# **Bank Registers Gain Over 1967 Figures**

Total assets at First State Bank in Rankin showed a substantial increase over the figure of a year ago in the Report of Condition released as of June 29. Currently assets are listed at \$5,016,224.93 as compared with \$4,694,325.89 a year ago.

Deposits of individuals, partnerships and corporations were also up from \$1,495,169.83 to \$1.-728,850.27. Total deposits were put at \$4,395.899.87 for this year as compared with the 1967 figure of \$4,089,571.08.

Loans again followed a trend indicated in the January, 1968 report of being slightly down. Currently, loans and discounts amounted to \$2.005,755.67 while they were \$2,012,574.95 last year at this time.

Undivided profits were slightly below a year ago, presently listed at \$199,628.85-in 1967 they stood at \$223,684.74. However, surplus at the local banking house had been increased by \$25,000-up to \$200,000-with the result that total capital accounts

# Work Started on Rankin Low Rent Housing Project

"Everything comes to he who waits" . . . Rankin's cup will surely runneth over.

On December 24, 1965-in an election held on Christmas Eve in order to "speed things up"voters in Rankin approved the Federally assisted low rent and elderly housing program-known now officially as HUD. From that first "hurry-up" beginning right down to the present time, all matters handled in connection with the program have been on a more or less crash basis. Corners have been cut-so HUD says-and steps have been eliminated.

Last Monday, work was started.

Don't laugh. Keep in mind that this was a "rush" job.

Gray Construction Company of Hobbs, New Mexico, prime contractors on the undertaking, began preparing the site and getting ready to pour foundations.

Average of total deposits for the 15 calendar days ending with the call date were \$4,352,335.42. This compared to \$4,079,271.80 for a year ago.

All work is to be completed within 200 days-which puts the completion date up into January of 1969.

In an effort to keep work going at an even pace, the contracting firm has employed Mr. Pete Brown, well-known local building contractor, to "ramrod" the project. Mr. Brown will be in full charge of the work program and those wishing to secure work should contact him at the site.

In commenting on job seekers, Mr. Brown this week told the News that they were going to need "quite a bit" of help but that he was having to turn down some of the local high school boys because of their age. "This work is under Federal wage and hour regulations," said Brown, that means that we cannot hire anyone who is not sixteen years old."

Construction of the 10-unit complex will be along the Spanish architectural line with liberal use of stucco, cedar, brick and tile. There are to be three major structures with each of these sub-divided into duplex-type living quarters. There will also be a small alministration & maintenance building.

Six of the apartments will be one bedroom, two will have two bedrooms and two will have three bedrooms. All will be equipped with new electric refrigerators and gas ranges as well as heating units. Air conditioning must, however, be supplied by the tenants but provisions such as duct work will be included in the buildings.

Rent rates have not yet been determined nor have the terms "elderly" and "low income" been defined. All of these matters are to be worked out between HUD and the local housing authority between now and the time the units are to be completed.







"The greatness of our United States was not won by those who camped in a park and demanded a minimum wage for idleness. Neither did those pioneers in government sit quietly to be ridiculed and threatened by those whose claim to leadership is a mob outside.

"There was respect for law then without any game of cops versus robbers. A crook was a crook who expected imprisonment when captured. A murderer was a murderer who counted himself fortunate to win life imprisonment instead of hanging. The courts were more interested in upholding the law than upholding the lawless.

"There were some who didn't want to fight in 1776, in 1943, and the other years of national crisis. Some were conscientious and served as medical corpsmen amid equal danger. Some went to prison, but they didn't try to wreck a nation fighting for its very life.

"No. All was not perfect-not even in 1776. But few were never thinking they would be a majority. The patriot was a hero with pride in country and in self."
