closely in the elementary school In the secondary school, the guidance program broadens to include future educational and occupational plans.

What Is Included in a Com. plete Secondary School Guidance Program? Counseling, the prima. ary activity employed in a guidance program, is the process by which a student is helped by conferences to understand him. self in relation to the developing and changing world. An import. ant part of this process may in. clude conferences with parents and teachers and the use of other school and community resources. The counselor uses individual

and group tests; school orienta. tion; information about vocational training, colleges, and careers; and placement facilities working with the individual student.

Leading authorities in educa. tion recommend that for effective guidance program there should be no more than 250_300 students per counselor. Nationally, in the public high schools, there is on. ly about 1 counselor for every 550 students.

How Does Counseling Work? Counseling provides professional assistance for each individual by helping him to be more objec. tive and realistic as he seeks self-understanding and self de. velopment. Individual counseling helps the student interpret and relate facts about himself and his world and to apply this knowledge in (a) solving every. day problems and (b) making realistic and occupational plans. Decisions derived from counseling must be acceptable to the student and his parents. The coun. selor's responsibility is to seek . full and accurate interpretation of facts and to develop student and parent understandings. He includes explanations of alterna. te courses of action that are open to the student.

What Role Do Tests Play in the Guidance Program? Tests serve as one means of knowing the individual, his achievements, his abilities, and his interests. At best, tests represent only a sampling of student behavior:

but they do facilitate the gathering and utilization of objective information about the student for the use by counselors, par. ents, and teachers. Tests, in conjunction with other aspects of the educational program, are best used when carefully interp. reted to parents and students. A student's test results often show how he compares with other students in his community, his state, or the nation.

Can a Counselor Help a Stu. dent Get into College? Yes, but he cannot magically bring it a. bout. The counselor, the student and the student's parents should make joint plans in the eighth or ninth grade for an academic course of study that will meet college entrance requirements.

There should be continuous exploration throughout high school for types of higher education a. vailable, financial aid resources, kinds of current academic prog. rams, and considerations that are important in choosing a col. lege. Parents should take advan. tage of school-arranged visits by

How Do Counselors Work with Teachers? The counselor confers frequently with classroom teach. ers and administrators to assess the student's progress and deve. lopment. The teacher helps the counselor better understand how the child performs in the class room, and the counselor helps the teacher know and understand the child's abilities, special concerns, goals and problems.


How Can Parents and Counselors Work Together? Counselors often work with parents in in. terpreting the student's progress in school and thereby help to find ways for fully developing the child's capabilities. Parents and counselors share information so that both can understand the student better and guide him in making maximum use of histal. ents.
