Gin Under Construction at Midkiff --

Upton County Officially in Cotton Farming Business

Work is well along now on the construction of Upton County's first cotton gin—something that was over fifty years in coming about. While cotton farming has long been an old stand-by in most of Texas — and the area surrounding Upton County, it had never reached a scale locally that made it much more than a novelty.

This is now changing and indications are that the cotton patch and its related boost to a community's economy may yet have its day here.

Midkiff Gin, Inc., an organization formed by some nineteen land owners, has purchased a complete gin and is erecting a new building to house the equipment at the old Amarado Oil Camp site some half-mile south of Midkiff. An all electric facility, the gin will operate at a 525 horsepower rating and will have all modern equipment, including facilities for control of air pollution. There will be no burning of trash and burrs and residents of the area near the gin will not have to put up with unpleasant odors nor cotton lint.

Officers in the new undertaking are Jerome Hoelscher, president; L. V. Braden, vice-president; Ray Barrett, Jr., secretary; Forrest Eggemeyer, treasurer and

and Robert Latzel, director. The group has employed Alton Smith or Artesia, New Mexico, as manager of the gin. Smith has had twenty years experience in the ginning business and will be moving to Midkiff within the next week or so.

Approximately 1900 acres of cotton allotments will be served by the gin. Acreage is located in Upton, Reagan and Midland

counties and more is expected to be "put in" in the near future. All of it is irrigated from water wells.

Lubbock Electric Company is the prime contractor for the job with a tentative completion date put at September 1 of this year. The company hopes to gin a minimum of 2500 bales its first year in operation.

Accident Victim

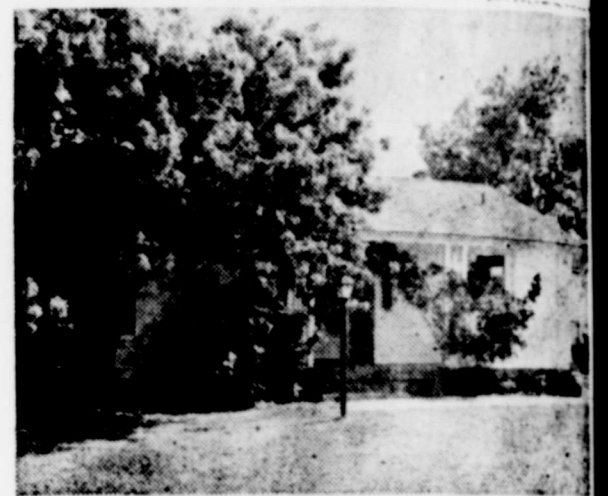

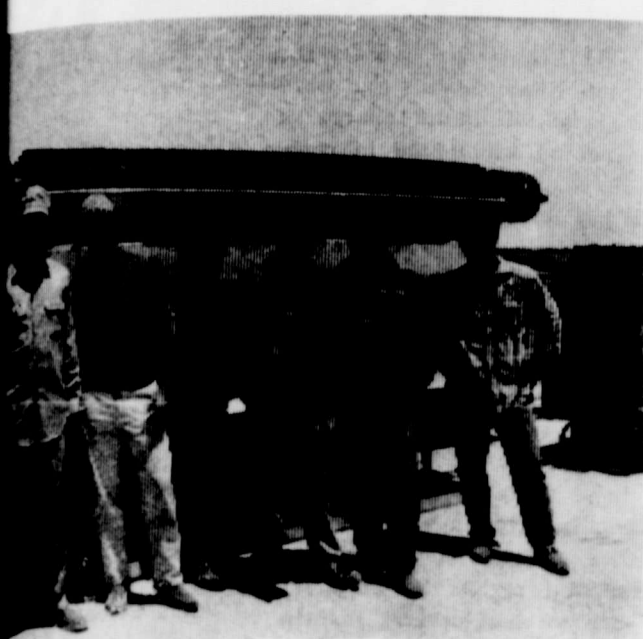

Dalhart is located on the High Plains between Lubbock and Amarillo and is a town of about 6,000 population. School enrollment is over 1400 and gaining. Currently a Class AA school, indications are that the system will go to AAA in the next alignment of districts.
