## Eighteenth Annual All-Kid Rodeo to be Held Here June 2-3

Date for the Eighteenth Annual Upton County 4-H Club All-Kid Rodeo and Horse Show has been set for June 2 and 3. Performances will be held each night at 8:00 p.m. at the Dub Day 4-H Arena in Rankin.

Events will include calf roping, hair pulling, ribbon roping, pole bending, steer riding, barrel races, boot scramble and tire races. Entry fee has been set at \$3 per event with age limits being thirteen and under for the Junior Division and through sixteen for the Senior Division.

A parade will be staged at 5:30 p.m. Friday and the Second Annual Trail Riders are slated to arrive in Rankin on that date. A free barbecue will host the Trail Riders on Friday night.

Two classes will be offered in the Horse Show with age limits for contestants being governed by state 4-H rules. The Halter Class will be judged starting at 9:00 a.m., Saturday, May 3 with the Performance Class to follow at 1:00 p.m. on the same date.

# Computers will Take Over County Taxing Systems

Meeting in special session last Monday, April 24, the Upton County Commissioners Court, among other actions taken, signed an agreement with for preparation of the 1967 tax records with Ad Valorem Records, Inc. 3766 Richmond Ave., Houston Texas. Included in the agreement is an

arrangement whereby the firm is to convert the present county tax records to a unit system on IBM cards and to furnish materials and prepare tax records for 1967.

Charge for the service will be determined by the rate of 25 cents per unit of property including all minerals. It is estimated that the annual cost will be approximately \$8,750 for the present county tax roll.

In commenting on the transaction, County Judge Allen Moore pointed out that the overall present cost would be about the same as that currently being spent by the county in using their present method of preparing the tax roll, making out the statements and handling them a number of times through the local office. He said that county tax accounts are growing each year with seven new fields added this year alone. Also, many oil property tax accounts divide as owners die and heirs

divide the property—sometimes as many as fifteen different ways.

### Upton Hospital Bill

In a telephone call received last Thursday night from Rep. Gene Hendryx in Austin to county attorney John A. Menefee, it was learned that the Texas Legislature had passed a law permitting Upton County to vote on creation of two hospital districts within the county. The bill is presently awaiting the Governor's signature and will become effective immediately since it was passed as an emergency measure.

The Upton County Commissioners' Court is expected to call an election shortly after the Governor signs the bill which he may do at any time.

## A VOTE—

It now appears that in the very near future citizens of Upton County are going to go to the polls and decide on whether or not they want to form one or two hospital districts within the county or whether they had rather leave the financial operations as they are at the present—operated by the county.

At this date there appears to be little widespread interest one way or another on the question. A few apparently have their minds made up and a few more are in the process of doing so.

However, for most of us, there is still a good bit that is not too clear about the matter and there may be good cause to wait until more details are available before deciding on a stand.

Further reports are that this proposal will be given thorough public exposure before a vote is taken. Each voter will have the opportunity of getting his facts straight and I'd suggest that that is what we do. Like every

question, there are two sides and it would seem to me that this matter is going to be too important for snap judgments and hasty decisions.

Let's take a good, close look at the proposition and try to come up with a solution that will do the job—namely of putting our hospitals on the best possible operating basis whether it be by forming one or two districts or leaving it as it is. A little sincere effort on the part of all of us could pay a big dividend in better hospitals.

pay argument, the fact that the state of Texas ranks something like 37th in the nation in the amount of money spent on education. This part is—I suppose—true.

At the same time, the TSTA has always left the impression that this makes the quality of education offered in Texas public schools rank something like 37th in the nation and on that point I would challenge the TSTA and charge that they have permitted a misconception to grow about Texas education and have cast unwarranted reflections upon our public school teachers.

You cannot measure results in dollars and cents.

By using the TSTA argument that our education is 37th because our spending is 37th is to say that the same automobile bought in California is better than the one bought in Texas because it cost more in California. A house built in Texas—using the exact same materials—is, by this reasoning, inferior to one built in Pennsylvania simply because

it cost less here. By this reasoning, a grapefruit bought in West Texas is better than one bought in the Lower Valley in the same state just because it costs more.

