## Bronch-Busting Eyed by Rugged Red Devils

After pulling off one of the major upsets in Texas high school football last Friday—a game that has drawn attention on sports pages in almost every principal newspaper in the state—the Mighty Mites that comprise the 1968 Rankin Red Devil football team will take the field at 8:00 p.m. Friday against a team never defeated at the hands of Rankin.

Playing a brand of ball that saw upwards to twenty-two members of the squad working as a team, the Red Devils turned the tables on the visiting Big Lake Owls—and as far as is known, on every football "pick-er"—to out-play their opponents 14-7. Many local fans are saying that it was the greatest team effort ever put forth by a Rankin squad—many simply say it was the greatest ever.

Fans gave the team and their coaching staff a standing ovation at the end of the game—one of the few such instances ever accorded a team by so large a gathering.

Taking the Owls, however, will do little if anything for Rankin's cause this Friday against the Sonora Bronchos. Word from the Bronch corral has it that they had previously figured the Rankin game to be a hard one and that after last Friday night, it looked even harder. They are said to have adjusted their preparations accordingly. Fielding a heavy ball club—something the Red Devils have faced in most of their games thus far and expect to see more of during the district play—Sonora has the services of All-Stater Ed Lee Renfro. Many fans and all the Red Devils will remember Renfro as the shifty halfback who wrecked the hopes of a fine Rankin team in 1966 when he stepped through the middle of the line and paced off some 80 yards for a T.D. on the first play from scrimmage.

In addition to Renfro, Sonora has several other good ball luggers and a very respectable passing game. Their defense is believed to be sound and is led by seasoned performers.

Despite these assets, the Sonora squad has been defeated on two occasions this year and won

their game last Friday over O-zona 21-20. Big Lake downed the Bronchs earlier in the season.

Against the visitors, Rankin will be rated underdogs in some quarters but not all are expected to pick them to lose this time—despite the fact that Rankin has yet to defeat a Sonora ball club in the current series. Rankin survived the rugged Big Lake game last Friday with only minor lumps and the entire team is ready to go with the possible exception of Booker T. Dixon who has a bad ankle, and Lester Titworth who has been out since an early injury in pre-season practice. Fully aware that their task is a formidable one, the Devils will be attempting to contain Renfro, defend against the pass, watch-out for the rest of the Broncho backfield, and try to put some markers on the scoreboard for their own cause.

And their attitude: that's what a football game's all about isn't it? Let's get on with it.

## Charter Bus For Clint Considered

Rankin Booster Club is sponsoring a planned charter bus—or busses—for fans who want to use that means of attending the Clint football game on October 25. Clint is located near El Paso and a number have expressed interest in the charter bus rather than driving a car that distance.

The Booster Club has contacted two commercial bus lines and have been told that the cost of the round trip would be from \$10 to \$12.50, depending on the number of people making the trip. A minimum number using the bus would be 39 with the next size bus seating 47. The trip could be on a run-and-turn basis or a one-night lay-over is permitted. The bus can be chartered to leave from Rankin or—at a savings to the fans—from Odessa.

**DID YOU KNOW—**

A recent report has come to hand from the office of the Extension Agent that shows that 25 percent of the population of Upton County has an annual income of under \$3,000 and that these people are concentrated in McCamey and Rankin with about 1000 living in McCamey and the editor and 250 others living in Rankin. The report concludes that this makes a total of 1250 people living in the county who are undernourished because of limited income.

Further information in the report shows that there are approximately 3,147 males in the county, 3,097 females, 1,572 school students, 2,165 in the labor force 1,604 families, 105 foreign born, 5,446 white, 272 Negro—with an average age of 24.2 and a median (average) income of \$5,594.

4.5 percent of the population is over 65. (33.7 percent feel like they are.)

This week will be another big test for all concerned. The B-Team and the 8th Grade Juniors—according to the schedule—go to Iraan for a pair and this is always a day's work. The Red Devils play Mr. Renfro and the Sonora Bronchos and that is a pretty good test anytime. Rankin has yet to defeat any Sonora team—last year or otherwise—in the current series of games and despite their downing of the Owls who had previously beaten Sonora, it will still have to be rated as an upset if we pull off a win.

Rankin started poorly against Coahoma, came back and dug in against McCamey, got their offense going against Wall and then came Friday. The Coahoma team was probably the poorest team we've played thus far and just not being ready has to account for the upset.
