KORNER

BARN PLAN FOR SADDLE HORSES

With careful planning and wise use of materials, a well constructed horse barn can be built at minimum cost.

The plan, developed by the U. S. Department of Agriculture Cooperative Farm Building Ex. change, provides enough space for four 12 x 12 foot box stalls and a combination tack and feed room.

The length of the barn, as shown in the plan, is 60 feet long and 12 feet wide. However, if you need to add more stalls, you can vary the building length. Build all the stalls in 12 - foot units.

The roof overhang, which is 8 feet wide, extends over a cov. ered way that provides a shell ter area for saddling, grooming, and other chores.

This type of building will be exposed to rough wear. The pole frame construction with squared posts set in concrete piers eli. minates the need for foundations and lateral bracing of walls. The posts and lower stall-lining planks should be pressure-treated to re. sist decay and insects.