By the TSTA standard, Rankin's students should always win the scholastic honors over such schools as Junction and Eldorado. Why? Because we pay our teachers more money.

It's a little ridiculous, isn't it?

When the TSTA, and those who parrot its pronouncements, comes up with a yardstick that gives a true measurement of the quality of Texas education and Texas school teachers—something that will measure by some means other than dollars and cents, then—if we are still so far down the educational ladder—a lot more people will begin to look to them as being something other than just another labor union.

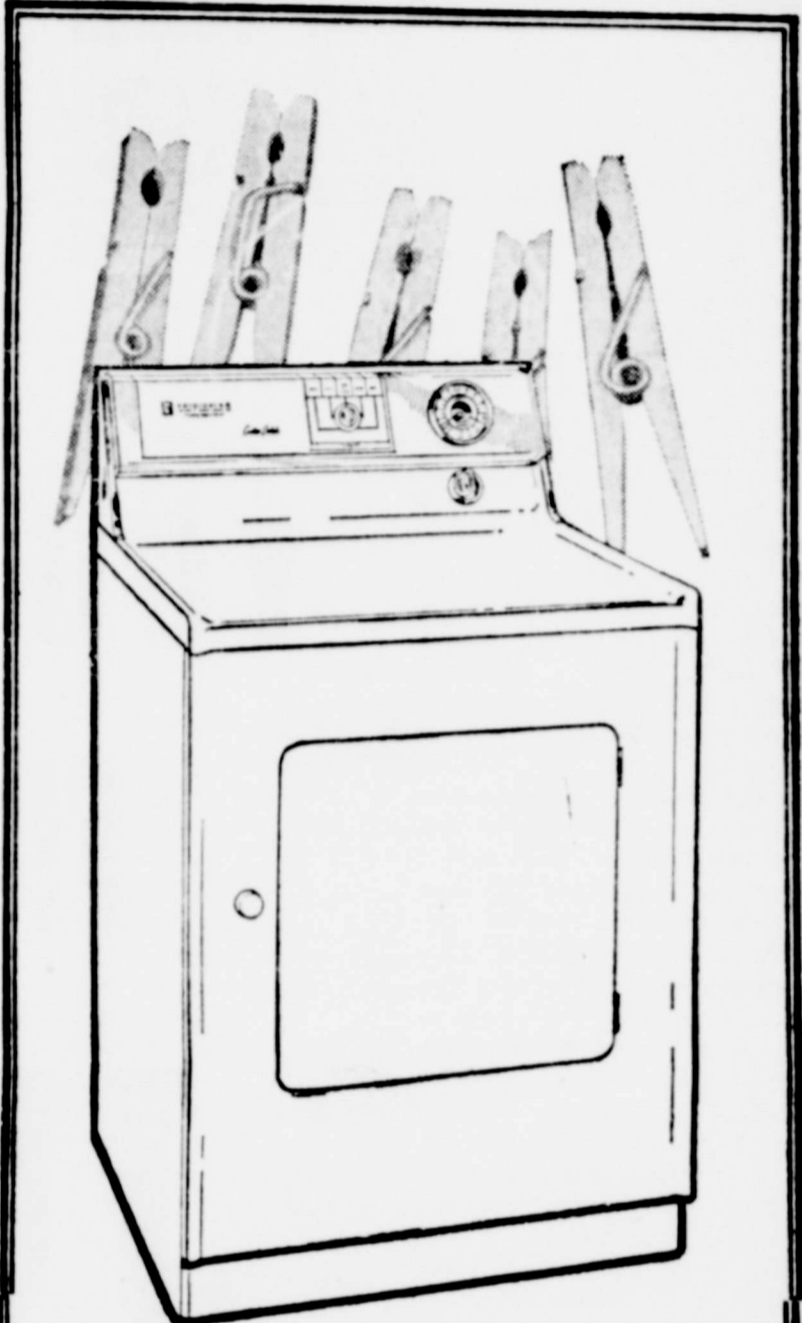

tax rolls, this IBM system will give us a considerable savings in money and work," the judge said. He also pointed out that in the event Upton County citizens decided to set up the proposed hospital districts, that their new taxing methods could be added to the IBM system without any extra cost.

