



pay interest thereon, together with any expenses as provided herein, in accordance with the resolution or resolutions authorizing the issuance and sale of such additional bonds, until there are sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds hereafter issued and sold, at which time all such moneys then remaining a part of said Veterans' Land Fund and thereafter becoming a part of said Fund shall be governed a elsewhere provided herein.

"This Amendment being intended only to establish a basic framework and not to be a comprehensive treatment of the Veterans' Land Program, there is hereby reposed in the Legislature full power to im-plement and effectuate the design and objects of this Amendment, including the power to delegate such duties, responsibilities, functions, and authority to the Veterans' Land Board as it believes necessary.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory na-

"This Amendment shall be come effective upon its adop tion."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have

Mosquitoes are a problem in many parts of the state and af. fect most everyone one way or another. They are a nuisance both to man and animal and some species transmit diseases such as malaria and yellow fev. er to men, encephalitis to man and horses and heartworms to dogs.

Mosquitoes breed from spring through to the fall months. Eggs are laid on water or in places that later become flooded, depending upon the species.

Home owners should take every precaution to precent mosquito breeding on their premises by e. liminating standing water.

Common problem areas include dripping outdoor faucets and leaky pipes, puddles resulting by evaporative cooler drainage and tin cans or other containers which may trap and hold even small quantities of water.

Proper use of insecticides a. round the home can be a big aid in mosquito control.

Good water management practices in irrigated sections of the state will also aid in controlling mosquitoes. Shallow, stagnant, standing water with debris or floating vegetation makes an extremely favorable area for mosquito breeding.


