Red Devils Seeking Upset over Favorites--

RED DEVILS HOST THE BADGERS FOR '68 COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIP

Friday night at 8:00 p.m. the Rankin Red Devils will open their home stand by hosting the always tough McCamey Badgers. Area sportswriters have termed the game "The Upton County Championship."

McCamey dropped the Alpine Bucks last Friday in their opening game by a 12-8 mark while the Red Devils lost their first game of the season, 16-8, to Coahoma.

Strong on defense, the Badgers have speed in the backfield and a good passing game which will make them the favorites in the contest. They are rated number two in the very rugged District 6-AA while the Rankin Red Devils are picked as co-favorites in District 7-A.

Last year, in McCamey, the Badgers beat Rankin 20-6 with both teams rated stronger this

year than last. Rankin is expected to try to use their considerable speed in their effort to upset their heavier foes and hopes in the local camp also hinge on the Red Devil passing game.

Past games between the two schools have provided some thrillers and a standing-room-only crowd is expected as upset fever prevails in Red Devil territory.

respected by many.

that that attitude is a little like much of our present-day conservatism that says "cut out government spending but let my share alone."

We all favor strong law enforcement—as long as it's the other fellow who is being forced. That is—I suppose—what is known as human nature.

But regardless of the debate that rages and the sides that are being taken, it may well be that a new day has arrived in law enforcement methods and in the law enforcer himself. The day of "Big John Law" is about to pass.

As people become more and more affluent, as the educational level rises and as we—hopefully—become more civilized, policemen and police methods will—in turn—become more sophisticated. The cop on the corner in the future will likely have to be a pretty well educated man. He will have to have better training in his field and particularly in how to get along with people.

All of this will cost more money, in salaries, training and education. It will be carried out by local, state and federally financed programs.

Right here at home, I have always admired our own High Sheriff, Gene Eckols, and Deputy Langford for the quite manner in which they carry out their duties. Unless it is court day and they are required to do so, I have never seen either man "packing a gun." Neither can it be said that they use strong arm

tactics.

True, ours is not—at this time—a very rough and tough community but we have had our oil booms and our share of the "tough humbres." Yet, we have had law and order.

It's doubtful that you could take the guns off the hips of the police in big cities—certainly not in the present day when police are being used for target practice, but the trend most certainly will be toward a more sophisticated law enforcement agency where civil obedience is carried out through respect and not through skull cracking.

You say it won't work? It has and does in England where the Bobby does not carry a gun. Some day, hopefully, we will reach that stage.

And before you say the Scoop is soft toward the unlawful, let it be noted that I back the actions of the Chicago police when they knocked heads together at the convention. Those people—the rioters—when there looking for trouble and demanding justice. They got both.

Justice sometimes demands a clinched fist.

Even the one that looked easy in pre-season, the Wall Hawks, do not appear quite the push-over they once did. We're going to lose some more games; but we're going to improve each week and by the time we get down to the district play, we'll be ready.

This week the McCamey Badgers come to town—a Class AA aggregation that is long on defense and short on power offensively. They make up for this; however, with a classy passing game and some fast scatbacks.

Against Alpine last Friday, the Badgers put up a pass defense that allowed only one completion. At the same time, their opponents handled the ball on some 70 offensive plays to only 40 some for the McCamey team.

All of which points up one thing—Rankin has their work cut out and will have to depend on turning the corners to do much with moving the ball on the ground. As for passing . . . we'll see.
