

hensive reform program for the

liquor control laws.

The "Torts Claim" act does away with a long-held premise of law commonly called sovereign immunity. It goes back many centuries to original English law which held that the monarch, or sovereign, could do no wrong, and that no subject had the right to claim damages based on an act of the sovereign or his represen-

It has carried forward to this day, requiring that before any citizen can bring a suit against the state- even for damages caused by negligence of an agent of the state- he must obtain legislative consent before bringing suit

I agree with the theory of the bill-that the rights of a citizen in our society of free men are more important than the immun-

KOUNTY AGENT'S KORNER

Bug Time --

By the time you read this article you may or may not have any fruit left on your trees However, if you check and find some little peaches or fruit in the bloom, now is the time to start your insect control program.

When about 75 percent of the pedals have fallen off the bloom, a spray with the follwing insecticides would be in order to spray on the trees. In 3 gallons of water put the following: 3 table-spoons of 50 percent DDT wettable powder and 9 tablespoons of wettable sulfur. Then 10 days after petals fall, use the same spray-

Then a month later use 11/2 tablespoons of 80 percent Sevin

and the same amount of sulfur as in the first spray. This simple spray will take care of most of the insects that effect fruit. The sulfur will stop scab and brown rot. If you do not start early you will have no success on controlling scab and brown rot of peaches and other scab susceptible fruit.

For the control of aphids and red spider on your rose bushes, now is the time to work Dy-syston into the ground around the rose bushes at the rate of 2 lbs per 100 sq-feet of ground area. The results of this systemic insecticide is also cleared for aphids on pecan trees, but must be put around trees at least 80 days before harvest of the pecans. Al-

ways follow directions on the package of any insecticide and don't use more than the directions call for.
