Upon their return and after making detailed studies of how the proposed plan would affect the two schools, the superintendents issued the following statement:

We are opposed to the Governor's Report for the following reasons:

1. Plans are to create one school district in Upton County. Both schools in the county have excellent facilities, and both have excellent and complete academic programs.

2. The system of a "state tax-

ing system and evaluation system" is not in conformity to the best interest of the tax payer, especially the home owner, and large absentee tax payers.

3. The elimination of approximately 900 independent school districts and the formation of : large ones will be a big step i the elimination of local contro and would be easier for the state and federal governments to gain absolute control.

- 4. Local real estate in the al fected community would decrease in value.
- 5. At the present time, mo. 1 school districts operate with th

state paying 80% and the local district paying 20%. This will be changed to 75-25. This will place a burden on most schools. Local schools have only one source, the ad valorm tax, where the state has a broader base.

6. It has been proven that good small schools are effective.

7. Interscholastic League Activities are open to more students in the small schools.

8. Delinquency is practically non existant in small schools where the larger schools have problems of dope, rebellion, and other undesirable conditions. The large

### Pay Hike Voted for County Officials and Certain Employees

In their first regular session of the new year, the Upton County Commissioners Court turned their attention to a number of matters, among which was the fixing of salaries for county elected officials and employees. An across-theboard increase was voted for most positions. Exceptions were for the commissioners themselves, for the sheriff, tax assessor-collector, the county auditor, the Justices of the Peace and the librarians.

Upton Commissioners salaries have been set at the state maximum of \$7200 per year, plus \$100 a month car expense, for the past year or so. In the case of the county auditor, his salary is set by the district judges and an increse will probably be worked out by them in the near future.

For the sheriff, tax assessor-collector, the salary was left at the figure of \$728.34 per month.

For major county office holders such as the county judge, the county clerk, the county attorney and the county treasurer, monthly wages figure out at \$708.33 under the new schedule as compared to \$675 for the past year. Only the county judge, in this group, gets a car allowence which is set at \$100 per month.

For the chief office deputy in the tax assessor's office, the salary was put at \$525 as compared to (Continued to Page 7)

### New Juvenile Officer **Hired for Upton County**

As a follow-up on recommendations made by a recent grand jury session, a juvenile officer has been employed by Upton County in an effort to more effectively deal with a series of teenage offenses that have ranged from window breaking and painting signs on buildings to breaking and entering business houses and public institutions such as the school.

Appointed by District Judges C E. Patterson and Charles Sherrill, and approved by the Upton Commissioners Court, was Mr. Eugene Upshaw. Upshaw is also the juvenile officer of Pecos County. The Upton portion of his salary was set at \$200 per month plus 10c per mile travel expense and \$25 per month for secretarial hire by the Commissioners.

His appointment became effective as of Wednesday, January 15.

In handling juveniles, the first step comes about when offenders are apprehended by law officers. They then contact the juvenile officer who takes charge of the offenders, makes his own investigation and then turns the case over to the juvenile court-in this case, usually District Judge Chas. Sherrill of Fort Stockton, along with his findings and recommendations.

For the past year or more, the incidence of juvenile offenses has pleagued both Rankin and Mc-Camey. The McCamey situation is said to be somewhat improved in the last few months but in Rankin, little results have been noted from efforts made thus far toward receiving better cooperation from the responsible parties. For a good while now Rankin has had to put up with the antics of a group of teenagers who have gone a good bit beyond what is usually considered boyish pranks.

Those responsible are not representative of the majority of teenage people in Rankin - in fact, taken as a whole, our youth have always been pretty well mannered and, although they are not all angels by any means, they have generally respected property and obeyed enough of the law to stay out of trouble.

That's about as good as most of

There is, however, a certain few. and they are known to the public and their families, who seem dead set on thumbing their noses at one and all and to reject every effort made to help them. They have been hauled in by the law. they have been talked to and pleaded with. They have made all sorts of promises and have not kept a single one.

This sort of behavior is not that of a mature teenager - not even a very old child. 

First, it is the responsibility of the parents to correct this situation. They, apparently, can't—or wont—take this responsibility.

Second, it is the responsibility of the law enforcement agencies, from the officers to the prosecutitors to the judge, to step in when parents fail.

Third, it is the responsibility of the community to see that effective action is taken. It is beyond the realm of foolishness to take the attitude that a town the size of Rankin cannot have effective laws and to see that they are upheld. As pointed out above, much time and patience has gone into trying to correct this situation without anyone's feelings being hurt. This newspaper has more or less stood aside in the hopes that dirty laundry would not have to be washed in public.

Nothing has done any good—not the apparent pleading of parents, not the lenient efforts of law enforcement, not the looking aside of the public. So now the glove has been thrown down. Some new and more drastic steps are going to have to be taken—whatever is necessary to bring this business under control.

Personally, I would favor the imposing of a curfew—and don't say it can't be done. It can and it has elsewhere. Along with the limit on hours—which is unfair to the law abiding teenagers but is effective—should be an accompanying stiff fine of some sort—in cash. A lot of people seem to never pay much attention until they are hit in the pocket books.

In any case, let the ones guilty be forewarned. The time for getting on the right track it now. Only a sucker bucks the odds



This is the time of year when home owners can do some fertilizer work that will pay off next

Peach trees and pecan trees are heavy feeders on zinc and iron and now and again next spring the plants should be supplied well with these two elements.

Putting these down around the drip line of the tree with a 3/4" pipe or bar is a good method to use. Drive the pipe down into the ground about 18" deep, remove the pipe and pour zinc sulphate and copperas and 16-20-0 into the hole. On trees 6" in diameter, about 1 lb. of sine and 1 lb. of copperas and 3 lbs. of 16-20-0 mixed together will do the job.

\$485 last year. The assistant's position was increased from \$425 to \$470.00. The chief deputy sheriff's salary was set at \$590 as compared to \$540 in the past.

The McCamey deputies were increased from \$480 to \$530.

For the clerk's office, the chief assistant was raised from \$485 to \$525 while the second assistant is to get \$470 as compared to \$425 in the past. This same salary is to be paid to the secretaries of the county judge, and the county attorney.

The county portion of the Upton County agent's salary is to be \$455, up from \$425-with a \$100 a month car allowance. For the county's portion of the Upton-Reagan home demonstration agent, the monthly salary was increased from \$220 to \$240. Secretary to the county agent and the home demonstration agent is to receive \$360 per month-up from \$325.

Salaries for librarians were left at the same figure of \$360. Also unchanged were salaries of the Justices of the Peace where all but the J. P. in Precinct No. 1 now get \$250 per month. The Precinct 1 J. P. receives \$140 per month plus \$50 car allowence.

In the Road and Bridge crews, a \$55 per month increase was voted, putting the "top" hands at \$550 per month. Wages to be paid for labor were put at \$1.75 per hour, for truckdrives \$2 per hr., and for operators \$2.25 per hour.