In other transactions taken by the Court in their Monday meeting, an agreement was signed with Jacobs Livestock Company whereby that company agreed to permit Upton County to build a park near Castle Gap, and to construct certain roads leading into the area. Prepared in the form of a 25-year lease agreement, the transaction involves 100 acres of land owned by the Jacobs Livestock Company. This lease was given to the county free of charge, however, the county is to construct fencing for the area, install a windmill and troughs necessary to furnish livestock water, to furnish gates, and to buy caliche from pits located on the Jacobs property. In addition, the county is to install a plaque in the park that—among other wording—is to contain the fact that the tract of land was donated by the Jacobs Company. Further, should the county, at any future date decide to make a charge for use of the park, they are to pay the Jacobs Livestock Company a six percent royalty on the gross income derived.

Upton County will develop the park in cooperation with Crane County. All work must be done within eight months or the land involved will revert to the Jacobs Livestock Company.

## HINTS for the HOMEMAKER

### 4.H MEMBERS LEARN TO CARE FOR SEWING MACHINES

If you expect your sewing machine to give you the greatest service and satisfaction, you can't neglect proper care. To guarantee perfect operation, 4.H sewers need to clean, oil and lubricate their machines periodically.

Refer to the instruction book for specific care information and always for motor care instruction.

After you have completed a garment, remove lint and fluff from the take-up lever, thread guides, tension discs, bobbin case and machine surface with a soft, clean cloth. If necessary, dampen the cloth to clean the machine surface, but don't use a detergent.

Then with a lint brush clean the feed dog and hook or thread-handling areas under the throat and slide plates. After each cleaning apply a drop of sewing machine oil to these areas. For specific oiling points, refer to the sewing machine instruction book.

After oiling, always sew a few lines of stitching on a scrap of material to remove excess oil. Every few months, clean the area behind the face plate and oil the top and bottom of the machine in the oil holes.

If the machine is to be stored, clean all exposed parts and areas behind the face plate. Swab the parts with a lint brush saturated in sewing machine oil to protect the machine from rust. Rust damage is more likely to occur when the machine is stored in a closed closet than when the machine is kept open to the air. Keep a small piece of fabric under the pressure foot with the needle down through it to protect the foot and feed from damage. When the pressure foot is down, the pressure spring is released and its life prolonged. Also, excess oil will be carried into the fabric by the needle rather than accumulating on the needle.

