boys' coach who also teaches in high school, a language arts teacher who also works

in high school, a band director for half days, and a librarian shared with the elementary school constitutes the faculty for the 197 pupils in this building.

#### HIGH SCHOOL

Rankin High School, with an enrollment of 142 in grades 9-12, is staffed by ten persons assigned to these grades throughout the day

plus a shared band director, a shared girls' P. E. teacher-coach, a shared math teacher, and a full-time librarian

#### DISTRICT-WIDE

The twelve grade system employs a total of forty professional personnel, including the above teaching personnel, three principals, and the superintendent.

A business manager, four secretaries, six custodian-bus drivers, two maintenance men, and seven cafeteria employees constitute the remaining number of the sixty school district employees.

### ORDINANCE NO. 1 LHA

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF MINIMUM HEALTH AND HOUSING STANDARDS BY ADOPTION OF A HOUSING CODE; FOR CREATING AN ENFORCING OFFICIAL INCLUDING QUALIFICATIONS, DUTIES AND INSPECTION POWERS; CREATING A BOARD OF HOUSING APPEALS; AND PROVIDING A PENALTY, SAVINGS, PUBLICATION AND DATE OF EFFECT CLAUSES.

#### SECTION 8—PENALTY

Any person, firm, corporation or agent who shall violate a provision of this code, or fail to comply therewith, or with any of the requirements thereof, or who shall erect, construct, alter, demolish or move any structure, or has erected, constructed, altered, repaired, moved or demolished a building or structure in violation of a detailed statement or drawing submitted and approved thereunder, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. Each person shall be deemed guilty of a separate offense for each and every day or portion thereof during which any violation of any of the provisions of this code is committed or continued and upon conviction of any such violation such person shall be punished by fine not exceeding \$200.00.

AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING A FIRE PREVENTION CODE PRESCRIBING REGULATIONS GOVERNING CONDITIONS HAZARDOUS TO LIFE AND PROPERTY AND PROVIDING A PENALTY, SAVINGS AND PUBLICATION; DATE OF EFFECT CLAUSES AND APPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES.

#### SECTION 7—PENALTIES

a. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of the code hereby adopted or fail to comply therewith, or who shall violate or fail to comply with any order made thereunder, or who shall build in violation of any detailed statement of specifications or plans submitted and approved thereunder, or any certificate or permit issued thereunder, and from which no appeal has been taken, or who shall fail to comply with such an order as affirmed or modified by the fire inspector or by a court of competent jurisdiction, within the time fixed herein, shall severally for each and every such violation and noncompliance respectively, be guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by fine of not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$200.00. The imposition of one penalty for any violation shall not excuse the violation or permit it to continue; and all such persons shall be required to correct or remedy such violations or defects within a reasonable time; and when not otherwise specified, each ten days that prohibited conditions are maintained shall constitute a separate offense.

b. The application of the above penalty shall not be held to prevent the enforced removal of prohibited conditions.

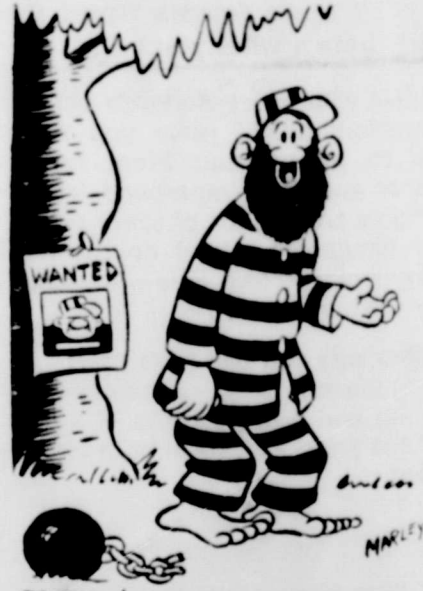
