In Summer Program

Up from 36% Figure Used Last Year --

School Sets Values at 40% to Meet Proposed Budget

Equalization Board notices to local property owners who had rendered their property to the school tax assessor were put in the mails last Friday. They reflected an increase in valuation on school tax property of some 4 percent-up from the 36 percent used last year.

The school tax office has emphasized that such notices do not constitute a notice of tax increase due to an increase in the market value of the property, but only because the school budget requires an assessment on the basis of 40 percent of market value rather than 36 percent which has been used for several vears.

The increased figure was due primarily to the fact that the district lost substantial values in oils during the last year. In addition, the 1968-69 budget reflacts the trend of rising costs in public education that has been established in Texas over the past number of years. This increase works out at approximatery 3 percent a year. In the case of the 1968-69 Rankin budget, it does not include any incleases in base salary scales paid by the school.

The rate will be \$1.50 per \$100 value and along with the 40 percent valuation figure, is slightly changed from those adopted earlier. The final results constitute an agreement made with the representatives of major tax payers after a highly satisfactory meeting held on the evening of June 5.

"Bairing unforseen reductions in values, it appears that figures adopted will yield taxes sufficient to the needs of the school for a time longer than the immediate future," said Pete Bateman, superintendent of schools.

An example of how the new values will work, a property with a \$3600 value under the new system, will sustain only a \$3.45 increase in the total tax paid.

During the past month, the Rankin School system suffered a net loss of one teacher when the Board of Education, in its June meeting, accepted the resignation of two teachers and employed one. Resignations were read from Mr. Brian Edmiston, Junior High science instructor, and Miss Kay (Continued to Page 7)

Instructors this year will be Misses Linda James and Betty Rankin. Classes are open to both boys and girls who will be eligible to attend school next September or who is already enrolled.







THE SHOOTING-

Bobby Kennedy is dead-assassinated.

I have been asked. "Now aren't you sorry for some of the things you said about Bobby?"

The answer is "No". While he lived, Bobby represented a political philosophy with which I can never agree-chiefly, that a Kennedy is born to hold high public office- and when our public officials reach a point where they are above citicism, then we have, certainly, lost the right to call ourselves a Demoracy.

I regret that he was shot-that he is no longer able to speak out for those he lead. He represented the political thinking of a large segment of our people and they and their ideas need to be heard, if for no other reason than to be opposed by those of us who are more prone to conservatism.

I regret that Bobby died and I regret that 25,000 Americans have died in Viet Nam - that more die there each hour but I do not believe we ought to back off from the Communist. Neither do I believe we must all now

join ranks with the liberal elements in our politics simply because their leader has been shot.

Nor do I believe that those who say we are guilty as a nation are right. The first assassination occured when Cain killed his own brother, Abel. And a dirty deed it must have been considering that he caught him out in the field and beat him to death with a club or stone since more sophisticated weapons had not been invented at that time.

Incidentally, shortly after that event, I expect that the elders of the tribes got together and passed a law requiring all peoples to register their clubs and handstones that weighed more than

Fishing Looks Good form Start at New Amistad Reservoir

Del Rio-studies by fisheries biologists of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department show that two lakes in southwest Texas, Devil's Lake and Walk, have at least 23 species of freshwater fish, with at least half of them interesting to anglers.

Both lakes will eventually be


Negro Groups to Sing in McCamey

CHEESE TIPS-

In selecting cheese, flavor may be the deciding factor. But consider the way you plan to use it.

Successful cheese cookery depends on brief heating at a low temperature. High temperatures and too-long cooking will make cheese tough and stringy and cause the fat to separate out. Some of the flavor is lost, too. Cut the cheese in small pieces

so it will blend more readily with other ingredients and melt more quickly.

One-half pound of cheese will yield about 2 cups of shredded cheese.

Soft, well-aged Cheddar melts and blends with other ingredients more readily than less ripened cheese, and less of it is needed because of its pronounced flavor. Process cheese with a milder flavor also melts and blends readily.

Melt cheese in a top of a double boiler over simmering water or add it to a hot mixture. When making cheese sauce, stir in the shredded cheese after the white sauce is completely cooked and heat only enough to melt the cheese.

When making a cheese omelet, add the shredded cheese after the omelet is cooked just before folding.

Casserole dishes containing cheese should be baked at low to moderate temperatures. To prevent cheese toppings from toughening or hardening during baking, cover them with crumbs or add the cheese just a few minutes before removing the food from the oven.

Two from RHS at Nuclear Symposium for Past Four Days

Twenty-two students and teachers from the area served by West Texas Utilities Company attended the Eighth Annual Nuclear Science Symposium at the University of Texas in Austin. The conference began Tuesday, June 4 and ended Friday, June 7.


