In the financial condition re－ port from First State Bank，pub． iished this week and covering the bank＇s transactions as of the close of business，April 25，1967，only slight changes were noted from hat of a year ago
Current total assets for the bank stood at \＄4．712．178．79 comp－ ared with \＄4．731．494．98 for April 5， 1966.
Total deposits currently stood at $\mathbf{3 4}, 104.034 .37$ while a year ago they amounted to $\$ 4.157,786.50$ ．
