Since only a small part of the brain has been hurt, the trouble a child will have is with only one, or a few of the many things the brain does
Actually, very few children who are brain injured are hit on the head. Most of them who have this trouble were bonn that wa or got that way from illness. The important thing to remember is that no matter how a child became brain injured he can usually be helped. The problem asually decrease as the child grows older

Cash balances on the current statement amounted to $\$ 1,171,273.42$ this year and $\mathbf{\$ 9 0 1 , -}$ 491.93 a year ago.
