Three ballots were "thrown out" by election judges. For the school, a total of 295 ballots were cast-about the us. ual number - with Billy Brown being returned to the board with a total of 160 votes. Running in second place and unseating a. nother incumbent, was Johnny Rankin who posted 127 votes on the tally sheet. Tied in third place were Carl Shaffer, long-time veteran of the board, and E. M Sullivan, They each received 98 votes. The other candidate on the ballot, Larry Phillips, received 50.
