The Juvenile Court System began in the 1890's with midthe ideal that the best interest of the children should Kif be the paramount interest. Juvenile proceedings are not regarded as criminal cases, no matter how serious the charge but as civil actions. Juvenile judges conduct their hearings informally and without publicity. Why humiliate and embarrass the parents and crucify the child, if you are really interested in seeing that he has a chance to make a good citizen? The law gives the prosecutor with old fogy ideas a chance to help a child get back on the right track. The public interest is best served by producing as many responsible citizens as possible. It has been a rare thing in my experience to have a child get into trouble the second time.