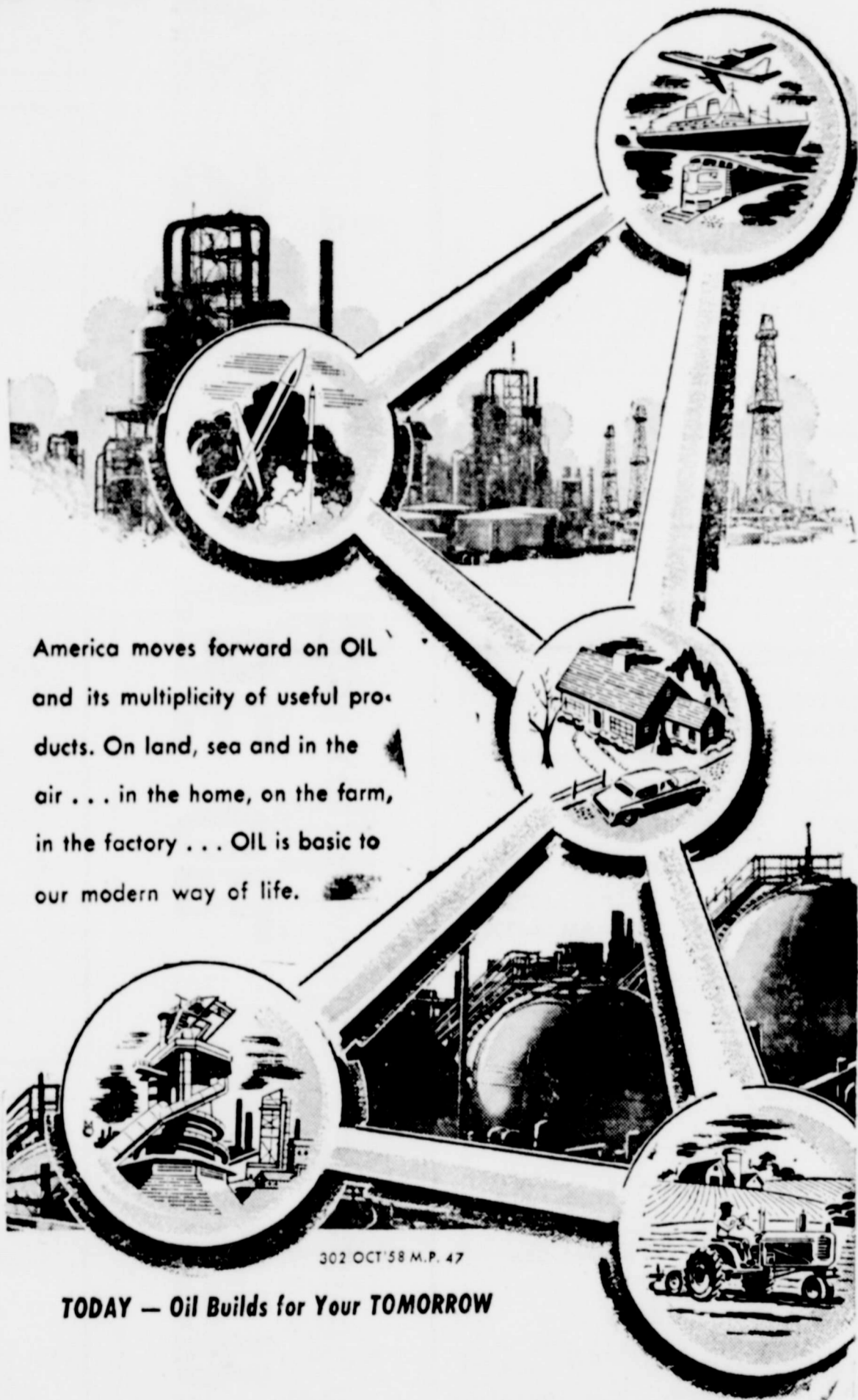

## RULES GOVERNING USE OF PARK BUILDING

Rules and regulations adopted by Upton County Park Building committee and approved by Upton County Commissioners Court:

1. The caretaker shall maintain, in good and clean condition, the building and its grounds.
2. Shall permit the use of the building to any adult person or persons who have made proper booking for same with the caretaker who is appointed to keep calendar dates for the building's use. The building to be opened at the appointed hours only if the sponsor or sponsors are present.
3. Shall be on the premises at all times the building is in use, other than office occupied hours by regular tenants.
4. Shall check out and in any equipment belonging to the building used for engagements in the building.
5. Shall maintain order and discipline in the building and on its grounds. Sponsors shall however, be expected to see that the events they are responsible for are properly conducted.
6. Persons using the building will be held liable for breakage, damage or loss to the building and-or its equipment. At no time shall anyone remove any equipment from the building for any purpose.
7. Persons using the building and its equipment shall on all occasions leave it clean or make arrangements for having it done by the caretaker.
8. On no occasion shall any intoxicating drinks of any kind be taken into the Upton County Park Building in Rankin, by any person or persons.
9. Closing time of the building shall be 12 P. M. (Midnight) unless special permission is granted by the caretaker for a later closing hour. Closing time shall always be at 12 P. M. (Midnight) on Saturday night and at no time shall be later than 1 A. M. on other nights.
10. Hours for making reservations shall be from 9 A. M. to 12 Noon, and reservations shall be made at least three days in advance.
11. No individual shall use the Upton County Park Building in Rankin for personal monetary gain.
12. The building will not be open on Sundays.
13. No food or drink will be taken into the auditorium except in the case of large parties that cannot be accommodated by the dining room and by special permission of the caretaker.

Persons interested in reserving the Park Building should remember that, since minors are not usually expected to sponsor their own activities,

reservations may be made only by adults.

ALSO, organizations holding regular weekly or monthly reservations are expected to

cancel in case of conflict with other activities. However, sufficient advance notice should be given so these organizations can make some other arrangements.
