
Under the present standards and due to recent legislation that becomes effective September 1, 1967, a student must have reached his sixteenth birthday before he may enter the Driver Education Program.



Drought injury can occur naturally or it may be induced by

The most common symptom of drought injury is the leaf mar. gins drying, with the dead area extending into the leaf and causing desiccations of leaf tis. sue between veins near the mid.

Natural drought injury takes place due to an inadequate sup. ply of soil moisture available to the plant. A deficiency of this state results in the death of feeder roots. Recovery to normal conditions is low

Man-made drought injury occurs when roots have been damaged mechanically or salt has accumulated in the soil. These high salt concentrations in the soil solution reduces water ab. sorption by the root hairs.

Root pruining will also account for drought symptoms. The con. struction of driveways, patios, and other masonry or asphalt structures near or around trees will interfers with gas exchange around the root and result in root pruining
