




THE GAMBLE-

It now has the Whittington Case under consideration and it is **predicted that** the decision in that case will put the finshing touches to Juvenile Courts by permitting the prosecutors, should they wish, to bypass the juvenile courts. That would be the easy way. To follow the oldime methods takes a lot more time and work. But it has paid off in giving hundreds of juveniles, in this county, a chance to become worthwhile and responsiole citizens, which they have accepted and now occupy **responsible** positions in all walks of life.

The Juvenile Court System began in the 1890's with the ideal that the best interest of the children should **Solution** be the paramount interest. Juvenile proceedings are **not regarded** as criminal cases, no matter how serious the charge but as civil actions. Juvenile judges conduct their hearings informally and without publicity. Why humiliate and embarrass the parents and crucify the child, if you are really interested in seeing that he has a chance to make a good citizen? The law gives the **prosecutor** with old fogy ideas a chance to help a child get back on the right track. The public interest is best served by producing as many responsible citizens as possible. It has been a rare thing in my experience to have a child get into trouble the second time.






CONSIDER ALL COSTS WHEN SHOPPING
