Brown Makes Proposal on McCamey Hospilal Site

Upton County Commissioners' Court met in regular session last Monday, June 12 and among matters transacted, heard a pro. posal by representatives of Mr. C. W. Brown, McCamey, for settle. ment of the question concerning land owned by Brown on which the new McCamey Hospital was inadvertently constructed.

Brown's representatives, Richard Barnes, an attorney, and Ray. mond Brooks. Brown's business manger, told the court that Mr. Brown would be willing to give Upton County a deed to the land involved under the hospital site provided the county would build a road or butaine by pass from the end of Annis Street in Mc. Camey to a point converting near the hospital or connecting with the McCamey - Iraan Highway near the McCamey Hospital.

ministrator's Certificate, and profess to high Christian ideals and moral ethics.

B. TERM OF OFFICE: The superintendent shall be elected by the Board at an official meeting for a length of time consistent with the wishes of the Board and permitted by law. The superintendent's contract shall be considered for extension or continuation at the regular Board meet ing in January of each year. On the first day of July thereafter the new or continued term shall begin.

C. DUTIES AND RESPONSI-BILITIES. The superintendent shall be the chief executive of. ficer to the Board of Trustees and the administrative head of all divisions and departments of the school system. He may delegate responsibility for the operation of the various segments of the school

educational program. Some of the specific duties and responsibilities shall be:

1. To attend all board meetings as chief executive officer . . .

2. To administer the school system in conformity with the approved policies of the board, the rules and regulations of the state department of education and the state law.



As presently operated and at the going loss rate, taxpayers would save something like \$110 .. 000.00 this year if the hospitals were under districts. That is THIS YEAR. Extend that by, say, ten years, and you have a figure that looks like a Senator's expense ac. count in the Federal budget.

We'd better pass this thing and without being presumptious, I would respectfully advise McCam. ey folk to do likewise. If hospital costs continue to rise for the next ten years as they have for the

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

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

Noted Author Speaks at Historical Session

Paul Patterson, well - known folk lorist, humorist and author of Crane, was guest speaker at the Upton County Historical So. ciety meeting May 11 at the fel. lowship hall in the Rankin Bap. tist Church.

Mrs. Patterson told the 22 as. sembled members and guests the history of Horsehead Crossing near Girvin. He began with the Spainards, who first crossed that way in the 16th century.

"The first white man to use Horsehead Crossing was a Dr. Connally from Kansas City who took some cattle through the lonely stretch," he said.

He detailed the other crossings by others and said that it was believed that the place got its name in 1849 when W. M. C. Whi.

ting, John R. Bartlett, and John Rip Ford crossed it. Rip Ford was the man who noticed so many horse skulls and thus named the place.

The Upton County native noted, "The first man who was acciden. tally killed there was a feller named Feller." Patterson wryly commented, "That on a tomb. stone might have been a hard tale to take, even in 1849."

The Crane educator continued with a brief run_down on the old Butterfield Stages which used the crossing beginning in 1858.


"The big cattle drives began in 1860. One time when Charles Goodnight used the Crossing, he lost 120 head of cattle," Patterson said.



Treat the whole family to one of the most favored of beef cuts-steak. You will see Dad's face light up when you prepare the tender, jucy cuts under the broiler.

It is recommended that you se. rib, short loin or sirloin. For de. licious eating, these cuts should have little connective tissues and some marbling of fat through the meat.

Broil until the top of the meat is browned, season, then turn and broil on the other side. After turning the steak, broil meat only half as long on the bottom as broiled on the top side.

The length of time that the steaks should remain under the broiler depends on personal taste as well as the broiler. A general rule would be to broil a Linch steak for a total of about 10 min. utes for a rare steak, about 15 minutes for a medium one, and about 20 to 25 minutes for well done.

For steaks that are 11/2-inches thick, the broiling time for rase is about 15 minutes; for medium, lect 1 to 2 inch steaks from the about 20 minutes, and for well. done, 25 to 30 minutes. The tot. al time for broiling 2-inch, rase steaks is about 25 minutes; med. ium steaks take 35 minutes and well done steaks take 45 to 50 minutes.

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


